The Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) for the
Fiscal Year 2019 competition opened on **July 03rd,**

2019 and has been posted to the [FY 2019 CoC Program Competition: Funding Availability](#) page on the HUD Exchange. Additional resources are available on the [e-snaps page](#) on the HUD Exchange. **Submission Deadline: Tuesday, September 30, 2019 at 8:00 PM EDT**

The CoC Project Applications are now available in *e-snaps*. Project applicants will be able to access the applications to review, update, and enter information that is required for the application process. All provider applications are due in E-SNAPS no later than Friday August 9, 2019. The NYC CCoC will communicate additional information shortly about mandatory E-SNAPS training it will provide and additional deadlines for submitting applications in E-SNAPS.

HUD Environmental Review Training

August 2nd at Jacob Javits Federal Building: [click here for training details and RSVP today!](#)

The HUD Region II Field Office will conduct a training in preparation for Environmental Reviews. The purpose of this course is to provide NYC CCoC HUD grantees with a comprehensive understanding of how to demonstrate and document compliance with Part 58 and related environmental laws. The CoC strongly encourages early registration as reviews are mandatory for all projects receiving HUD CoC funding. The training will be held on Friday, August 2, 1pm-3pm [Register by COB 7/26].

Interested parties must RSVP a maximum of two persons per agency. All registrants are required to present ID and clear security to gain

entry. Unregistered attendees will not be allowed into the building. The material was also presented on 7/11 so if you've already attended no further action is required at this time.

Foothold Webinar; Preparing for FY 2020 Data Standards

The Fiscal Year 2020 Adopted Budget

On June 14, 2019 Mayor Bill de Blasio and the City Council agreed on a record \$92.8 billion budget, which includes funding for more social workers in NYC's schools and additional money for parks and cultural institutions. The City is also expanding its commitment to Senior Housing by adding \$275 million over Fiscal Years 2020 through 2023. These resources will raise the total City commitment for newly constructed senior housing to \$687 million from now to the end of the housing plan.

The budget for fiscal year 2020 was \$300 million more than the mayor's originally proposal allocation that was released in April.

The Subway Diversion Project

The NYPD will assist persons experiencing homelessness move out of the subway system using a new program called the Subway Diversion Project. Beginning on July 1st, police who formerly issued a civil summons to homeless individuals for offenses such as fare evasion or sleeping across seats will now refer them to outreach teams instead. If the person elects to enter the program, they will be escorted to a social service office for help getting housing and other services.

In a statement, Mayor Bill de Blasio said, "New Yorkers want homeless people in the subway to receive the right interventions that will help them get back on their feet. Subjecting these individuals

to criminal justice involvement for low level, non-violent offenses is not the answer."

HomeBase

HomeBase is a homelessness prevention network with 23 locations across the 5 boroughs of NYC. Each year over 25,000 at-risk households are provided services to assist with a housing crisis and support stability. This includes community residents who have never had any housing issues in the past; families and individuals who exited from a shelter and need support maintaining stability in the community; and anyone looking to improve their ability to maintain employment and financial stability to ensure that they can remain stable in their housing.
