IT IS NOT UNCOMMON FOR A COMMUNITY TO

HAVE DIFFICULTY COPING WITH TRAGEDY AFTER AN INCIDENT OF VIOLENCE HAS STRUCK THEIR COMMUNITY.

When violence strikes communities, people may experience the loss of their sense of safety, their trust in those who live in their neighborhood, or their trust in local government.

Violence is preventable! Together we must standup and call for peace in our communities.

The Public Safety Tool Kit provides best practices for community members and residents seeking a comprehensive response to violence; outlining a variety of proactive strategies to help restore the basic need of community safety.

HOW TO KEEP YOUR NEIGHBORHOOD SAFE YEAR-ROUND

SCENARIO:

Certain times of year, areas, or events coincide with high rates of violence...

What can you do to keep the peace in your community?

SOLUTION:

Occupy the Block/Occupy the Corners

Occupy the Block (OTB)/Occupy the Corners (OTC) is an effort to create a community-based presence in high-crime neighborhood areas. On designated weekends and/or special events, specific blocks and/or corners will be identified for community leaders, politicians, church leaders, and residents to stand on corners or circulate blocks in "hotspot" areas watching for any signs of violence, talking to residents, and creating public visibility on the streets. The positive presence will show positive community support in neighborhoods that are most plagued by violence.




Concerned about the safety of students travelling back and forth from school...How can you and other members in your community create a safe route?

SOLUTION:

Safe Corridors

Safe Corridors is a community coordinated effort to provide students with a safe route to and from school. Volunteer community leaders, community based organizations and local businesses are expected to act as the eyes and ears of the community - the job of the volunteers is to be visible (often wearing bright vests and/or identifiable clothing items) and positively engage with students as they are walking to and from school. Designated community based organizations and businesses will serve as safe havens, providing temporary shelter for any student who feels threatened on the way to and from school.

WHAT TO DO WHEN SOMEONE YOU KNOW IS INVOLVED IN VIOLENT ACTIVITY

SCENARIO:

You or someone you know has a gun and wants to get it off the street...Where do you go?

SOLUTION:

Anonymously Turning Over Weapons

The Cash for Guns Program is a program in which the New York City Police Department will pay one hundred dollars to any individual, excluding active law enforcement personnel and gun dealers, who present any handgun. Individuals may bring any revolvers, semiautomatic and automatic pistols, sawed-off shotguns, or assault weapons that are in apparent operative condition, to any precinct, transit district or police service area (PSA). Weapons that do not qualify will be taken under the Cash for Guns Program, but will not qualify for the cash payment. An individual may surrender more than three weapons, but cash reimbursement will only be made for a maximum of three weapons.

Any individual turning in a qualifying weapon may do so at any precinct, transit district or PSA, 24-hours a day, seven days a week. No questions asked and no identification will be required, as the identity of all individuals will remain anonymous. Cash payments will be made only from the following Patrol Borough Cash for Guns Central Locations upon surrendering weapons:

You have noticed a wanted person/fugitive is in your community...What do you do?

SOLUTION:

Anonymously Reporting Fugitives

In NYC, phone numbers, e-mail addresses, and IP addresses are NEVER captured, tracked, or saved when reporting information to Crimestoppers. Information should be about a violent crime (i.e., homicide, robbery, stabbing, shooting, sexual assualts, etc.)

However, crimestoppers is always willing to receive tips related to any type of crime. When a tip leads to an arrest and indictment, YOU can receive an award up to \$2,000. (Reward amount based upon New York City Police Foundation committee review.)





You or someone you know has a warrant out for their arrest...How do you safely turn yourself in?

SOLUTION:

Safe Surrender

If you or someone you know believes that there is a warrant out for their arrest in New York City, you can confirm or get information about arrest warrants issued by the New York City Police Department by contacting the County Clerk's office of arrest.

WHAT TO DO IF THERE WAS JUST A VIOLENT INCIDENT IN YOUR NEIGHBORHOOD

SCENARIO:

What you can do to denounce the act of violence in your community now?

SOLUTION:

Community Action Responses

Within 72 hours of the violent incident, community leaders can organize a demonstration at the location where the violence occurred. The more community members in attendance, the stronger the message can be that your community does not condone violent behavior.

Community leaders organize residents, local business owners, faith leaders, service providers and youth, conveying the message that violence should not be viewed as normal but as a behavior that can be changed.

During these events, community leaders should distribute resource materials and seek to host further events to convey the message that violence is not acceptable or normal.

You want to mobilize members of your community after an act of community violence...Who do you contact?

SOLUTION:

Create a Call/Text Tree

The most critical part of any community mobilization effort is to reach key residents and community stake holders to provide brief, concise information and instructions to the community quickly and accurately regarding events. This communication procedure utilizes two common means of mass communication of pertinent information: text and "call trees". In order to build call trees for your community mobilization efforts, engage each community member to identify and maintain a network of at least five community members to text and call during times requiring mobilization.

WHAT TO DO IF SOMEONE HAS JUST EXPERIENCED TRAUMA

SCENARIO:

If you or someone you love is a victim of a crime, you can receive help...

Someone in your community has just experienced a traumatic event. How can you help them?

SOLUTION:

Safe Horizon's Families of Homicide Victims Services

If someone you know has just experienced a traumatic event or has been exposed to community violence, let them know that their family, community, and various organizations are standing by ready to help.

So how does it work? Safe Horizon's Families of Homicide Victims services have helped people cope with loss of a loved one to homicide by assisting them with an array of services, such as, supportive individual and group therapeutic services and will be able to assist you with the practical issues that arise, including funeral expenses and assistance navigating the criminal justice system.

SERVICES OFFERED BY SAFE HORIZON

FOR FAMILIES WHO HAVE LOST A LOVED ONE TO HOMICIDE:

ASSISTANCE WITH APPLICATIONS TO THE CRIME VICTIMS BOARD (CVB)

CVB is a New York State program that offers financial assistance to people who have lost a loved one due to a homicide. Survivors may be eligible for burial expenses and/ or compensation for lost earnings.

ADVOCACY

As a liaison between families, police, offices of the district attorney, department of correction and division of parole, Families of Homicide Victims (FOHV) will help you and your family stay informed about your case.

ACCOMPANIMENT

FOHV will accompany you and your family to court. Safe Horizon offers emotional support and guidance on how to navigate the criminal justice system.

INDIVIDUAL AND FAMILY COUNSELING

SUPPORT GROUPS

FOHV is available to educate communities and service providers on the issues individuals may face when they lose a loved one to homicide.

NYC CCRB Mission and Rules

The New York City Civilian Complaint Review Board (CCRB) is an independent agency. It is empowered to receive, investigate, mediate, hear, make findings, and recommend action on complaints against New York City police officers alleging the use of excessive or unnecessary force, abuse of authority, discourtesy, or the use of offensive language. While filing a complaint it will be helpful if you are able to capture the precinct or command the officer is from, the shield number, patrol car number, or license plate to report the officer's misconduct.
