#### **Roland Meier**

My name is Roland Meier, I am a resident of FH since 1977. My wife Ellen is a FH native who went to PS 101, like our three children we have been privileged to raised here. Both Ellen and I are volunteers in neighborhood organizations.

My subject refers to GOOD AND WELFARE OF THE CB 6 DISTRICT.

I would like to ask for your guidance and support, not only of the upcoming votes of NY Assembly Bill A5375 and NY Senate Bill S1113 eliminating the use of gas-powered leaf blowers from May 1- Sep 13, but how we can work to mitigate the health hazards caused by these devices who severely impact the quality of life in our communities.

I am working from home and have been a victim of constant gas leaf blower noise, fumes, and dust for the past 12 years. Now, with Covid, and many more residents working and studying from home, there is a growing number of neighbors who share my experience and frustration.

Whereas leaf blowers have initially been used only for spring cleanup and fall leave removal, these devices are now used constantly from March to December. With probably 90% of homeowners contracting with landscape companies we are subjected to 80+ decibel noise basically 6 to 7 days a week from 8am to 7pm. As a result,

- It is difficult to concentrate on our work
- We must close our windows to reduce the noise and avoid the dust & toxic fumes
- We cannot engage in telephone calls and zoom meetings unless hiding in the basement
- We cannot enjoy the outdoors or our backyard
- Students doing their classes from home cannot concentrate and are unable to hear what a teacher is saying. The toxic pollution caused by gas leaf blowers have a major impact on climate change.
- According to the CA Air Resources board, 1 hour use produces the same amount of air pollution as driving a Toyota Camry 1,100 miles, the distance from New York to Orlando.

In fact, the agency estimated that in the early 2020s, pollution from leaf blowers and lawn mowers would surpass pollution from passenger cars in Southern California, as newer, more efficient cars hit the road.

• According to the EPA, they produce 300X more asthma-inducing, smog-causing pollutants than a pickup truck.

At this time over 30 States and close to 400 municipalities have recognized the huge drawbacks to gas leaf blowers and implemented restrictions and the number is increasing. For example:

Effective April 01, 2021, the city of Oakland, CA (Pop. 440,000) bans the use of leaf blowers, chainsaws, mowers, trimmers, and other lawn equipment that rely on combustion engines citing health and climate change concerns.

Effective January 01, 2022 Washington D.C. (Pop. 715,000) bans the sale and use of gas-powered leaf blowers Effective January 01, 2019, Palm Springs, CA prohibited the use of gasoline-powered leaf blowers to improve air quality and reduce noise pollution. Additionally, the ordinance prohibits blowing of leaves and debris into the street or onto adjacent properties. In the meantime, the landscaping industry has adjusted with more environmentally friendly practices using brooms, rakes, and battery powered blowers. Where bans are in place, landscaping companies are still in business and prices have not increased.

The current Assembly & Senate Bills are our local solution:

PURPOSE OR GENERAL IDEA OF BILL: To prohibit the use of gas-powered leaf and lawn blowers from May first and September thirtieth. This bill aims to cut down on the careless usage of leaf blowers by restricting its usage as a landscaping tool in the non-fall months.

I addition to creating an awareness within CB6, I would like to close with two questions:

- a) How can we help and work with you to give your support to Assembly Bill A5375 and Senate Bill S113 which seek to regulate the use of leaf blowers?
- b) How can you help us diminish the impact of these machines on our quality of life? Thank you.

Chair Weitzman expressed to the Board that all public comments are taken seriously and are followed up with personal emails from the Chair and/or various committee chairs.

#### **MINUTES**

The minutes of February 10, 2021 were accepted as written.

#### **CHAIR'S REPORT**

Chair Alexa Weitzman took a few minutes to acknowledge that this is the anniversary of our last in person meeting. She acknowledged those that we lost in our community to COVID. There have been 752,000 COVID cases in New York City and approximately 29,000 deaths. In addition, she mentioned the rising hate crimes against Asians / Asian Americans. Queens CB 6 takes this very seriously and stands with these individuals. As part of its Diversity, Education and Community Engagement Committee, CB 6 will be looking into ways to address this further. Chair Weitzman welcomes feedback regarding how the Community Board can help with these issues and make this community better and more accepting.

