



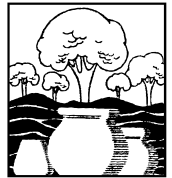

Ahsia Basdi – Director of Public Engagement from the New York State Independent Redistricting Commission

This is the fruition of the 2014 Ballot Amendment to create a fair open process to redraw district lines for the district in Congress, State Senate, State Assembly. These are the only districts we are paying attention to. There are 10 Commissioners, four appointed by the Republican legislature, four appointed by the Democratic legislature and 2 chosen by the other 8 appointees. They all have extensive have experience in New York State Communities as well as voting rights. More about them on their bios on our website.

They are tasked with several things:

- *To submit draft plans to the public for comment on September 15, which they did.*
- *Now we are on to public comment hearings. Where we will have twelve public hearings that are mandated. The City has added two extras for a total of fourteen hearings. Where the hearing are being held is mandated: one in Queens; one in Brooklyn; one in Staten Island. We are starting in Buffalo next week on October 20th and go through ending in Suffix and Nassau County on November 26th. The Queens meeting will be on November 17th.*
- *The final maps will be submitted to the legislature in early January. The Commissioners were waiting for Census Data usually gets released in April. It didn't get released in August. While waiting for that they held a virtual listening tour in July/August across the state. Had 300 speak at the listening tours. You can watch the recording on the youtube channel.*
- *You can click on participate on our website. You must register on the website in order to submit those comments. If anyone is having trouble with the website, e-mail Ahsia.*

That is, it, I wanted to let you know about the process and ask for your help in getting the word out. They would like as much public comment as possible. If someone is not comfortable in speaking in a public hearing, they can send a simple map or comments they would like to see. Eric Arnum – Forest Hills Green Team

One of the major activities that the Forest Hills Green Team restarted is composting of food scraps here in Forest Hills. Through a partnership with the Queens Botanical Gardens. Every Sunday from 10-1pm, a tent is set up in McDonald Park and we collect food scraps from people visiting the Farmers Market. We started with one big can and had to go to two because they all filled up. Last Sunday, we had over 200 people come by to drop off food scraps.

This Sunday we will be giving out free small bags of processed compost for people to use in their own gardens. I wanted to suggest to all of you, if you want to collect food scraps at home, call 311 and request a brown bin from the City. We think that is the only way to get curbside collections going locally is to demonstrate a major need in this neighborhood. Which of course you will do calling 311 and ask for a brown bin.

Sunday, October 24th we are planning a volunteer recognitions event in the park at the compost site to acknowledge all of our volunteers.

On Yellowstone Blvd. under the railroad bridge next to the Police Station we continue to plant flowers and shrubs in an effort to beautify otherwise blighted area with a lot of pedestrian traffic.

Last month we rescued some plants from Stuyvesant Cove Park in the City, and we planted them there. Soon we will be planting some daffodil bulbs we recently acquired as well as more shrubs. We have reached out to a number of local colleges in an attempt to intern to help us with our social media. To also organize our membership data base and to coordinate with our other environmental groups to promote legislation to address climate change. Chris Wong – Deputy Center Manager at Lost Battalion Hall

We are part of the Parks Recreation Centers we are located at 93-29 Queens Boulevard. They have fully opened up with some restrictions but not anything too crazy. We are promoting a free membership if you register by December 31st. Come in and show your full vaccination card. You must be vaccinated for two weeks. Have ID and we will make you a membership card. Good for one year.

We have opened up some programs:

- Tot time program Tuesdays and Thursdays from 10:00am – 12:30pm for children 8 months to 3 years old.
- On Saturday nights we opened a program for the teens from 4pm – 8pm for 12-18 years old. Offering different sports every weekend. Doing art workshops. Different programs every weekend during that time.
- We are offering different sports classes right now to all ages, a lot of adult programs. Such as pickle ball, basketball, badminton, and table tennis.

Ari Feldman – This comment was submitted last month but wasn't read in error. It was included in our minutes from last month.

