G-O-V. 10 We will repeat that e-mail address at 11 the end of the hearing for those who 12 have not had time to testify. 13 Will the Clerk please call the 14 second calendar item. 15 THE CLERK: New York City Department 16 of Information Technology and Telecommunication, Calendar Item No. 2: 17 In the matter of the intent to seek 18 Franchise and Concession Review 19 20 Committee approval regarding a proposed 21 amendment to a cable franchise agreement 2.2 between the City of New York and Verizon 23 New York Inc. That will, among other 2.4 things, 1) extend the term of Agreement 25 for an additional three years, 2)

1 require deployment of cable service at a 2 minimum of 500,000 residential dwelling 3 4 units not previously eligible for standard installation, with at least 5 125,000 of such units being in certain 6 7 currently underserved Community Districts, and 3) require deployment of 8 9 cable service to New York City Housing 10 Authority residential dwelling units not 11 previously eligible for cable service, 12 pursuant to schedules in the Amendment. 13 MS. BLANE: We will take testimony 14 from the public, but first I'd like to 15 ask the members of the Committee if they 16 have any statements. 17 MS. CANTLO-COCKFIELD: Yes, this is 18 Tonya Cantlo, from the Brooklyn Borough President office. I have a statement. 19 20 Can you hear me? 21 MS. BLANE: Please proceed. 2.2 MS. CANTLO-COCKFIELD: Okay, thank 23 you. On behalf of the borough 2.4 president, I have submitted, as I 25 outlined in my digital divide report, to

1 2 reducing the digital divide for the more than 800,000 New Yorkers, who live in 3 4 households without internet, including more than 100,000 school children, which 5 is why as a Franchise and Concession 6 7 Review Committee, considers an extension of the expiration date of the Verizon 8 9 franchise agreement. I urge FCRC to 10 consider the impact this extension can 11 have on New York City public access 12 centers, which would otherwise be 13 negotiated with Verizon, as well as 14 Altice, Charter and RCN, to upgrade the 15 resources that come in exchange for 16 their very profitable use of the 17 Brooklyn public rights of way. With the 18 pending vote on and subsequent 19 discussion on quick extension, as a member of the FCRC, I also realize the 20 21 important role that public access 22 resources had and are playing in the 23 virtual pivot in our communities, as an 2.4 important, if not overarching aspect of 25 this conversation. It is imperative

1 2 that we work with cable franchises to provide free or local broadbands to all 3 low income New Yorkers, models after 4 efforts such as Spectrum Internet Assist 5 6 and Altice Advantage Internet. With the 7 pandemic affecting all aspects of public life, including healthcare, education 8 9 commerce, housing and the cultural art, 10 public access has been able to weather 11 the impact on millions of city residents 12 because of the terms negotiated more 13 than a decade ago. With an eye on the 14 future and the unforeseen challenges 15 contained where in, it is vital that 16 public access centers continue to have 17 the resources they need to amplify 18 community board voices, to support

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1 2 she wanted me to state that in the matter of DoITT and Verizon, that MNM is 3 4 a very important part of the Verizon franchise and she is also very concerned 5 about public access, television, as well 6 as access to all communities and 7 bridging that digital divide, thank you. 8 9 MS. BLANE: Thank you. Do any additional members of the committees 10 11 have statements that they wish to make? 12 Will the clerk please call the next 13 person who wishes to testify. 14 MR. STAMOULIS: This is Alex 15 Stamoulis. Before we continue, I just 16 wanted to let you know, I'm admitting 17 another 20 people to the call, so we can 18 just be ready for that. 19 THE CLERK: Noted. Anthony Riddle, please provide your full name and 20 21 affiliation for the record. 2.2 MR. RIDDLE: Good afternoon, 23 hopefully you can hear me. My name is 2.4 Anthony Riddle. I'm the senior vice 25 president for community media at BRIC

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Arts Media and I'm representing a joint testimony from Brick Community Media, Bronx Net, Manhattan Neighborhood Network, Queens Public Television and Staten Island Community Television. We would like to thank the members of the FCRC, DoITT and the Mayor's office and City Council for all the hard work that has gone into this agreement that is before us today. The cable access organizations' CAOs representing Bronx, Brooklyn, Manhattan, Queens and Staten Island has recommended approval of the Verizon franchise contract amendment and fully support the goals of building out broadband services to underserved areas of the city.

The agreement between the city and Verizon is a step in the right direction in achieving that goal. The CAOs recognizes the urgency to decrease the digital divide in our city and we have always done our part on a micro-community basis through cross

1 training, education and service. Ιf 2 3 anything, the conditions imposed upon us all by the current pandemic make it 4 increasingly clear that connectivity is 5 not a luxury, but it is instead a 6 7 necessity for full civic engagement, for access to vital services and for public 8 9 education. Since our world changed dramatically with the event of the 10 11 pandemic, government hearings must be 12 attended virtually. Our teachers struggle to reach students who may have 13 14 neither broadband nor devices beyond a 15 cell phone in the household. And 16 seniors who may not have fully joined 17 the digital age, to seek information 18 necessary for their health and well 19 being. New York's access center have 20 always stepped in, providing critical 21 resources technical support to our 2.2 communities. We have provided air-times 23 for the Department of Education so that the television can be used for scheduled 2.4 25 classes on a daily basis. We have

1 2 provided a platform for hearings such as 3 this, to provide access and availability 4 in poor and minority communities, we have provided the resources, technical 5 support and access to audiences that has 6 7 kept organizations alive during this difficult period, where in-person 8 9 attendance is highly restricted or 10 prohibited, we have provided resources 11 to help health care providers throughout 12 the pandemic, we have been a source of 13 information to the many ethnic 14 communities, whose interest is not 15 covered by mainstream media. 16 are largely funded by (inaudible) 17 franchises, including Verizon. An 18 important aspect of this Verizon 19 agreement is to propose the extension of 20 the current contract for three years, 21 from July 2020 until July 2023. Should 2.2 the other cable franchises be similarly 23 extended, it will mean that the CAOs go for much more than a decade without 2.4 25 change and its support levels and for

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capital and operating funds. Capital funds are needed to keep pace with technical development and equipment replacement, amongst other things.

Operating funds have been deceasing sharply over the past several years as cable companies move subscribers from cable TV to far more lucrative broadband services. Services upon which the cable brands do not have to pay a fee to the

Let me just wrap up by saying, none of us foresaw the pandemic or the role we were put in, serving so many communities, New York's public access centers have been essential to the digital pivot that has kept our communities whole. We hope -- it is important to us that as these changes are discussed and voted upon, that the FCRC, that there is also a discussion of the very important role

1 public access resources are playing in 2 3 the virtual pivot by our community. 4 It's imperative that the City continue to stay ahead of technology changes --5 MR. STAMOULIS: Thank for your 6 7 testimony. MR. RIDDLE: Okay, thank you very 8 9 much. I will submit the whole testimony for the record. 10 11 MR. STAMOULIS: Thank you very much. I'm going to submit further callers into 12 the hearing, for which I will be 13 14 reiterating our protocols. Thank you 15 very much and bear with me. 16 Hello, everyone, the FCRC public 17 hearing that is scheduled for January 18 11, 2021, you joined the middle of the 19 hearing. We're currently hearing 20 testimony on calendar item number 2, 21 Verizon. Calendar item number 1, 2.2 Rockaway, will be heard after Verizon. 2.3 We have a lot of public testimony queued 2.4 up for that item. I would ask that 25 everyone please mute your microphone, so

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those that are testifying can be heard freely and we will be calling those of you who have submitted your name and detailed by e-mail specifically instructed will testify first and for those of you who have just joined and not had a chance to register, we will be doing our best to let you speak as soon as those who have registered have spoken. Thank you again very much for your patience. We currently have 200 people on this call, so again I ask for your patience and your kindness and we work to get this hearing done, make sure as many people have an obligated to speak. If you are unable to speak today, if we're unable to get to you in time, you will be given the opportunity to submit your testimony in writing by e-mail; instructions on how to do so will be provided at the end of the hearing. Again, I ask everyone to mute yourself and we will now continue with this hearing.

