Re: Applications to the Department of Information Technology and Telecommunications to install and maintain public pay phones

Full Board Vote: 36 In Favor 0 Against 0 Abstentions 0 Present

WHEREAS, Community Board 7/Manhattan ("CB7") recognizes the importance for the security, safety, and convenience of the public to have operable public pay phones ("PPTs") located strategically throughout the community; and

WHEREAS, CB7 believes that the community should have an instrumental role together with the relevant city agencies including the Department of Information Technology and Telecommunications ("DoITT") in the siting of those phones; and

WHEREAS, deregulation has created a competitive environment and DoITT is currently entertaining applications from a variety of independent phone companies for 2,262 new phones, 168 to be located in CB7; and

WHEREAS, the City's standards for design are so general that phone kiosks can be as large as 7

and a half feet high, 7 feet wide and 3 feet deep for a two phone installation, and the street footprint of new phone booths will be generally larger than existing curbside phones; and

WHEREAS, previous experience has demonstrated that PPTs are a magnet for graffiti, are frequently broken, interfere with sightlines and create street obstacles, and are an attraction for petty street crimes, which seriously interfere with the quality of life for residents of the community; and

WHEREAS, once a street phone is installed it is very difficult for the community to hold the franchisee accountable for maintenance and other quality of life issues; and

WHEREAS, there is no current mechanism to enforce local, state, and federal telecommunication laws and regulations pertaining to existing phones; and

WHEREAS, CB7 believes that the current DoITT procedures and guidelines used to solicit public input on proposed PPTs are restrictive and limit public input on the siting process;

BE IT RESOLVED THAT Community Board 7/Manhattan strongly urges the New York City Council to make the following changes to existing regulations governing the siting of PPTs:

- 1. Amend the siting criteria to assure that the street footprint for each phone and the size of the advertising panels are contextual with the surrounding streetscape, and to include existing street furniture and PPTs on nearby block fronts,
- 2. Require that DoITT provide community boards with complete information on the street footprint and advertising panels of the proposed PPT, as well as the street furniture and PPTs on nearby block fronts,
- 3. Adopt a bollard regulation that standardizes size, shape, numbers, and color,
- 4. Require replacement of inoperable PPTs and removal of illegal PPTs prior to approval of any new installations,
- 5. Mandate that DoITT consult with city agencies with have jurisdiction over public safety, sidewalks, parks, historic districts and designated buildings to insure that no new PPTs are installed at sites that are intended for, or have, other uses, or where there is objection by the NYPD,

- 6. Require that each PPT must have the technology to communicate to its vendor when it is out of service,
- 7. Permit no advertising until a PPT is fully operational,
- 8. Require that each PPT must comply with New York State Public Service Commission's rules and regulations.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT Community Board 7 opposes the siting of the following PPTs as forwarded by DoITT.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the architect has indicated a willingness to address the Landmark's Committee's concerns about (B) and (D). The architect will contact the Board when he has altered the design of areas (B) and (D) which were found unacceptable.
