Celebrating PRIDE

June is Pride Month, when we celebrate lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer and gendernon conforming (LGBTQ+) communities as a way of honoring the 1969 Stonewall riots in New York City. In June of 1969, patrons and supporters of the Stonewall Inn held a protest to resist the police harassment and persecution to which LGBTQ+ Americans were commonly subjected at the time. This event marked the beginning of the movement to outlaw discriminatory laws and practices against LGBTQ+ Americans. Today, Pride Month celebrations include parades, workshops, and concerts, around the country and across the world.

Throughout June, OCDV will be participating in a number of Pride events to raise awareness about its services and support LGBTQ+ New Yorkers who may be experiencing intimate partner violence. According to the National Intimate Partner and Sexual Violence Survey, nearly half of lesbian women and 4 out of 10 gay men have experienced sexual violence other than rape in their lifetime. The same survey suggested that bisexual women experience stalking at nearly twice the rates of heterosexual women. In New York City, the Department of Health and Mental Health issued a report in 2016 on dating violence in NYC public schools and found that youth who identified as lesbian, gay, bisexual, or who weren't sure of their sexual orientation were over twice as likely to report experiencing dating violence compared with those who identified as straight--18% v. 8%.

Support is available to survivors of domestic violence at New York City's Family Justice Centers (FJCs) regardless of gender identity or sexual orientation. Services at the FJCs are free, confidential and affirming and there is a FJC in each borough. June is Elder Abuse Awareness Month

June is Elder Abuse Awareness Month. Elder abuse includes harm by people an older person knows, or has a relationship with, such as a spouse, partner or family member, a friend, neighbor, or a person that the older person relies on for services. We know that elderly people

can be particularly vulnerable to abuse and face many barriers in getting assistance. The events around New York City during this month to raise awareness about this issue are critical to making sure that victims know that help is available.

Recently, OCDV released a report on Elder Abuse in New York City. Some key findings include:

- In 2016, the NYPD filed 2,857 Domestic Violence Incident Reports for intimate partner elder abuse
- In 2016, there were 146 reported felony assaults between intimate partners in which the victim was 60 years or older
- Between 2010- and 2016, there were 23 intimate partner homicides in which the victim was 60 years or older
- Between 2010 and 2016, the FJCs served at least 1,063 clients who were experiencing intimate partner elder abuse.

OCDV's Coordinated Approach to Stalking Program (CAPS) expands to Brooklyn

OCDV and the Brooklyn DA's office have partnered to bring the Coordinated Approach to Stalking program (CAPS) to Brooklyn. CAPS is a collaborative initiative between the District Attorney's Office, OCDV and the NYPD to increase the identification and reporting of intimate partner stalking cases, enhance stalking arrests and prosecutions, and link victims to services. CAPS is a homicide prevention program that link stalking victims to critical services before the pattern of behavior escalates to physical assault or homicide. National statistics find that 54% of female homicide victims reported stalking to the police before they were killed by their intimate partner.