13	MR. CUSHNER: I've been telecom for
14	39 years. Deregulators are a consortium
15	of lawyers, experts and analysts. We
16	on September 24th, we wrote a letter to
17	the mayor to basically say that the
18	franchise for Verizon should not be
19	renewed until they finish the complete
20	rollout of fiber of homes, which was
21	suppose to done by July 2014.
22	Ironically, the City has decided to do
23	pretty much what we wrote on the 24th.
24	We also wrote a second letter, most of
25	you don't know that there is a Verizon

1 2 New York is a state utility, it is a telecommunication fiberoptic wires a 3 4 title two common carrier wires that is being put in and it's part of the 5 Verizon, New York 2019 annual report, 6 7 which is published by the state. The state -- these annual reports show 8 9 billions dollars for subsidies of the wireless division of Verizon, instead of 10 wiring New York. Between 2013 and '19 11 12 is when it was diverted to Verizon 13 Wireless to be built out and so there 14 was \$5.3 billion that was transferred. 15 Moreover, the fiberoptic wires that are 16 being put in are being charged to local 17 phone customers that has been done for 18 the last 15 years. In fact, the average 19 customer paid \$3,000, Now what's 20 wrongful, that's mild, is that nobody is 21 talking about the affordability. 22 overseas the average person is paying -in the Untied States we're paying 5 to 23 2.4 20 times more than they are for the 25 triple play or for the wireless

1 2 services. The reason why this is 3 because these companies control the wires and control the fees for all the 4 back hall. This has not been looked at 5 by the city at all and unfortunately --6 7 so this means that in Europe they're paying \$30 for a 5G phone and for a 8 9 thousand gigs, while the United States' 10 are \$90 and we're paying \$150 for the 11 unlimited service. The triple pay in 12 Europe is about \$30 to \$40, the triple play in the United States is averaging 13 14 at \$210, so our testimony is we need 15 investigations, we need audits. 16 brought letters to the mayor, we filed 17 with the city, we filed with the state 18 multiple times about this --19 MR. STAMOULIS: One minute 20 remaining. 21 MR. CUSHNER: Thank you, I'm done. 22 Thank you very much MR. STAMOULIS: 23 for your testimony, sir. Again, I ask 2.4 everyone on the call, if you are not a 25 member of the committee, to please mute

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yourself. Thank you very much.

No. 1: In the matter of the intent to award a concession for the renovation, operation, and maintenance of three outdoor cafes, one beach shop, and the operation of up to twenty satellite units along Rockaway Beach and Boardwalk, in Queens, for a fifteen year term, to Rockaway Beach Bazaar, LLC.

MR. STAMOULIS: Before we continue,
I'd just like to submit further callers
to hearings and reiterate the protocols,
bear with me one moment, thank you.
Hello; for everyone who has just joined
the call, my name is Alex Stamoulis and

1 this is the January 11, 2021 FCRC 2 hearing, you are currently in the middle 3 4 of the hearing, having finish with the presentation of calendar item number 2, 5 the Verizon matter, and now moving on to 6 7 the presentation of calendar number one, the Rockaway matter, a matter of 8 9 significant public interest. 10 understand a lot of you want to testify on this item, I would ask that everyone 11 12 please mute themselves now, unless you 13 are a member of the committee, so that we can make sure that those of you who 14 15 would be testifying very cleanly and 16 clearly as previously mentioned, 17 speaking of this hearing, we have asked 18 all people, if you're testifying, to 19 register by e-mail with your name and affiliation. If you just joined the 20 21 call and you're looking to testify --22 again, I ask everyone to please mute 23 themselves, thank you. If looking to 2.4 testify and are unable to register, we 25 will be trying to accommodate as many

1 people as possible, after we've gone 2 3 through everyone who has registered, if 4 you're unable to testify before the close of the hearing at 4 o'clock today, 5 we will be providing an e-mail address 6 7 for you to provide your testimony in writing and all written testimony will 8 9 be made part of the final record and provided to the committee for review. 10 11 Thank you very much for your kindness 12 and consideration and cooperation, as we 13 work this massive hearing with currently 14 200 people on the call, again thank you. 15 MS. BLANE: Thank you. We will take 16 testimony on the Rockaway Beach matter 17 from the public, but first I ask the 18 members of the committee if they have 19 any statements? MR. SWISHER: This is Allen Swisher 20 21 from Queens BP's office, I have some 2.2 short remarks. 2.3 MS. BLANE: Okay. 2.4 MR. SWISHER: May I proceed? Okay, 25 thank you. So I had the opportunity to

1 2 review some of the written testimony that was submitted prior to this hearing 3 4 and I know that we're going to hear a lot more today and I just want to say 5 that I hope the Parks Department can and 6 7 will respond to some of the valid concerns that folks have raised about 8 9 the selection process and the potential 10 impact of this agreement on existing vendors. In the local businesses in the 11 12 Rockaways, particularly vendors near the 13 beach have faced incredible hardship 14 after Hurricane Sandy and were crucial 15 partners in efforts to build back and now with COVID-19, these businesses need 16 17 all the support they can get and I hope 18 they can count on the Parks Department 19 to work as a partner, other than as a 20 potential hindrance to their success, so 21 with the new administration in place 2.2 under President Donovan Richards. 2.3 invite the Parks Department to work with 2.4 our office to insure that this happens, 25 generally to make sure that the public

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feedback that they receive today is meaningfully considered. Now, with that being said, I also want to note that after the Parks Department announced there selection of Rockaway Beach Bazaar to the concession agreement, I did have an opportunity to speak with proprietors who confirmed to me their commitment to local hiring and as part of that commitment, would be an effort to bring back as many of the current vendors in full and to give them a first look of re-upping their leases and I just want to state that I take them at their word on that and I hope and expect to live up to that commitment should Parks finalize it, so thank you, I'm looking forward to hearing from the public on this. MS. BLANE: Thank you. Do any other members of the committee wish to make a statement? Hearing none, the Department

of Parks and Recreation indicated that they wish to make a brief statement on this concession item prior to public

testimony. Will the representative from Parks please speak now.

