Census Block Groups

The American Community Survey (ACS) is a yearly survey that provides current information on a broader set of topics than the decennial Census. Unlike the decennial Census, the ACS is based on a sample survey, with estimates subject to sampling error. Consequently, data are unreliable for small areas and are unavailable at the block level.


- Count of residential units on each lot (MapPLUTO: 1 Dot = 1 Unit)

Methodology

Given the limitations of sample-based ACS data, demographers typically use five-year period estimates for aggregates of multiple block groups to ensure data reliability.


For purpose of understanding SoHo/NoHo, data within Block Groups where populations predominantly reside within the M1-5A and M1-5B districts () were aggregated.

Block Groups with populations predominantly residing outside SoHo/NoHo () as indicated by parcel-level housing unit data do not provide reliable information on populations within SoHo and NoHo.



HOUSEHOLD INCOME DISTRIBUTION

The SoHo/NoHo study area population is significantly more affluent than that of the borough or city as a whole.



COMMUNITY DISTRICT 2
