February 20, 2024

Amy Hau Acting Chair- Welcomed all to the Tuesday, February 20th meeting of Community Board 1, Queens.

Election of Executive Board Chairperson

Rod Townsend – My name is Rod Townsend. I'm the chair of your Parliamentary Legal and Legislative Committee and I am running the run-off election for chairperson of the Board. He informed everyone of the election results of last month and announce a run-off election for tonight. Evie Hantzopoulos and Dino Panagoulias are running for Chairperson of the Board. Each person will have 2 minutes to speak.

Evie Hantzopoulos - I'm Evie Hantzopoulos I have been on the community board since 2010, was the chair of the housing committee and brought that committee to life after never having met when I became chair and I feel like that committee did a lot of work to really push back and demand more affordable housing here in Astoria. I was not able to continue as (committee) chair once I joined the executive board two years ago as the second Vice chair, but deeply care about Astoria. A little bit about my background. I am the daughter of immigrants. I moved to New York City in 1990 I have lived in Astoria since 1998, in addition to serving on the community board, my day job is I run the Queens Botanical Garden. Prior to that I was the executive director for a youth agency called Global Kids that worked across New York City with youth from underserved communities, empowering them to act on issues that they care about. I'm also, locally here in Astoria, I'm the co-founder of the 31st Avenue Open Street, was also a co-founder of Frontline Foods Queens, which, at the height of the pandemic, were serving hospital workers and frontline workers meals every day at six hospitals across Queens. Later we shifted to Astoria Houses, Queensbridge, Ravenswood, and food pantries to continue providing nourishing meals for people who were food insecure, and we did that by raising money and paying local restaurants. We helped keep those local restaurants afloat. Also, a founding member of Astoria Mutual Aid Network. I was, a PTA president, I'm done, my kids are all graduated from New York City public school, so I'm done with that. Once again, I have enjoyed working with Marie so much under her leadership and just hope to do right by this community and with all of you.

Dino Panagoulias - Good to see everyone. I want to first thank Marie for leading the community board for so many years, and I've definitely appreciated her leadership here. I want to say thank you Marie. Now, a little bit about myself. I grew up here, was born here in Astoria at Astoria General Hospital, which no longer exists. Many of you know me as a person that has had a 25-year career in education. I started my career off as a school aid. I then became a very passionate teacher. Then later worked my way up to what we call the central offices (DOE), trying to change the policies from within. There is a lot of bureaucracy in our education system, and I have tried to change that through the policies and the implementations that we've put forth. My commitment to education was brought forth by my parents, who are immigrants of Greece, came to this country and worked their behinds off to make something of their lives from a really poor portion of Greece and provide for both my sister and me. That sense of education, that sense of community service and giving back to the community was fostered by their love for education and being able to in fact give back. I started here again in the civic association space and then I think in 2019 I was brought here into the community board and so I would love to serve in the capacity of chair. I have been a member of Dutch Kills Civic Association. If you would have me to bring forth a lot of the kind of betterment of the neighborhood that we love and want to all represent. Thank you for the opportunity to serve next.

Rod Townsend -That is the conclusion of candidate speeches. You're going to receive a ballot. Circle the name that you are supporting. We're going to get those ballots out and then Andreas Migias to help me collect those ballots and we will step outside to do a quick count. If anyone wants to supervise us, they are certainly within their rights to do so, and we will do this as quickly as possible. Thank you.

Now it is my great honor as chair of the election, to announce Evie # (22) votes, Dino # (16) votes. Evie Hantzopoulos is the new Chairperson of the Board. Congratulations Evie.

Evie Hantzopoulos Chairperson -I look forward to working with all of you and thank Dino for running. (Amy Hau will return as first Vice- Chair at this time.)

Evie introduces: Presentation for ADA Compliance for 114th Police Precinct to be rescheduled.

Introduced Public Hearing Item # BSA 540-86 BZ 32-11 Newtown Avenue. Application to extend the term of a Special Permit.