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MALE SPEAKER: Thank you very much and good afternoon. Today, New York City Parks brings before the FCRC, the license agreement that has been negotiated with Rockaway Beach Bazaar LLC, for the operation of various food and beverage concessions at Rockaway Beach, beginning in the summer of 2021. The prior license agreement for this concession has expired and in re-soliciting, Parks received several proposals. It was a highly competitive In this case Rockaway solicitation. Beach Bazaar LLC had the highest rated proposal. Rockaway Beach Bazaar currently operates at nearby Jacob Riis Beach under an agreement with the National Park Service and has been there for approximately five years. proposal includes several improvements and enhancements planned for this concession, including a year-around

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service at Beach 97th Street, free WiFi on the boardwalk and the addition of new locations that have been requested by residents and vendors alike. example, stakeholders have requested an inclusion of a new food concession in the Arverne neighborhood of the Rockaways and this one location where our new concessioners plans to expand. Importantly, Rockaway Beach Bazaar is committed to inviting and has already extended invitations to the sublicensees from the prior season to return in order to maintain the existing ambiance. evaluating the proposals, the selection committee used the following criteria, which was defined in a request for proposals and in accordance with all the FCRC rules. The first is to propose capital improvements, investment and designs, the second is the planned operations, the third is operating experience, the fourth is the fee offer and the fifth is financial capability.

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While the solicitation was competitive when considering all of these criteria, Rockaway Beach Bazaar had the superior proposal. New York City Parks looks forward to partnering with our concessionaire and continue to provide high quality services for the public at Rockaway Beach. Thank you for your time.

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MS. BLANE: Thank you. Will the clerk please call the next person who wishes to testify.

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MR. STAMOULIS: Before we begin testimony, I'm going to admit the final batch of callers in and reiterate the protocols. I will not be admitting any more callers to the hearing after this point, so if you are intending to leave the call, please be aware of that fact and please submit any further testimony

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by writing, thank you.

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THE CLERK: Each speaker will be

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allotted three minutes. Please provide

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your full name and affiliation for the

record.

MR. RAFAELE: Thank you very much.

My name is Frank Rafaele affiliation

Rockaway Glow (phonetic).

MR. STAMOULIS: I would ask everyone on the call who is not Mr. Rafaele to please mute yourself, we are currently taking testimony, it is being timed and you will have an opportunity to speak at the earliest possible convenience.

MR. RAFAELE: Thank you very much.

I appreciate it. My name is Frank

Rafaele and I submitted these remarks as well to the FCRC for their review. I am a former New York City Parks employee from the 1990's, when I worked as an assistant for Parks commissioner Henry

Stern. I'm also a former and very positively known concessionaire and I recently held various food and beverage contracts with New York City Parks and produced millions in revenue and a great

experience for New York City visitors

and residents. I'm also a member of

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1 Rockaway Glow a response to this RFP. 2 3 We were not the highest rated proposer, 4 but we believed that we would 've been, had it not been for the personal bias of 5 two of the three members making up a 6 7 full 66.67 percent of the concession committee and if we were the highest 8 9 rated of proposal, we would've reaped an 10 extra \$3 million in the City of New York 11 and would have kept local operators 12 directly to this concession. As the 13 e-mail that I sent mentions, the overall majority of concessions of this RFP had 14 15 -- indisputable and undeniable bias 16 against Rockaway Glow and there was no 17 way that a fair process could have been 18 carried through. The serious bias stems 19 from a multimillion dollar legal matter that I have been dealing with that 20 21 directly relates to the New York City 2.2 Parks concession office and actually 2.3 directly relates to Alexander Han, whose 2.4 was on the concessions committee and who

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also Director of Concession for New York

1 2 City Parks. This legal matter is also 3 known to Sofia Filippone another member of the three-person concession 4 committee, who also works in New York 5 Parks office and who works under the 6 7 direct supervision of Alexander Han; even though she is listed as head of 8 9 this committee, she reports directly to 10 Mr. Han's. Over a year ago, I have 11 shown through whistle-blower complaints the Parks concession office and directly 12 13 to Alexander Han via e-mail that the 14 actual Parks contributed --15 MR. STAMOULIS: One minute 16 remaining. 17 MR. RAFAELE: -- a fraudulent conveyance and a loss of three separate 18 19 multimillion-dollar license agreements 20 for a company that I was the founder of. 21 I also publically testified this in 2.2 front of this hearing and in front of 2.3 the New York City Council and Alexander 2.4 Han and members of the concession was 25 also there and they saw it. Our

1 2 proposal should have been evaluated in 3 the unpartial, impartial and unbiased 4 way and this case it did not happen and New York City lost \$3 million. At the 5 interview I was asked by the concession 6 7 committee, who is on the concession committee and they wouldn't respond, 8 9 they said simply Parks employees and now 10 I know why this is not the normal 11 protocol. We request the reassurance of 12 this RFP with an emphasis on the review 13 of the submitted proposals by an 14 impartial and unbiased concession 15 committee, free of current biases and 16 conflicts. We believe the law, as I 17 mentioned in my e-mail in more detail for the FCRC committee, is on our side 18 and we believe the that FCRC --19 20 MR. STAMOULIS: I'm sorry, Mr. 21 Rafaele, you're out of time. 2.2 MR. RAFAELE: -- and if needed an 2.3 Article 78 petition in New York City 2.4 Court will agree with us. Thank you 25 very much and I appreciate the

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opportunity to present.

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THE CLERK: Martha Wolaver, please provide your full name and affiliation for the record.

MS. WOLAVER: My name is Martha Christian Wolaver and I'm unaffiliated with any particular organization, but I'm a resident of the Rockaways. I'm calling because I was informed that the Rockaway Beach Club, the previous contract holders of the boardwalk.

Had not been granted their -- a renewal of their contract, that instead it had been rewarded to the Rockaway Beach Bazaar. And I'm calling in as a concerned citizen to say that the beach club is an organization has been based in and responsive to the Rockaway community from its inception, they have been here to support and employes residents, including after Sandy, when they participated in the rebuild with no immediate profit for themselves and they have largely been very instrumental in

1 revitalizing this area and in drawing in 2 many other businesses, inspiring them to 3 4 be able to open and making sure that there would be enough of a market for 5 them to open because the Rockaway Beach 6 7 Club has made the boardwalk a special destination. We are aware that there is 8 9 a COVID related budget shortfall that 10 the city is suffering from and this 11 feels like a really, essentially an 12 attempt to make up a small portion of 13 the shortfall on the backs of working 14 class New Yorkers, both those who are 15 currently employed by Rockaway Beach Club, as well as those who have been 16 17 able to partake in these concessions 18 because they are reasonably priced. 19 There is no way, given how much 20 boardwalk concessions typically raised, that Rockaway Beach Bazaar can have any 21 2.2 other objective then to significantly 2.3 raise rent and/or prices on the goods 2.4 sold on these concessions and so their 25 assurances that they would like to give,

1 2 offer first refusal to the current 3 concessionaires, is pretty transparent. 4 Their word is not necessarily so trustworthy nor is it an actual 5 contract. The only contract is one that 6 7 the Parks Department is able to award and that one should go to the Rockaway 8 9 Beach Club. It will be so harmful to 10 this growing community and it will 11 really further contribute to the feeling 12 that New York City is -- community that 13 is solely for the affluent. These 14 vendors from Rockaway Beach Club have 15 nurtured these businesses and this 16 community and they should be granted the 17 opportunity to continue to bolster the community and it's economic development 18 19 in a sustainable and realistic way. Especially after they stuck it out this 20 21 summer during COVID --2.2 MR. STAMOULIS: One minute left. 2.3 MS. WOLAVER: -- And they were 24 operating at a huge loss and it can only 25 be surmised as one of the big reasons

