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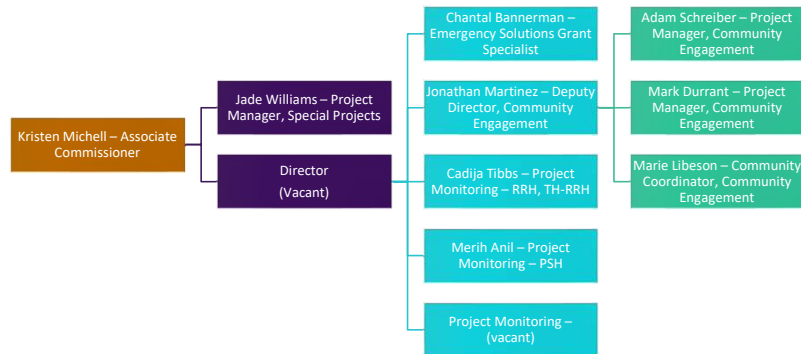

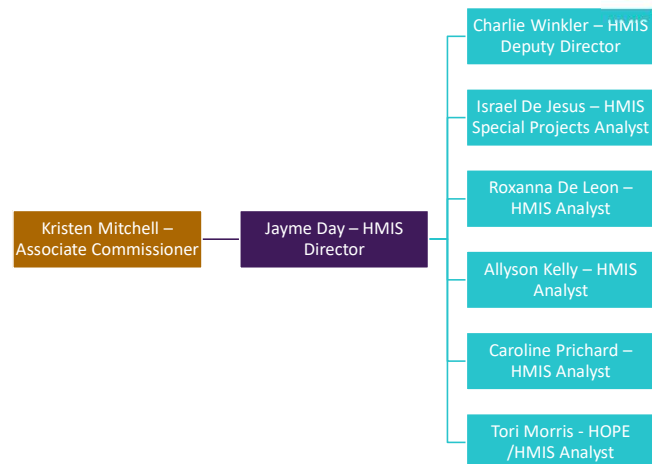

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HIC/PIT Report

HIC – “Housing Inventory Chart”

- Beds and units dedicated to individuals experiencing homelessness or who were homeless-at-entry
 - Permanent Housing
 - Emergency Shelter
 - Transitional Housing

PIT – “Point-in-time Count”

- Counts and demographics of persons experiencing sheltered and unsheltered homelessness.
 - Emergency Shelter
 - Transitional Housing
 - Unsheltered (HOPE Estimate)

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Background

- All jurisdictions receiving HUD Continuum of Care funding are required to complete a HIC/PIT report.
- The HIC and PIT must take place on a single night during the last 10 days in January
 - For 2024, the date of the HIC PIT was **Tuesday, January 23** to correspond with the unsheltered Homeless Outreach Population Estimate (HOPE).
- NYC's HIC PIT is managed by the Department of Social Services Office of Research and Policy Innovation.

What's new?

- Two-year NOFO
- Budget lines for supportive services and HMIS will be increased by a cost-of-living adjustment
- Tier 1 is 90% of Final Pro Rata Need (93% last year)
- CoC Bonus is 12% Final Pro Rata Need (7% last year)

Tier One - 90% of ARD

- Number of projects: 145
- Amount of funding: est. \$147 million

Tier Two

- Number of projects: 36
- Amount of funding: est. \$28 million

DV Bonus

- Number of projects: 5
- Amount of funding: \$4,516,499.00

New Projects

- Number of projects: 15
- Amount of funding: \$11,671,954.00

- No awards have been processed
- The proposed Continuing Resolution will not impact the 2024 NOFO Awards
- There are good indications that the 2024 awards will be moving soon – possibly this week

NYC Continuum of Care Guidance

- Review your current contracts
- Identify how much you have left to spend down on your current grants before they expire
- Ask for contract extensions to allow for further spend down
- Clarify your organizations ability to operate a project at risk
- Draw downs while eLOCCS is open
- Continue to serve clients
- Continue to engage your field office (CPD) reps. and the NYC CoC with questions.