Stefanie Marazi Partner Hirschen Singer & Epstein LLC and Gaven Leib Man-Dell Food Stores (presentation attached)

- It's a one-story grocery store with approximately 18,000 Square ft existing since 1951, and actually enlarged into the residence District in 1987, when the initial special permit was granted.
- Representative stated: we are now requesting once again to extend the term of the special permit and finally to remove the term limit considering this is a building that has been there for decades and we want to ensure the continued operation in the food store without having to come back for permission to maintain a commercial use in a residence District, which is what the special permit allows and show on the how the building you can see the site in red (presentation) and the outline of the building the site straddles a C42A district, which is a commercial District in which grocery stores are permitted and then towards the back away from Newtown Avenue (see attached project document).

• Representative stated: Given the constraints of our business, one of the things I've actually done of recent is reach out to DOT to add a truck loading zone on the street, totally separate from this to further facilitate traffic, and so that there's no double parking or issues, because I know it's been a priority of the city and especially do to have these neighborhood loading zones in place (see attached project document).

Q&A with the Board

Dominic Stiller asked how do you enter the loading zone? Representative responded 33rd Street behind store. Since 1989 this has been used. New loading zone would facilitate traffic on 33rd Street. Dominic Stiller asked, "What is the issue? The representative responded that a portion is in a residential zone. They independently applied for an outer loading zone to improve the situation through DOT. Dominic asked, "What if a new store opens there? The team answered they would need to apply to BSA it must specifically be a grocery Store BSA review would need to occur, and CB review would additionally happen. A use group change would need to occur otherwise. Dominic Stiller mentioned a plan several years ago requesting a public plaza and additionally posed a question of support. The Team stated they would follow the findings.

Frank Fredericks Asked about the 10-year term and any problems the Board had with removing that. Liz Erion said projects from BSA vary she does not think they necessarily specifically planned, if divided it goes to BSA and returns for review to the Board. The issue is because a portion is in the residential district zoning. If the use changes, they would need to return to BSA and the building would have to be torn down.

Committee Reports

Consumer Affairs Committee -Dino Panagoulias - Congratulations Evie. If you look at the packet that you have, there are approximately 20 businesses that are up for vote. None of them are of great concern. They have their stated stipulations. No issues brought forth by the 114th Precinct that we were made aware of. The police saw no needed actions. Thomas Ryan-Consumer Affairs sent all 20 of these to the police? Dino-Yes. I'd like to make a motion to move forward with approving all of the approximately 20 of them.

Evie Hantzopoulos Chairperson - Asked if anyone opposed? Seeing none, the motion carries.

Executive Committee - Thomas Ryan- Cannabis OCM Applications Micro- Business reviewed at committee, four locations were reviewed at 49-29 20th Avenue a mixed-use warehouse to be subdivided. Four applications for 4 opportunities to grow and one opportunity to have retail sale if approved by the Office of Cannabis Management. These new applicants for Micro Businesses attended the Committee meeting and there were concerns about the location. Nearby was a church, St. Francis of Assis, a school and residential dwelling. The committee was concerned about the operations of the four businesses a husband was a property manager of the site. The wife and three other women who know each other were applying. The ability to run a business was a concern, the four applicants wrote the same letter, had the same notary in Bronx and this just confirmed the concern about the ability to run a business Thomas Ryan read the letter. Amin Mehedi motions for a NO vote Tyrone Gardner Seconded No Vote

Dominic Stiller asks, "Is this a new business as a part of OCM? Thomas answers a new part of OCM we have voted on one before. The question is the proximity to the church, park & security.

Corine Wood-Haynes stated no voting had occurred at committee level, clarifying that the application was reviewed only.

Marie Torniali Stated we felt like they were unprepared to explain their business model. They were asked to give a narrative.

Doreen Mohamed Asked about the armed guards, then stated her concern that we are trying to take guns out of the community.