1 they did that was to continue to support 2 3 their employees and the people of this 4 community and to give New Yorkers a safe way to socialize outside in 5 unprecedented times please don't take a 6 7 step of pricing out these a meanly valuable and deeply valued pillars of 8 9 the community for some extra revenue 10 that amounts to a drop in the bucket for 11 what New York City actually needs to 12 make up a shortfall, it will do much 13 more damage and cause much economic pain 14 there as well, thank you. 15 MR. STAMOULIS: Thank you for your 16 testimony. 17 THE CLERK: Chase Noelle, please 18 provide your full name and affiliation. 19 MR. NOELLE: Hey, my name is Chase Noelle. I'm a resident of the Avrene on 20 21 the Rockaways and I'm calling to testify 2.2 against the new contract. My 23 affiliation is I'm an employee of 2.4 Rippers and I can just tell you on 25 firsthand that these businesses are here

1 to serve the community, you know, I 2 3 watched them and being myself a member 4 of the community, you know, supporting 5 the locals, providing a safe place for kids to hang out. I think we're aware 6 7 that the peninsulas and the underserved community and the food and the drinks 8 9 are priced appropriately, so we can go 10 to a place that we can afford and I 11 think we all know that Brooklyn Bazaar 12 that these guys are trying to price us out, how are they going to make up for 13 14 that money? Well, they're going to 15 charge a bunch of rent and they're going 16 to charge \$11 for food, you know, it 17 makes New York City look bad, it's going 18 to inconvenience the community. They 19 helped, like what the previous lady 20 talked about, how they helped build up 21 the community after the Sandy, you know, 22 don't turn your back on that, we know 23 that these are good people. I can tell 2.4 you firsthand these are good people, 25 their heart's in the right place.

1 2 National Park, you guys are here to 3 support the people, let's not be money 4 grubbing, like she said, it's a drop in 5 the bucket, so you not really going to like, make up your ends you lost during 6 7 COVID and I think a lot of people feel really strongly about this. I just hope 8 9 you guys do the right thing. That's the 10 end of my testimony. 11 MR. STAMOULIS: Thank you very much 12 for your time. 13 MS. WOLAVER: You're welcome. 14 THE CLERK: Billy Barlow, please 15 provide your full name and affiliation 16 for the record. 17 MR. BARLOW: Hi, my name is Billy 18 Barlow. I am a New York City resident 19 and I am a restaurant consultant, I 20 worked in Manhattan, in Queens. I got 21 20 years of industry experience and I'm 22 here to testify against the Parks 23 Department intent to award a concession 2.4 agreement to Rockaway Beach Bazaar LLC, 25 by awarding the concession agreement to

1 2 Rockaway Beach Bazaar, one group is going to control the staff amount of 3 4 beach concessions from Beach 86, all the way to their current operation at Riis 5 Bathhouse. I believe that one group 6 7 having witness essentially a monopoly on beach concessions is not in the best 8 9 interest of the public, as the previous 10 person stated, the Bazaar charges much 11 higher prices at the -- well, the tenant 12 at the Riis Beach concessions charge 13 much higher prices then Caracas or Low 14 Tide or Rippers do. The current 15 tenants, Rockaway Beach Club, they're 16 made up of Rockaway residents as 17 managers and employees. They've been 18 valuable to the public and their 19 business has offered a product that is affordable to many different economic, 20 21 you know, made of economic classes, if 2.2 you're someone like me that works in 2.3 restaurants, you can afford to go there 2.4 and if you got a family, you can afford 25 to go there. All three of these

1 2 businesses provide a great atmosphere. 3 When Brooklyn Bazaar was first leasing 4 Riis, I was part of a company that was 5 considering subleasing space at their concession and we declined to bid on a 6 7 space because of their business model --MR. STAMOULIS: One minute 8 9 remaining. 10 MR. BARLOW: -- to talk about the 11 current proposal, \$300,000 for rent is 12 unrealistic, given that the Rockaway 13 concessions are five or six-month 14 businesses. \$300,000 needs to translate 15 to \$3 million in revenue, many busy 16 Manhattan restaurants don't meet this 17 revenue, at least Brooklyn Bazaar can 18 not hold there subtenants from season to 19 season. Rockaway Beach Club has 20 provided a consistent experience during 21 their tenure, tenure and the Bazaar 2.2 group will not do that. I yield my 23 time, thank you for hearing me. 2.4 MR. STAMOULIS: Thank you. 25 THE CLERK: I just want to

1 reiterate, each speaker will be allotted 2 3 three minutes for their testimony. 4 Laura, please provide your full name and affiliation for the record. 5 MR. STAMOULIS: And I'm sorry, we 6 7 found the full name, Laura O'Dea, apologies if I mispronounced that. 8 9 MS. ODEA: Hello, my name is Laura 10 O'Dea and I'm a Brooklyn resident. I'm 11 calling as a Brooklyn resident who 12 values the Rockaway beach in this community. The small businesses like 13 14 Caracas are the soul of the city park and that makes it a place where people 15 16 enjoy going in the summer. Brooklyn 17 Bazaar is, my experience, a business 18 that does not serve the community in any 19 way that New York needs. It's 20 incredibly overpriced, exclusive and 21 repetitive, taking away what is great 2.2 about New York. The rent proposed by 23 the Bazaar seems unforeseeable given the 2.4 beaches' capacity and traffic. It's my

understanding that other Bazaar

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locations have been having issues staying successful recently. Replacing the Rockaway Beach Club with this was a disappoint as a New Yorker. Thank you, I yield my time.

MR. STAMOULIS: Thank you.

THE CLERK: Maribel Araujo, sorry if
I mispronounced the name. Please
provide your full name and affiliation
for the record.

MS. ARAUJO: My name is Maribel
Araujo. I'm a Rockaway Beach resident
since 2013, former Rockaway Beach
concessionaire from 2011 to 2020, under
Rockaway Beach Club LLC and Currency for
Rocklarations (phonetic) and co-owner
Caracas Arepa Bar Hospitality Group
since 2003. I have been the managing
partner of Rockaway Beach Club LLC
through 2012 and therefore the New York
City Parks Department liaison. I was
born and raised in Venezuela and moved
to New York City in 2001. I established
my first restaurant in the East Village

1 in 2003, growing to three restaurants by 2 3 2/20/08. In 2011, we were invited to participate in the founding of the 4 5 Rockaway beach boardwalk concession by Andrew Fields. We joined partners with 6 7 an outstanding and eclectic group of decent food operators from different 8 9 backgrounds and successful restaurants 10 such as Roberta, Panehog(phonetic), 11 Rockaway Taco, et cetera. We created 12 Rockaway Beach Club LLC and jumped into 13 the unknown. The concession prior to us 14 was fully run snack bars, selling highly 15 processed junk food, wrapped in plastic 16 during inconsistent business hours with 17 no live entertainment. We were given a 18 mission and opportunity to activate the concessions and transform them into a 19 20 gustatory destination, nothing fancy, 21 just really good, in keeping with the 22 people speech -- spirit of Rockaway. 2.3 The city scope was at the time was to create reasons for New Yorkers to start 2.4 25 enjoying and utilizing the many other