- *My name is Ari Feldman and I'm a parent of two children, one who is school-age. I'm writing to express my concern about the safety of the schools in our community. As a parent of a kindergartener, I was shocked to find out that my child would not have testing in her class at all this year. Despite the fact that the COVID positivity rate for 5-12 year olds was the highest of any age group, almost double that of adults, my daughter and her peers will not be tested, because testing starts at first grade.*
- *The protocols that have been set for this year are designed with last year's variant in mind. The Delta variant has a hospitalization rate for 5-17 year olds that is almost as high as the rest of the population, ten times higher at the start of school than it was at the same time last year. And yet, the mayor insists on continuing to loosen testing practices in schools. While I appreciate that the unions convinced him to start testing weekly instead of biweekly, at the same time, he essentially made contact tracing non-existent. The rule now is that if a student had a mask on and was at least three feet away, they do not have to quarantine. They say this is in alignment with CDC recommendations, but the CDC maintains that a person should quarantine if they were within 6 feet regardless of vaccine status or mask habit. Teachers cannot be expected to remember whether every single student consistently wore their masks and were at least 3 feet away.*
- *What many may not realize is that limiting the quarantine rules also limits the information we receive. Not being required to quarantine means you're not a suspected contact. If a person is not a suspected contact, they will not get a call. That means that for my child, not only will there not be random testing, we will not be alerted of a confirmed positive case in my daughter's classroom. I can't even get her tested out of precaution, because I won't be informed. It seems that the mayor is out to make himself look good, rather than ensure the safety of our children. With fewer students traced, there will be fewer tested and lower case numbers, so he can tell everyone that those victory concerts were not inappropriately timed for a spike in cases, because the numbers are low.*
- *I know that the Community Board has no direct power to intervene, but I wanted to present this information to the community for everyone's awareness. I'll be writing a letter and asking the Education, Library, and Youth Committee to circulate it to elected officials. People have been speaking out about these issues, but the mayor does not appear to be listening. In addition to testing, one of the biggest steps the DOE could take to limit the spread is to create a remote option for those who want it. Not only would families be able to keep their children at home in environments they can control, but those who choose to be in person will be safer, because it will be easier to socially distance, which is especially important in Queens, the most overcrowded borough and in our own neighborhood that has many schools operating above capacity. Creating a remote option will also make it easier for students when they have to inevitably quarantine. Unless an entire class is closed, students will only have work sent home and office hours for a few hours a week. More than half of city council members have signed Education Committee Chair Mark Treyger's letter calling for a remote option, including our own CM Koslowitz. Senators Liu and Jackson have also crafted state legislation that would mandate NYC offer a remote option. Safety should be our number one concern for our children and unfortunately the mayor would rather play politics than keep our children safe.*

NYPD – 112TH PRECINCT

Captain Cappelmann announced that there is an upcoming Police Exam on December 15, 2021 and the enrollment period is open until November 3rd. The exam is free. The Police Department is doing a drive for recruitment. If you know anyone who is interested in joining the Police Force go to www.nypdrecruit.com or www.nyc.gov/oasys.

Captain Cappelmann reported that crime is up 5% since last year, which equates to about 23 crimes or a half a crime per week. Grand Larcenies are driving this up this year. These are mostly shoplifting. This is due to more stores opening up from COVID and more people in the stores. Felony assaults are up this year, primarily because of domestic related incidents. Robberies are down significantly 30%.

Grand Larceny auto has continued to spike over the last six weeks. It is attributed to a combination of things:

- A lot of motorcycles being stolen off the street
- About 40% of the cars that were stolen in the confines of the 112 Pct this year were left running or key in the car. If there is a spare key or key fob in there, they will just hit the button, get in the car and drive away. That means that someone who is looking to steal from your car is now stealing your car. Don't leave valuables in the car, lock your doors and close your windows, park in a well-lit area.

Alexa asked the Captain to send the stats to the Community Board. The Captain replied that all that the information is on-line, and he will send it.

MINUTES

CHAIR'S REPORT

Chair Alexa Weitzman thanked everyone that reached out following the death in her family and thanked everyone for pitching in while she was spending time with her family. She thanked Heather Dimitriadis and Frank Gulluscio and the entire board for putting the budget requests together.

Chair Weitzman also thanked Peter Beadle for attending the Borough Board meeting on her behalf. There was a vote for the Open Streets Text Amendment. We voted in favor of it, but the final Borough Board vote was 6 Yes and 7 No. That meeting is on the Borough President's YouTube page if you want to watch it.

Chair Weitzman asked the board to think about what they want to do and bring to the table in the coming months (in terms of activities on the board, your participation, ideas, and collaboration) because we are ready to get the work done. She is excited to hear from the board members about what they are excited to do on this board.

Last, Chair Weitzman also reminded everyone that DFTA My Ride applications are still open for another week. Community Board 6 has the most applications in Queens so far.

DISTRICT MANAGER’S REPORT

District Manager Frank Gulluscio thanked Heather, Mark, Bruce, all the chairs for working on the capital and expense budget. We are strictly advisory. We don’t have a checkbook to influence the City Council or our elected officials with, but we make our priorities known.

Mr. Gulluscio announced that we have received certification for 98-81 Queens Boulevard. We have 60 days to hold a public hearing and vote. On November 3, there will be a committee meeting and then a public hearing regarding this.