Chair Alexa Weitzman asked everyone to remember CB 6 Members: Dr. Karl Newman, Christopher Collett and Joseph Hennessy as well as all the members of the community that were lost this year with a moment of silence.

Chair Weitzman mentioned that an Ad Hoc Committee (Diversity, Education and Community Engagement) was formed with Tania Padgett as the Chair and Kevin Ly as the Co-Chair. If any Board Members are interested in taking part, they can let her know.

Chair Weitzman acknowledged the following CB Members that will not be renewing their CB Membership this year and thanked them for their service: Naomi Altman, Soumaly King, Norman Leibowitz, Gloria Ferreras, Jeremy Golant. There have been over 50 people that have applied to be on the board this year. The Executive Committee will be taking a look at the role of the public members on Committees.

Chair Weitzman reminded everyone that there is now a google calendar on our CB 6 website, <a href="www.nyc.gov/cb6q">www.nyc.gov/cb6q</a>. This will contain all the links to sign up for meetings and events. Also, you can subscribe to the calendar and the CB events will show up on your google

calendar. Also, Alexa reminded everyone that David Schneier is working on a proclamation about COVID. If you want to work with David on this, please reach out via the office.

Last, Chair Weitzman thanked the Board Members and the CB 6 Staff for all the work they do.

#### **DISTRICT MANAGER'S REPORT**

District Manager Frank Gulluscio announced that there are about 10 openings on CB 6, so if you don't get on the board this year, don't get discouraged because you can still participate in our community.

DM Gulluscio announced that he participated in a rally at Borough Hall regarding the hate going on in our community with Asian Americans.

As a follow up on legislation that Frank spoke about last month with respect to Zoning that was introduced by Speaker Johnson, this isn't being voted on at this time.

District Manager Gulluscio mentioned Conflicts of Interest. This is to ensure that "public servants do not use or appear to use your public position to benefit your private interest, those of your family or associates". If you are unsure if a situation is a conflict of interest, we can find out.

District Manager Gulluscio announced that the status of further budget cuts is unknown at this time. We are waiting for more information following the city and state budget.

Last, DM Gulluscio announced that York College is a great location to get a COVID Vaccine. He mentioned that 18% of Queens residents have received their first dose. Also, they are hiring individuals to work at Vaccine locations. There are a lot of different jobs there, not just those administering the vaccines.

#### **ELECTION TO FILL VACANCY FOR VICE CHAIR-SECRETARY**

Kevin Ly nominated Mark Laster. Peter Beadle seconded the nomination.

There were no other nominations.

Secretary cast one ballot for Mark Laster as Vice Chair-Secretary.

Chair Newton explained that right now, street fairs are not allowed due to COVID but the city doesn't know if this will be extended past 3-31-21. Therefore, we are voting on these items but also waiting on further guidance from the city and the Street Activity Permit Office.

There was a lot of discussion amongst Community Board Members regarding holding these street fairs while we are still dealing with COVID in our city. Some CB Members felt that these events should be held until after June 1. In addition, there were some concerns regarding the Queens Boulevard Festival on July 18, 2021 since it is a religious observance day.

A motion to approve these events passed on a roll call vote. The votes are listed below:

Elizabeth also reported that her committee has been working on a Small Business Informational Webinar to show our support for small businesses. There will be guest speakers addressing grants, loans, free legal services, marketing tips, technology etc). Also, there will be some small business owners speaking about their experiences and ask questions. It will be held on March 16, 2021 6:30pm via Zoom.

#### TRANSPORTATION AND PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE REPORT

Alejandra Diaz-Houston, Co-Chair, reported that the committee met on February 18, 2021. The committee discussed the following:

- Budget Requests

- Alderton Street There is a subcommittee that is conducting a community input survey. More details will be provided as they are available.
- Bike Rack locations
- Sidewalk construction permits and repairs with respect to the lack of transparency to adjacent homeowners. The committee is working on a letter and some recommendations.

The next meeting will be Thursday March 18, 2021. Among other agenda items, there will be a presentation on Open Streets by Jim Burke from the 34<sup>th</sup> Avenue Open Streets Coalition to discuss how they have been successful and how we can support our open street participants.

