JOIN THE NYPD AUXILIARY POLICE

Auxiliary Police are civic-minded men and women who volunteer to assist their local Police Precincts, Housing Police Service Areas, and Transit Districts, by performing uniformed patrol in their communities. They are recruited, trained and equipped by the Police Department. They come from many diverse backgrounds and a myriad of occupations throughout the City, such as computer programmers, mechanics, merchants, nurses, security guards, school teachers, students, etc. Auxiliary Police provide extra "eyes and ears" for the Police Department by performing uniformed foot, vehicle and bicycle patrols. They are trained to observe and report conditions requiring the services of the regular police. Whenever possible, they assist in non-enforcement and non-

hazardous duties

Fallen Tree or Branch Removal Request

The City removes street trees and large branches that have fallen to the ground in front of houses, in parks, and in other public spaces. The City also removes trees or branches that are blocking sidewalks or streets, as well as branches that are cracked or hanging and about to fall. Removal may be delayed during a storm if the branches are not blocking streets or sidewalks.

Trees along streets in front of houses will be investigated and, if necessary, removed. The City also removes dead trees from parks and other public spaces.

The City is not responsible for:

- (1) Any non-City tree that falls on private property,
- (2) Any small non-City tree branch that falls on private property and
- (3) Any tree that is on private property.

Property owners must consult with a private landscape contractor to arrange for the removal of non-City trees or tree branches. Landscape contractors are listed in the yellow pages.

Property owners are responsible for knowing whether a tree is on their property or on the City's property. Trees can appear to be growing on your property but actually be on City property. Reference your title survey to verify property lines before removing a tree or conducting any tree work on or around trees in your front yard.

Environmentally Friendly Alternatives for Disposal of Leaves

Compost - Start a compost pile or add leaves to an existing one. Composting is nature's way of recycling leaves, grass clippings, and other organic materials and converting them into a valuable soil enricher that can be utilized in flower and vegetable gardens.

Mulch - By using a mulching mower, you can chop the leaves into small pieces which will decompose directly on your lawn. If the mower has a bagger, you can collect the leaf pieces and spread them around flower beds and shrubs as mulch.

Till - Decomposing leaves provide a naturally produced organic material which is healthy to lawns and gardens. To reap the benefits of this natural recycling process, till leaves directly into a garden.
