Public Hearing Overview

In accordance with Section 5A of the United States Housing Act of 1937, as amended, housing authorities are required to develop, with review and input from residents and the general public, Annual Plans for the coming year and then gather input on the Plans from residents and the general public.

Federal law allows a public housing authority to modify or amend its Annual Plan. Significant amendments to the Plan must also be brought to a public forum to provide residents and the general public the opportunity to comment.

Documents for Public Review and Comment

On June 13, 2025, NYCHA released the **Draft Fiscal Year 2026 Annual Plan** and the **Draft Significant Amendment to the Fiscal Year 2025 Annual PHA Plan** for public review on NYCHA's website.

NYCHA is also seeking feedback from stakeholders, including residents, on two additional documents that were released as part of the FY 2026 Draft Annual Plan.

- A new Designated Housing Plan for NYCHA's current portfolio of elderly-only developments and buildings
- Changes to the Tenant Selection and Assignment Plan (TSAP)

Designated Plan for Elderly-Only Developments and Buildings

- •NYCHA has prepared a new **Designated Housing Plan** for its current portfolio of elderly-only developments and buildings and requests authorization to extend the designation for five years as per the requirements of PIH 2005-2 (HA) and 24 CFR Part 945.
- •As of June 13, 2025, this proposed designation encompasses 7,378 units in buildings originally constructed for, and intended to be occupied by, elderly families. These units are in 31 elderly-only developments and 11 elderly-only buildings throughout the five boroughs of New York City. All the units located in NYCHA's elderly-only developments and buildings are in federally aided public housing developments.

Changes to the Tenant Selection and Assignment Plan (TSAP)

• NYCHA's Tenant Selection and Assignment Plan (TSAP) has been in place since 1996, ensuring that NYCHA follows a fair and neutral process in selecting applicants and tenant transfers to fill vacancies at NYCHA's public housing apartments. Periodically, the plan is reviewed and adjusted to meet changes in law and regulations and changing needs and priorities of NYCHA and of the city's population.

•In line with NYCHA's vision for transformation, NYCHA is considering changing the current TSAP from a four-tier to a three-tier system. The revised rotation model will ensure a more balanced and efficient selection process while addressing the needs of multiple housing priorities, including health and safety matters, domestic violence, reasonable accommodations, and homelessness.

Annual Plan and Significant Amendment

As part of the Annual Plan and Significant Amendment process, NYCHA held 12 meetings to date with members of the Resident Advisory Board (RAB) and Citywide Council of Presidents (CCOP):

- 5. June 2 & 4 New York City Public Housing Preservation Trust Update
- 6. June 9 & 11 Changes to the Tenant Selection and Assignment Plan (TSAP)

NYCHA has made progress transforming the organization and improving conditions at its 335 developments

- Since 2019, NYCHA has made significant strides in improving compliance, service delivery, and building conditions in each of the pillar areas of the HUD Agreement.
- NYCHA has employed best practices to overhaul management and shift work for the properties and neighborhoods, leading to more efficient repairs.
- These changes translate to **real impacts on** the lives of residents: more reliable heat and elevators, and fewer pests and environmental issues, mean healthier, more livable homes for the NYCHA community.

And NYCHA has continued to center resident experience via programming and access to resources

Resident and Staff Training

- Resident leaders and staff continue to learn side by side in trainings about our mutual obligations under the Memorandum of Agreement and HUD regulations
- NYCHA has hosted 93 sessions and trained 1,890 staff and 634 residents since 2023





NYCHA Resident Training Academy + Business Pathways

- Resident Training Academy provides employment-linked training and job placement assistance in Pest Control, Construction, and Janitorial Services that lead to careers at NYCHA and with NYCHA contractors
- Childcare and Food Business Pathways programs support residents launching new businesses

Resident Safety

- Teen Expansion Program offers youth programs at 119 sites citywide, open 7 days a week
- Mayor's Action Plan for Neighborhood Safety enlists residents, agencies, and communitybased organizations to help move beyond enforcement to address the factors underlying safety at 30 NYCHA developments