#### LAND USE AND HOUSING COMMITTEE REPORT

Prameet Kumar, Chair, reported that the committee met on March 1, 2021. The applicant's representative attended the committee meeting. The owner wasn't aware that a Physical Culture Permit was required. Once the owner became aware, he filed for this permit. The committee motion (passed unanimously in committee) is to approve. This motion passed on a voice vote (34 Yes, 1 No, 1 Abstain)

Prameet also spoke about reaching out to BSA to see if there is a way for the CB to help inform businesses when they require these types of permits.

## EDUCATION, LIBRARY AND YOUTH COMMITTEE REPORT

Heather Dimitriadis, Chair, reported the following:

#### Libraries:

Rego Park Library: Project is moving forward. Artists Selection took place on 2-23. There was a walkthrough that took place on 2-26. We are waiting for the Library to let us know when they can come and make a presentation to the Community Board. Ms. Dimitriadis showed photo renderings of the design of the library. The completion is slated for Spring 2025.

#### Education:

Middle schools opened on February 25, 2021 and High Schools are slated to open on March 22, 2021. When high schools open, they are opening to students that signed up for hybrid / blended learning. Those that signed up to be remote only will remain remote. There is a possibility that there will be another window where parents can switch back to hybrid or remote, but this hasn't been determined yet. School closures change on a day to day basis. You can check the DOE website for up to date information, including parochial schools and

daycares.

There is a new schools Chancellor, Meisha Ross Porter, a District 28 student and a teacher, principal, and executive superintendent.

The CB made a statement to the CEC regarding the number of expansions that are taking away space from local parks / play space.

## DIVERSITY, EDUCATION AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT (DECE) REPORT

Kevin Ly, Co-Chair, reported that the committee drafted a mission statement that will be shared soon but the committee is dedicated to creating a more inclusive and safer community through education, civic engagement, and community partnerships. One of the first things the committee would like to do is make a list of resources for anti-hate, anti-profiling (advocacy groups, non-profits, city government, etc). The goal of this list is to make it available for CB members and members of the public. If anyone has any suggestions, please email them to the CB office.

Kevin also reported that he is a delegate to the Queens General Assembly, and they are planning a Hate Crime Forum in conjunction with Queens Borough Hall on May 25, 2021. He feels that there are a lot of overlapping themes between the Queens General Assembly and the CB's DECE Committee.

Kevin announced that this committee consists of CB Members and Members of the Public.

Last, Mr. Ly followed up on earlier comments about the Asian American community by stating that the Committee will be inviting local community groups that represent Asian Americans to discuss their concerns.

## AGING / SOCIAL SERVICES / DISABILITIES COMMITTEE REPORT

Mark Laster, Co-Chair, reported that the committee met on Monday March 8. The committee will have a series of presentations regarding COVID-19. The next presentation will be on Monday March 15, 2021 regarding Elder Abuse and Elder Fraud. There will be guest speakers from the Queens DA's office and the Elder Abuse Council. On April 26, there will be a presentation on disability etiquette. If you have any issues or questions that you would like to see addressed, you can send to the CB Office. Last, there will be a May Presentation on Coping with Post-COVID-19.

The committee also created 2 sub-committees for the following:

- o Directory of community resources
- O Design a questionnaire to community about what issues are important and should be taken up by the committee

The committee will meet on Monday April 12, 2021.

#### **COVID UPDATE**

Dr. Karl Newman has been attending meetings regarding the COVID vaccine and other COVID related topics and would report back monthly. Since Dr. Newmann's passing, if there is someone on the board that has an interest in the medical field and would like to take this over, please reach out to Alexa.

#### **GOOD & WELFARE**

Board Member Jean Silva emailed the following statement to be read by Chair Alexa Weitzman and put into the minutes:

I have been on the board for over eight years now and have never had so much confusion come from the chair and the executive committee. The lack of respect for Frank, Christine and staff for all the hard work they have done over the years is incredible.

The email put out on Feb 8, 2021, was a put down to Joe Hennessey & the many years he was Chair of CR#6

Giving the Parks Chair a protocol for how to run a Committee is a personal insult.