Kathleen Warnock Questioned if these locals were out of their depth? Marie answers Yes. Elizabeth Erion- Stated she watched the meeting, and they are novice in business. The 4 businesses in one building, the square footage is concerning and only one may sell retail product. We have only seen these scattered. Ehtan Lowel stated the last several meetings we have had reviews. A request for presentation needed from OCM (Office of Cannabis Management) was made.

<u>District Manger's Report Florence Koulouris:</u> Hello and good evening. Our community has lost a son of Astoria Paul Vallone at a young age and suddenly due to a heart attack. He was an advocate for Queens and most recently served in the Veterans Administration as Deputy Commissioner. He had recently provided a report to the Borough Cabinet of Queens sharing his wealth of information. He will be missed. May he rest in peace.

For the last five years our office has worked with multiple businesses that operate in the Steinway Industrial Business Zone. Our office has been the squeaky wheel. Thanks to Former Commissioner Sewell who helped create the multi-agency task force to address the needs of the Recreational Vehicle dwellers and Commissioner Caban a recent service assisted in relieving our district of the inundation of over 25 RVs. All RVs were offered NYC services.

A total of twenty (20) vehicles were removed and five (5) summonses were issued, the breakdown are as follows:

- NYPD Traffic removed four (4) illegally parked vehicles.
 - o Four (4) Mobile Home/RV
 - One (1) illegally parked passenger vehicle.
- Competition Auto Works removed four (4) illegally parked vehicles.
 - o Two (2) Mobile Home/RV
 - o Two (2) passenger vehicles.
- DSNY removed five (5) illegally parked Mobile Home/RV and one (1) dumpster.
 - o Four (4) Mobile Home/RV.
 - o One (1) Derelict vehicle
 - One (1) Waste dumpster.
- Twelve (12) Mobile Home/RV did voluntarily vacate the area.
- The 114 Precinct issued five (5) summonses to illegally parked vehicles.
 - o Three (3) for street storage
 - Two (2) for detached trailer.

Our office received a telephone call from the Deputy Commissioner of the Community Affairs Unit of the NYC Mayors Office complementing the teamwork of our office with our local agencies and businesses. The business owners have seen a marked improvement in their business operations now that this section of IBZ is operating as before the Pandemic. We received the report on January 28, 2024. Businesses are grateful to the Community Board.

Our office attended the Borough Presidents review of FY 2025 budget and reiterated the top four items on the Capital and Expense list. A mention to the Borough President regarding the sincere desire to see the DSNY QW1Garage build-out was mentioned as it is already funded.

The application process for Board Membership has closed and we will receive our list of renewed and new members late march into early April.

Legislative Updates

In response to the Governor's Executive Budget Proposal, we led two budget sign campaigns to bring additional dollars into AD30, which include a capital investment for the Ali Forney Center located in Astoria to build permanent supportive housing. The Ali Forney Center mainly serves homeless LGBTQ+ youth and provides wraparound services.

We are also working to establish a repair fund for Mitchell Lama properties. Our Mitchell Lama's are facing an affordability struggle, especially to afford repairs and make improvements. This fund would help properties address these costs without all of the burden falling on residents through maintenance fees.

We have recently introduced a number of new bills including A08586 which amends the amount of time government agencies have to respond to FOIL requests, and A08909 which requires public schools to provide halal meal options.

Student Debt Relief

The SAVE plan also ensures that ones monthly interest fee's does not pile up (as long as you make your principal payments) and that your spouse's income cannot be used to drive up your payment amount

Thank you for meeting with me regarding my proposed microbusiness. At the time of our meeting, I anticipated a Q&A style interview, rather than a narration of my proposed business plan from beginning to end. As a result of this, I was taken aback and feel this interview did not showcase my authentic frame of mind. After our meeting, I drafted this letter to inform you that I will be moving forward with security. I will have a security company evaluate and select the most appropriate security measures for the proposed location. Should it be deemed necessary, I will have armed security guards on the property. If unnecessary, then I will shy away from hiring armed security guards. The business will be monitored 24 hours a day, seven days a week with surveillance cameras.
