January is "National Human Trafficking Prevention Month"

January is "National Human Trafficking Prevention" month and blue is the official color to raise awareness about all forms of human trafficking and exploitation, including sex and labor trafficking. Human trafficking can impact adults and children of all genders, sexual identities, races, and ethnicities in our city. Marginalized communities – like immigrant and migrant populations – are particularly vulnerable to human trafficking due to linguistic, economic, and social barriers as well as fear of engaging with systems. Throughout January, we're urging you to wear blue and post photos on social media with your message of support for survivors of human trafficking with the hashtags: #endhumantrafficking #SupportSurvivors #AwarenessHelpHope #NYCagainstGBV #ENDGBV

DID YOU KNOW...



Globally, human trafficking is estimated to be a \$150 billion industry (International Labor Organization)

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In 2018, for every 10 trafficking victims detected globally, about five were adult women and two were girls. (Global Report on Trafficking in Persons: 2020)

POPULATIONS OFTEN VULNERABLE TO EXPLOITATION THROUGH TRAFFICKING

People who have immigrated or migrated particularly those without permanent immigration status

Young people, especially those impacted by poverty

People who've experienced violence, including war, displacement, child abuse, sexual assault or abuse, DV and other forms of GBV



Black, Indigenous, and other people of color

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People who do not speak English; people in poverty; people in shelter or without permanent housing

Members of LGBTQIA+ community