You have been on the board for four years now, two years as a board member and chair 2 years as chair. You really don't have the understanding or knowledge to run a Chair

In my opinion and seeing how many of our Board members are leaving us this year I'm not alone in the above statement.

There was much discussion regarding this. It was decided that this isn't the place to discuss this type of issue and if anyone wanted to continue the conversation, it could be done in a more private setting thinking about how we can move forward with the betterment of the community at the root of our action.

Mark Laster announced that the FH Green Team, reached an agreement with the Parks Department to start composting at Macdonald Park. They will be partnering with the Queens Botanical Gardens and the Friends of Macdonald Park.

Brendan Griffith announced that on March 25, 2021 at 6:00pm, the NYC Central Labor Council, Workers United SEIU and the Remember the Triangle Fire Coalition will be holding a Commemorative Event to honor the 146 immigrant women that died in the Triangle Shirtwaist Fire.

Edwin Wong announced that the FH Asian Association will be working on different projects in the Community to being awareness to the Anti-Asian sentiment that is taking place in our city.

#### MAYOR'S COMMUNITY AFFAIRS UNIT

Jessica Schabowski announced the following:

- Over the past weekend 100,000 New Yorkers were vaccinated. We have the capacity for 500,000 dosages per week, but the city doesn't have the supply. However, now that the Johnson and Johnson Vaccine was approved, the city expects an increase over the next few weeks. The best vaccine to take at this time, is the one that is available to you.
- NY continues to track variants more than any other city
- DFTA has been identifying homebound individuals to get them vaccinated. These vaccines are being done by FDNY.
- Sunday March 14 will be COVID-19 Day of Remembrance. If you lost someone you to COVID-19, you can share their name and photo to be displayed during the event.
- Vaccine for all Corp is hiring individuals to assist with the Vaccine effort. There are clinical roles as well as support and administrative roles.

#### NYS SENATOR JOSEPH P. ADDABBO JR.

Sarah Spellman announced the following:

- The month of March, all offices are drop off locations for E-Waste Recycling
- On April 6, there will be a Virtual Event with DCAS regarding Civil Service Jobs
- Happy to co-host the Small Business Webinar with CB 6

### ASSEMBLY MEMBER DANIEL ROSENTHAL

Ricky Malone announced the following:

- Assemblyman Rosenthal is working on a bill to provide greater transparency in Ranked Choice Voting
- Assemblyman Rosenthal is happy to head the Task Force on Food, Farm & Nutrition Policy and increase the Nourish New York Program. This will save farms and bring food to people in NY that need it.

#### COUNCIL MEMBER KAREN KOSLOWITZ

Michael Cohen spoke briefly about the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory. He also spoke about changes to 2 zoning applications that the Community Board voted on. In December, the city abrogated the AIRS Senior Affordable Housing Program. This will affect the following applications: 91-32 63<sup>rd</sup> Drive and 68-19 Woodhaven Boulevard. The number of units were reduced and therefore the number of affordable units would also have to be reduced. The Council Member pushed for the developer to keep to their promise of increased affordable housing.

#### ASSEMBLY MEMBER ANDREW HEVESI

Michael Carlier announced that the Assemblyman is working on the following:

- Assembly Bill 3146 - Recalculation of Empire State Child Tax Credit

- Assembly Bill 4109 Relates to providing support and services for youth suffering from adverse childhood experiences (ACE's), which have increased since the pandemic and lockdown. He would also like to bring awareness to ACE's
- Rent Supplements

Assemblyman Hevesi is continuing weekly mask giveaways on Sundays at the FH Greenmarket.

#### NYC COMPTROLLER SCOTT STRINGER

Haris Khan introduced Katrina Asante, Director of Community Affairs and announced the following:

- MWBE University Series: M/WBE University Series is designed to expand access and opportunities for minority and women-owned business enterprises (M/WBEs) seeking to do business with the City. MWBE University is a year-long series of workshops designed to help MWBEs get certified with the City, navigate the procurement process, and gain access City contracts.
- Budget Season: Comptroller Stringer is highlighting immediate needs for residents and overspending from agencies