1 parts the city has to offer and create 2 3 an economy around them. We put Rockaway 4 Beach back on the map for many New Yorkers and consistently this was to 5 6 engage with the community to put 7 measures in place that would balance the interest of the visitors that the 8 9 peninsula started to receive. 10 carefully created a group of additional 11 food operators, worked with local 12 organizations to capture local workers and provided jobs for hundreds of 13 14 people, most of them local, every 15 summer. While never officially calling 16 it an incubator project, it was an 17 opening for many young entrepreneurs, 18 allowing their concepts on the boardwalk 19 MR. STAMOULIS: One minute. 20 21 MS. ARAUJO: -- they were surrounded 2.2 by experienced operators who improved 2.3 (inaudible) in an environment of pro 2.4 experimentation and innovation. Some of 25 them are as follow: Super Burrito, Two

1 2 Dudes, The Creole Brothers, High 97, Edible Island, Riss BBO, Ciro's 3 Pizzeria. Several of these businesses 4 have since moved off the boardwalk and 5 are thriving still in Rockaway, many of 6 7 them are still with us. The success of them was so apparent, it inspired the 8 9 principle of Rockaway Beach Bazaar LLC 10 and the Brooklyn Bazaar to do the same in 2016 at Riss Park. We created a rich 11 music and performances featuring diverse 12 13 acts from across the spectrum, musical 14 styles and a healthy mix of local and 15 out of town talent, free to anyone on 16 the boardwalk open our expense. We saw 17 how people of all colors, races and ages 18 and economic backgrounds intertwine on 19 there patios and coexisted peacefully. The diversity created at each concession 20 21 allowed for beachgoers ---2.2 MR. STAMOULIS: I'm sorry, but 2.3 you're out of time. 2.4 MS. ARAUJO: Okay. Thank you. 25 MR. STAMOULIS: Thank you very much

1 for your testimony. 2 3 THE CLERK: David Laprad, please 4 provide your full name and affiliation for the record. 5 MR. CERRON: I'm sorry, it's David 6 7 Cerron, I'm an assistant commissioner for concession and audits and parks. 8 9 I'm just responding, just in regards to 10 the assertions made by Mr. Rafaele in 11 his statement. I just want to note that 12 the agency disagrees and we strongly, 13 strongly disagree with personal attacks 14 on the integrity of the members of this 15 selection committee for this source of 16 issue. 17 THE CLERK: Thank you. Kimia 18 Mahallati, please provide your full name and affiliation for the record. 19 20 MS. MAHALLATI: Hello my name is Kamia Mahallati. I'm not affiliated 21 2.2 with Rockaway, per se, I'm actually from 2.3 San Francisco, California, but I spent 2.4 time at the Rockaways and I have good friends who own businesses there, as we 25

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may be wondering why I care, even though I don't live in Rockaway and that's because this issue is bigger than just this one contract. In San Francisco, we have also suffered the traumatic effects of gentrification, much like New York has. I mean, the awarding of this contract is yet another example of this. I think we can all agree, there is no denying what the sole motivation behind the granting of this contract was, it was about money and the delayed response of this discussion coupled with the quiet announcements mere days before Christmas was not only unconscionable, but violative of the principles unlike the actual procedure of administrative I've heard that this was a very competitive selection and I think we all know that competitive means money and -but I think a better world is possible. It is inherently unfair that Rockaway Beach Club did all of the groundwork to revitalize the area, through a hurricane

1 2 and through a pandemic and now a detached and nonlocal organization gets 3 4 to reap the benefit. I yield my time. 5 Thank you. MR. STAMOULIS: Thank you. 6 7 THE CLERK: Thank you; Robert Carnevale, please provide your full name 8 and affiliation for the record. 9 10 MR. CARNEVALE: Hello, my name is 11 Robert Carnevale. I'm a nonaffiliate. 12 I'm a Rockaway resident and I have short saying, that Rippers and Low Tide, 13 14 Caracas are our friends and families of 15 ours and they been with us for the past 16 ten years and they are the heart and 17 soul of Rockaway and it would be really 18 terrible for not, only New York, but 19 terrible for Rockaway, to see them go. 20 I really hope that you guys reverse this 21 decision. Thank you, I yield my time. 2.2 MR. STAMOULIS: Thank you. 2.3 THE CLERK: Millicent Souris, please 2.4 provide your full name and affiliation 25 for the record.

1 2 MS. SOURIS: Hi, my name is 3 Millicent Souris, can you hear me? I'm 4 at work. 5 MR. STAMOULIS: We can hear you. 6 THE CLERK: Yes, we can hear you. 7 MS. SOURIS: My affiliation, I'm a customer and a friend of the Rockaway 8 9 beach club businesses and I've gone to 10 the Rockaways since I moved here in 11 2005. And I was there for all the work 12 going into, in the building and the building visionaries that these 13 14 businesses had. And I used to deliver 15 food down to the Rockaways for relief, 16 for Hurricane Sandy and saw like, right 17 after Sandy, like how the utter 18 devastation that had happened in 19 Rockaway, there was no boardwalk, there 20 was nothing, you know who was there that 21 summer, all of those businesses, if they 2.2 could be open, you know, and they were 23 there when there were porta potties and 2.4 on the beach and they were there

whenever the City let them be opened and

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1 there was this summer when most of us 2 didn't have jobs and didn't have any 3 4 hope and we couldn't go anywhere and they were there. You took this contract 5 away from them and you gave it to people 6 7 who are going to give you more money and how are they going to get that money, 8 9 because they don't have any vision of 10 what they want to do, they want to keep 11 the same vendors there, but they want them to be under their thumb, so how is 12 the money made, it's made through those 13 14 businesses and it's made by not 15 rewarding employees for good work and 16 it's made by charging working people 17 like me and everyone else on this call 18 more money for the same thing, so these 19 guys can make money. I yield my time. 20 MR. STAMOULIS: Thank you very much. 21 THE CLERK: Shaniyat Chowdhury, 2.2 please provide your full name and 2.3 affiliation for the record. 2.4 MR. CHOWDHURY: My name is Shaniyat 25 Chowdhury. I am not affiliated with any

1 organization, but I am a south Jamaica 2 3 resident, a former Marine Corps veteran 4 and I recently haven't been tied to the Rockaways since Sandy. As a first 5 responder, during Sandy I went out there 6 7 and cleaned the debris left behind by the superstorm and helping communities 8 9 and helping families sail to where we 10 are now, we still have such a long way 11 to go, but businesses on the boardwalk 12 are a typical part of that progress, so the new contract, we know at the end of 13 14 the day that it is a business decision, 15 but if it's unconscionable and immoral 16 business decision because we want to 17 return investment, we can continue in 18 investing in the Rockaways and the local 19 businesses. Based in the big part of 20 rebuilding in the Rockaways, we see how 21 during, even after superstorm Sandy, 22 even with the COVID pandemic where the 2.3 Rockaways has been the epicenter of the 2.4 coronavirus of high case of coronavirus, 25 these businesses has stepped up.

1 They've allowed mutual aid, when folks 2 who had no places, had no food, they 3 4 allowed us to really work together, made sure that we were able to provide food 5 to residents in the Rockaways and that's 6 7 the kind of work that they're doing out there, aside from the great 8 9 establishments that they have, it's 10 about building a family type of 11 community and we want to continue on 12 seeing that, we can't lose that, the Rockaways have been hurting for way too 13 long and we need our leaders, we need 14 15 everyone to invest in the Rockaways and 16 see that it's not just a right business 17 decision to do, but it's the right thing 18 to do, so with that being said, thank 19 you. I yield my time. THE CLERK: Thank you, I just want 20 21 to remind all speakers, you have a 22 three-minute time window to speak. 2.3 MALE SPEAKER: You sound like 2.4 robots. THE CLERK: Andrew Field, please 25

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provide your full name and affiliation for the record.

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MR. FIELD: Hi, thanks, my name is Andrew Field and I am a member of the Rockaway Beach Club LLC, as well as several other businesses here in the Rockaways. I am an owner, operator and I'd just like to pick up where Maribel Araujo has left off. We saw how many people of color, races, ages and economic backgrounds intertwine our patios and coexisted peacefully. diversity we created at each concession allowed for the beachgoers and locals to make a day of going up and down the boardwalk, tasting the world in food and entertainment. We worked hard to maintain a balance between customer affordability, paying our employees a living wage and paying ourselves for our own hard work and success. consideration was also extended to our food vendors through reasonable rent and administrative support. In short, we

1 did a good job of managing the various 2 challenges involved in such a broad 3 4 ranging community and a location as this because we genuinely care about these 5 issues. Our original license term was 6 7 eight years, which is almost half of what has been given to the new license, 8 9 so we were granted two additional 10 seasons under a temporary user 11 authorization, one for delays in the license finalization by the Parks 12 13 Department and the others post Sandy. 14 We have been through some ups and downs, 15 Sandy was devastating to our Rockaway 16 community, but we held fast and opened 17 the following season, believing that 18 three island oases we would help ease 19 some of the pain and help the strength of the community bond that had been so 20 21 shredded by the storm and its aftermath. 22 Just last year as COVID raged, we again 23 made the decision to open our doors and 2.4 did the best we could with what we had 25 to faithfully provide food and

1 2 refreshment for our communities and the hundreds and thousands of New Yorkers 3 that had come to the beach for fresh air 4 and space away from their cramped 5 apartments. In the in between seasons 6 7 we endorsed lengthy periods of unconstructive boardwalk, beach closures 8 9 and restoration due to erosion and the 10 improper beach management, no ferries 11 and the obligatory nonsense operated 12 face when interfacing with the New York 13 City parks and the other various city 14 agencies, if you think we did it for 15 money, trust us, there was no money and 16 we were experienced enough to know that 17 beforehand, we did it for the love of 18 our responsibility to the community. We 19 are all Rockaway residents now and most of us are homeowners and raising 20 21 families here on the peninsula. 2.2 compare our proposals to that of the 23 Rockaway Beach Bazaar, there are 2.4 strikingly with similar in substance, 25 notably differences mostly have to do

1 with money. They offered a much higher 2 rent, a figure so high, we don't see how 3 4 it would be paid without massive retail price increases and higher vendors' 5 severance and larger numbers for their 6 7 capital improvements schedule. Numbers that seem somewhat inflated to us, based 8 9 on the scope of work as Parks defined 10 the criteria --11 MR. STAMOULIS: I'm sorry, sir, but 12 you're out of time. Thank you for your 13 testimony. 14 THE CLERK: Nicholas Padilla, please 15 provide your full name and affiliation 16 for the record. This is Nicholas 17 MR. PADILLA: Padilla. I'm a small business owner in 18 19 Greenpoint, Brooklyn, hospitality and I 20 testify against rewarding this contract. 21 In addition to all the reasons already 2.2 clearly articulated, I'd like to add, 2.3 this is a bad business decision on the 2.4 part of the city to award the contract

for these concessions to the former

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1 operators of the Brooklyn Bazaar. As an 2 3 owner of two hospitality establishments 4 in the neighborhood which the Bazaar operated, it seen two iterations of 5 Bazaar failed spectacularly, complete 6 7 with local press interviews of which the owners complained about New York real 8 9 estate pushing them out after three 10 years. Well, as any restaurant or bar 11 owner in the city can tell you signing, 12 a three-year commercial lease it is wildly reckless, it's indicative of a 13 14 short-sighted business sense and a 15 willingness to agree to bad lease terms, 16 so it doesn't seem like a good, you 17 know, it just doesn't bode well for such 18 an important part of that community. 19 The increased cost of rent will not only 20 result in a significant increase in cost 21 to consumers, but it's also going to 2.2 make the new proprietors' business 2.3 unsustainable in the long term. Former home of the last iteration of the 2.4 25 Brooklyn Bazaar is, you know, it's an

1 absolute disaster, it's an eyesore in 2 3 Greenpoint, the city should support 4 businesses that are in it for the long haul and then have a proven track record 5 of supporting the community. I can't 6 7 think of any other businesses that better exemplify the ideas of hiring 8 9 from within the community and taking 10 care of the neighborhoods they're in and 11 Salmeca (phonetic), that's all I have to 12 say and I yield my time. 13 MR. STAMOULIS: Thank you for your 14 testimony. 15 THE CLERK: Mackenzie Wagoner, 16 please provide your full name and affiliation for the record. 17 MS. WAGONER: Hi, this is Mackenzie. 18 19 My name is Mackenzie Wagoner, I'm just a 20 community member in Rockaway, no 21 affiliation. I'm also a journalist and 2.2 brand strategist and I work with and 2.3 report on brands who join the rampant 2.4 struggle with brick and mortar present, 25 which is no secret to any pedestrian or

1 2 visitor to New York City. A source on 3 vacancy is unprecedented, growing 4 exponentially from 2018 to 20 percent 5 vacancy, the commercial rents are now dropping by nearly 12 percent and in 6 7 emergency effort to fill these vacancies left by the nature trainer who created 8 9 them for example --10 MALE SPEAKER: I'm on the phone. 11 MS. WAGNOER: Hello --12 MALE SPEAKER: Mute your phone, sir. 13 MS. WAGNOER: -- Neiman Marcus is 14 shuttering forever. Every form of our 15 East New York is still empty, the City 16 loses millions and this is a worldwide 17 problem and the answer is the same 18 across the globe. Small special 19 businesses, small businesses are the 20 bloodline of the city. It has not only 21 been proven that demand for big box 2.2 retailers has been grossly overestimated 2.3 in New York City, but those businesses 2.4 will be the first to leave when push 25 come to shove. People do not want

1 2 repetitive overpriced restaurants they 3 want something they can't get anywhere 4 They want unbelievable and affordable food, they crave new 5 experience. People flock to Rockaway 6 7 Beach -- and the magical community locals have built. People like John 8 9 Carlos Seljarago (phoentic) whose small batch wine and unbelievable record of 10 11 Low Tide, turn every beach day into a 12 dance party that you can not stand to 13 leave, people like Brent Young 14 (phonetic) who makes the best burger in 15 New York that you have to travel all the 16 way to Rockaway just to eat. These 17 people offer jobs to the community, take 18 care of their neighbors and offer the 19 one thing that retails spaces that all 20 try to recreate, something special, a 21 surprise that's inedible can get 22 anywhere else magic that draws retail --2.3 that draws retail new goers -- foot 2.4 traffic. To give the bid to the 25 Brooklyn Bazaar and not to Rockaway

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Beach Club would inevitably raise the rent on these small, independent business and short-sighted it would not only, have as much basic sense, be a long-term profit loss to the City, but it's a definite Rockaway Beach can make unmimicable community do don't turn Rockaway into Soho, don't turn Rockaway into Willamsburg, please do not try to put lightning in a bottle, you cannot do it. Thank you, I yield the rest of my time.

THE CLERK: Thank you. Jordan Wolff, please provide your full name and affiliation for the record.

MS. WOLFF: Hello, my name is Jordan Wolff and I am a resident and I'm also a business owner at the Beach 97th Street concession. I oppose the park decision to award Rockaway Bazaar the lease.

Instead the leisure of given the hands of the existing leasing holders the Rockaway Beach Club, if New York City cares about small businesses, then why

1 are they taking business away from the 2 3 very people that created these 4 establishments and took on all of the initial risk. The decision to accept 5 Bazaar proposal does not benefit anyone 6 7 in the community and the community is admittedly opposed to this decision. 8 9 The amount of money Bazaar is commencing 10 (inaudible) is so high it would cost 11 (inaudible) of higher prices for It is clear that this 12 customers. decision is misquided and needs to be 13 14 reexamined immediately, as a vendor I 15 would like to state that I have been 16 offered nothing from the Rockaway 17 Bazaar. I do not wish to work with a 18 new company -- (inaudible) the people 19 that my business possible (inaudible) 20 until the next 15 years, thank you. 21 THE CLERK: Thank you. Mary 2.2 Mullally, please provide your full name 2.3 and affiliation for the record. 2.4 My name is Mary Mullally and I'm a 25 local resident and I've spent my summers

1 since I'm a child in Rockaway Beach and 2 I think that the concession with the 3 4 Rockaway Beach Club has been the best thing that happened to Rockaway and they 5 stuck it out through a hurricane and 6 7 took great care of the pandemic and they've created such a great community 8 9 and have worked very hard to put 10 Rockaway on the map and the thought, you 11 know, they will just hand over this 12 contract at this increased money and make it so inaccessible to all the local 13 14 working class people that come to 15 Rockaway in summer is just outrageous, 16 so I really hope you reconsider because 17 going to have a cup of coffee at the 18 Brothers and Caracas and the music and 19 the life they bring, it's so valuable, 20 it's so important, it overrides this 21 monetary monopolization that the Bazaar 2.2 is about and we don't need that, we need 2.3 to keep it small, local and just high 2.4 quality, thank you. 25 THE CLERK: Thank you. Yarden

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Flatow, please provide your full name and affiliation for the record.

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MR. FLATOW: Hello, my name is Yarden Flatow, I'm a representative of both Cuisine by Claudette and Rockaway We are an interested party and Glow. bidder in the Parks Department contract for the boardwalk, the three concessions and up to 20 mobile units. My - I am a local. I've literally been growing up in the Rockaways. I've gone to the Rockaway Beach Club. I've been to the boardwalk. My main concern is that this contract is absolutely crucial to the momentum that the Rockaways have had, so I do believe we submitted a competitive proposal. We bid highly and we bid competitively early, we have an absolutely visionary approach for the improvement and operation of this entire boardwalk that I think wasn't given the appropriate consideration. I find that the -- I submitted a protest in writing as well, but we got a response from the

1 2 Parks Department that denied that 3 protest, but again I want to reiterate that I find that the whole interview 4 process was inherently biased and 5 self-serving to the department. Other 6 7 than that, I yield my time, thank you. MR. STAMOULIS: Thank you for your 8 9 testimony. 10 THE CLERK: Thank you. Candy 11 Brokaw, please provide your full name 12 and affiliation for the record. 13 MS. BROKAW: My name is Candy 14 Brokaw. I'm a resident of New York. Ι was going to say how amazing going to 15 16 the Rockaway Beach Club is with the fresh fruit, the vegetables, the 17 18 ambiance, the happiness, not like a 19 Nathan's dirty hot dog, or packaged 20 foods, but after listening, to the some 21 of the other people speak, I'm really 22 curious how is a monopoly allowed to 23 operate to the entire stretch of 2.4 Rockaway Beach, is that legal? And has 25 anyone taken, this to Court to see if

1 2 there is legality to allow them to have them have the entire beachfront. 3 4 Somehow, I doubt that. Has there been anyone investigating into the monopoly 5 that is being created here? Forget 6 7 about the food, forget about the ambiance, let's look at the legal aspect 8 9 of this. Is there someone from the 10 Parks Department that can answer me? 11 Hello? How is it legal that one 12 organization will run the entire 13 Rockaway beach? 14 THE CLERK: Please provide your testimony and it will be added to the 15 16 record. MS. BAROKAW: Well, I think it 17 should be added to a Court record 18 19 because I think it should really be looked into. Secondly, this is against 20 21 small business owners, it's also --2.2 we're talking about small business 23 owners of many ethnic backgrounds that 2.4 are really under pressure now with, 25 between the government is trying to help

1 2 minority business owners come back to 3 business. I personally know that 4 Caracas delivered food to New York City hospital workers and to fire departments 5 during last March and April donating 6 their own food and time at their own 7 risk. I don't know if this Rockaway 8 9 Bazaar is involved with community efforts as the beach club is but I also 10 11 don't think there should be a monopoly. 12 I yield my time. 13 MR. STAMOULIS: Thank you very much 14 for your testimony. 15 THE CLERK: Kellie Quarton, please 16 provide your full name and affiliation 17 for the record. 18 MS. QUARTON: Kelly Quarton, I 19 currently run a vegetable farm upstate, but in the summer of 2011, I worked the 20 21 boardwalk on 97th Street, it was the 2.2 first summer, of that and I remember it 23 fondly because it was the first summer 2.4 it was the first go at everything, and 25 since that summer I returned often to

1 2 see how it's been going and who it evolved into as it's previously been 3 stated into their own businesses from 4 carts on the boardwalk, to in the sand, 5 to brick and motar business in the city, 6 7 it's been built up and for the Parks Department to think that sense of 8 9 community and what has built up will transfer to a new contract is erroneous. 10 11 There is no way that the community the 12 Rockaway Beach Club has built up, over 13 the past ten years through two 14 hurricanes, I think people forget that 15 Irene did affect the boardwalk in 2011, 16 two hurricanes, a pandemic, rainy 17 Tuesdays and seasonal business that has 18 given everything beyond money, will then 19 step aside and let someone come in who 20 has no vested interest in the community, 21 has not been present for the past 2.2 decade, will come in and will easily 23 transfer a sense of community to them 2.4 it's absurd and I would like to ask the 25 Parks Department on the record, what

1 2 they think they're getting out of this 3 contract because it seems you're 4 conflating community and construction. You asked for concession contract and 5 what you're telling us in the beginning 6 7 of this conversation is that you're interested in getting WiFi and building 8 9 improvements and those things don't come 10 without money. We understand that 11 that's what business is, but you're so 12 invested in that, you're missing the 13 sense that this community that has been 14 created, that has generated this economy 15 will vacate without Rockaway Beach Club 16 it doesn't transfer, you don't get to 17 bring in someone who doesn't understand 18 anything about the community and expect 19 for everyone to stay and for the 20 momentum of what has been going on out 21 there economically to continue. I yield 2.2 my time. 2.3 MR. STAMOULIS: Thank you for your 2.4 testimony. 25 THE CLERK: Perzy Junior, please

provide your full name and affiliation for the record.

MR. PERZY: My name is Michael Perzy. I'm a Rockaway Beach Boardwalk and a resident of Rockaway Beach. like to pick where Maribel Araujo left off -- I'm sorry, actually Andrew left off. When we compare our proposal to that of Rockaway Bazaar it's a strikingly similar substance. The most notable difference has to do with the money. They offered much higher rent and I figured we won't see how it would be paid without massive retail, price increases and higher rent for the tenants, so given all stated, easily corroborated by thousands of e-mails and phone calls sent in by New Yorkers since Thursday, numerous letters of support from various civic groups, thousand of signatures, attesting beachgoer support from last season, why are we not being allowed to continue our work? Ιn closing, I'm stating for the record, we

1 2 were informed of our loss on December 3 23, 2020, two days before Christmas via 4 phone, not in writing by stipulated in 5 RFP. This is nearly a year to the day after the date Parks stipulated they 6 7 reached a decision. Again, that's stated by them in their own RFP. COVID 8 9 delays aside, Parks had already missed their own seven codes deadlines for 10 11 reasons unknown. This is also after 12 Parks arbitrarily extended the deadlines for submissions, despite there being 13 14 months to prepare proposals, affording 15 unfair advantage to those who missed the 16 deadline, very strange. The public 17 hearing was published in two local 18 papers on Thursday, January 7th, no 19 direct communication regarding this part 20 of the process was given to us in any 21 other form. 22 MR. STAMOULIS: One minute. 2.3 MR. PERZY: The RFP put out by the 2.4 city doesn't include this part of the 25 process, nor explain the right to

1 appeals to those bidders that made it 2 through the best and final offer stage. 3 4 It only points out the process about the 5 nonresponsive or nonresponsible bidders. With much respect and consideration for 6 7 the record, I'm in complete disagreement with, the City's decision to award the 8 9 concession license to Rockaway Beach Bazaar LLC and consider and create to 10 11 service to the community and affront to 12 small business owners all over the city and a horrible mistake for the future of 13 14 Rockaway Beach. I'll leave the amount of personal info to your imagination. 15 16 Thank you. 17 THE CLERK: Thank you. Courtney Browkaw, please provide your full name 18 and affiliation for the record. 19 20 MS. BROKAW: Hello, my name is 21 Courtney Brokaw and I have no 2.2 affiliation except for being a local 2.3 resident. I'm calling to strongly urge 2.4 you to reconsider your decision to award the concession bid for Rockaway Bazaar. 25

1 The contract should be awarded to 2 3 Rockaway Beach Club. These are the businesses and people who have been 4 working, building our community for the 5 past ten years. If you award the 6 7 contract to Rockaway Bazaar, you would be closing our beloved businesses run by 8 9 local residents, which has become a huge 10 part of our community. They provide 11 local jobs, thoughtful community events 12 and contribute to the local economy. The concession run by Rockaway Beach 13 14 Club including Rivers, Craft, and Low 15 Tide and more are all staffed and owned 16 by local community members, who 17 contributed so much to the 18 revitalization of Rockaway, they care 19 about the environment and the community, 20 they employ local youth, they are our 21 neighbors, they are our homeowners, they 2.2 are beloved and attracts more business 2.3 and more people to invest and enjoy 2.4 spending time in Rockaway. 25 concessions run by Rockaway Beach Club

1 has been through so much with COVID and 2 3 they were essential building back 4 stronger after Sandy. Losing them would be devastating for our community morale, 5 many people came here because of them 6 7 and would be shattered to lose them. The Rockaway Bazaar is not a local group 8 9 and there is famously unfair operators, 10 their reputation is fraught with stories 11 of employee mistreatment, environmental 12 disregard and mismanaged finances. 13 Their proposal is unrealistic and they 14 intend to just profit off the labor of 15 subleases, which is a step in the wrong 16 It's not the support of direction. 17 concessionaires that will be on site 18 doing the work. Your decision to push on Christmas Eve it is cruel and 19 20 intended to keep the community out of 21 the conversation. This is a public park 2.2 and we should all have our say as 2.3 members of this community. 2.4 MR. STAMOULIS: One minute 25 remaining.

MR. KLEIN: Hey, everybody. This is Aaron Broudo and Belvy Klein from the Rockaway Beach Bazaar. We really appreciate the opportunity and look forward to working together with NYC Parks Department and the local Rockaway community, utilizing our proven track record to help make the Rockaway Beach boardwalk better than ever. We have an 11 years-plus track record of opening venues, building strong teams, managing vendors and programming events. Since 2015, we've run the beach concessions

1 2 and programming at Riis Park, we proved 3 to be a safe and responsible operator 4 while helping to raise park attendance to levels not seen there in decades. 5 We've done this with an emphasis on 6 7 super local vendor staff. Our Rockaway beach operation will follow the same 8 9 example. 10 MALE SPEAKER: The RFP was a public 11 process, anybody could've put in offers 12 13 MR. STAMOULIS: I'm sorry sir, but 14 this is a testimony only for the person 15 being called to be speaking, please do 16 not interrupt, thank you. 17 FEMALE SPEAKER: Thanks Bill, well 18 done, sir. MR. STAMOULIS: You have two 19 20 minutes, please continue. 21 MR. KLEIN: Anyone had the 2.2 opportunity to submit offers and they're 2.3 were higher bids than ours and of course 2.4 they were lower bids than ours as well 25 and when we submitted our bids, we went

That's my time. 20 21 MALE SPEAKER: Point is, devil, we 2.2 know where you sleep. 2.3 THE CLERK: Ari Kellman, please 2.4 provide your full name and affiliation 25 for the record.

1 MR. STAMOULIS: I will now unmute 2 3 everyone. I would ask again that you'll 4 be polite, considerate and respectful of his time and testimony, just like 5 everyone else would be respectful of 6 7 yours. Thank you again. THE CLERK: Ari Kellman, please 8 9 provide your full name and affiliation for the record. 10 11 MR. KELLMAN: I'm unaffiliated, I'm 5 a native New Yorker and lifelong 6 7 resident, speaking on behalf of Rockaway Beach Club and against awarding of the 8 9 contract of Rockaway Bazaar. I lived in 10 New York here my entire life and I 11 witnessed the loss of so many places and 12 some neighborhoods and so many 13 communities. I seen them replaced with 14 empty storefronts and corporations that 15 go in and out and the only thing that 16 really do manage to remain are community 17 strongholds that have so much integrity 18 put behind them and I have watched so 19 many places be on the verge of closing and then be saved at the last moment 20 with hearings like this or through just 21 2.2 like, huge outpouring of support often 2.3 too little, to late but sometimes in the 2.4 neck of time. On the contract that's 25 been awarded, obviously it has been done

1 2 to, in order to obtain what appears to 3 be a large sum of money now, but what it's going to be loss of community and 4 integrity and ultimately you're going to 5 lose business to whoever is going to 6 7 come and take over these drastically raised leases because I bike 30 miles 8 9 one way to go to Rippers and Caracas and 10 Low Tides and I bike into Riis Park and 11 then bike away because that's not where 12 I want to be.
