Updates from Board Members

- Second Vice Chair and Transit Committee Chair, Warren Schreiber provided some updates from
 his committee meeting with Transportation Chair, Nicholas Corrado on February 26, 2020.
 The committee meeting was held in conjunction with the Metropolitan Transportation Authority to
 discuss the Queens Bus Network Redesign proposal. There was strong presence from the public at
 the committee meeting. Unfortunately, the MTA was unable to answer a lot of questions and
 concerns from the public. Chair Schreiber is hoping to schedule another meeting to address
 these concerns.
- Chairman Eugene Kelty announced, a feedback form on the draft proposal of the Queens Bus Redesign was distributed this evening. The form can be completed and submitted to the board's office in addition to the MTA. Feedback can also be completed online at new.mta.info/queensbusredesign.
- The Chairman thanked the Department of Sanitation for providing Community Board #7 with reusable shopping bags to be distributed to the public tonight. Public Safety Chair, Joseph Sweeney provided reusable shopping bags with the board's office logo to local libraries, civic organizations and the 109 Precinct.
- The Chairman spoke on behalf of new Environmental Health Chair, Phil Konigsberg who was not present. Mr. Konigsberg is very concerned with the Coronavirus pandemic. He requested to have a representative from NY-Presbyterian Hospital to speak on the Coronavirus; however, since the virus is a governmental issue, hospital personnel cannot discuss the virus at our hearing. NY-Presbyterian Hospital provided a website link for general information on the virus to alleviate resident concerns. District Manager, Marilyn McAndrews printed frequently asked questions on COVID-19 from the hospital's website and from the Department of Health's website which was disseminated to all board members and the public tonight.
- A list of the Board's Standing Committees for Year 2020 was distributed to all board members. Some members were reassigned to other committees by the Chairman. The Committee Chair of the Land Use/Zoning Committee and the Chair of the Parks and Recreation Committee will assign additional members as needed. No additional members were assigned to the Transportation and Transit Committees because of capacity limits.
- Chairman Kelty announced, the Office of Management and Budget requires approval from the board when there is a request from the board's office to change staff hours. There was an addendum to the agenda for a vote on an increase in staff hours as needed from part time to full time. The Chairman asked the Executive Committee and Legal Committee to review the by-laws of Community Board #7 and to amend the by-laws to require voting only from the board on the hiring of the District Manager. Office hiring or a change in office staff hours will be at the discretion of the District Manager with approval from the Chairman.

A Message from Our Elected Officials

Sharon Lee, **Acting Queens Borough President** spoke. Next month, Queens will have a new Borough President. The election for Borough President is March 24, 2020. It is a non partisan election. Early voting starts March 14th. She encouraged everyone to vote for upcoming elections. The Census count begins March 12th and urged the public to participate. It was an honor for Ms. Lee to serve and was thankful for the opportunity.

Mabel Tso, Case Worker & Field Representative from the Office of Congresswoman Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez provided some updates. The office is hosting a virtual Town Hall Meeting on Saturday, March 14, 2020 from 2:00 P.M. to 4:00 P.M. The last meeting was in February at the Louis Armstrong Building in East Elmhurst. The U.S. Census Bureau participated in a discussion on how people are often under counted. Positions are also available at the census. Representatives from the **Census Bureau** are present this evening to respond to questions about the census and employment opportunities. Beginning **March 12, 2020**, residents will receive notification by mail to self-report. For more information contact 2020Census.gov. In reference to legislation, last week the office voted to enhance the security operations of Transportation Security Administration (TSA) workers. The legislation was created to ensure TSA workers have the same protection as federal workers under Title 7 of the U.S. Code. In response to COVID-19, the City will provide relief for small businesses across the City due to a reduction in revenue because of COVID-19. Businesses with fewer than 100 employees who have seen sales decrease 25% or more will be eligible for zero interest loans of up \$75,000 to help mitigate losses in profit. Questions from the Floor

Q. Barbara McHugh asked, "Where is the Town Hall meeting on March 14th held?"

A. Mabel Tso responded, "The meeting will be available remotely through a web link from 2:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. Constituents must contact the office to retrieve the link."

Q. Linna Yu, asked, "How do I obtain the newsletter?"

A. Mabel Tso responded, "You can sign up for the newsletter with me."

Q. Kevin Shields, "When is Congresswoman Ocasio-Cortez coming to Community Board #7 public hearing?"

A. Mabel Tso responded, "I will extend the invitation to her."

Chairman Kelty added, "All of our elected officials are always welcomed to speak at our public hearing." In addition, Committee Chairs are to call the office if they want an elected official to speak on a topic which will be brought to our constituents at CB#7's public hearing. The Chairman also reminded the public, **March 24**th is the election for Queens Borough President.

Public Hearings

BSA Cal. No. 2019-292-BZ- 41-62 Bowne Street, Flushing - Applicant seeks special

permit required pursuant to NYC ZR Section 73-66 to allow as-of-right building, FAA height approved, mixed use, multi-story residential and retail development at above address within flight obstruction area of LaGuardia Airport. The Height is permissible in the zoning district; however, requires a BSA special permit in that it exceeds limit in flight obstruction area per ZR-61-20/21.

Committee Chair, Rev. Richard McEachern introduced council, **Mitchell Ross** for the applicant. Mitchell Ross discussed the following: The zoning resolution requires the Board of Standards and Appeals to confirm the building is below the safe height determined by the Federal Aeronautics Administration. The building designed is a four-story building with 94 apartments and is below the FAA level. Other than confirmation of height, the building is as-of-right.

Chairman Kelty Opened the Floor for Questions

Q. Selma Moses asked, "Is the building going to exceed the FAA limit?"

A. Mitchell Ross responded, "The building will not."

Q. Chairman Kelty asked, "Why is it under the FAA jurisdiction?"

A. Mitchell Ross responded, "The building is in an approach and circle flight path of LaGuardia Airport and depending where the building is within the path, there is a height restriction determined by the FAA."

Chairman Kelty reinforced to the board, the building is in a flight path; therefore, the applicant must come before the board for a hearing.

Q. Selma Moses asked, "If the building is under the height restriction, why is a hearing required?"

A. Mitchell Ross responded, "Under the zoning, the height of the building can go up to 156 ft. however, a bulkhead has to be put in which is an additional 10 ft. The FAA states the building cannot exceed a height of 163 ft. The BSA requires under the zoning to confirm the height. The application comes to the board because all BSA applications come to the board for review and a public hearing.

Q. First Vice Chair Charles Apelian asked, "Is the height of 163 ft. above ground or above sea level?"

A. Mitchell Ross responded, "The height is above ground."

Q. First Vice Chair Charles Apelian asked, "Do you have letters from the FAA and NY Port Authority?"

A. Mitchell Ross responded, "Yes, we do."

Chairman Kelty commented, "In the past, the FAA and NY Port Authority do not always agree; therefore, the board requests letters from both agencies. The FAA determined **No Hazard to Air Navigation** and the Port Authority of NY & NJ had **no additional comments** to the FAA's determination of No Hazard to Air Navigation. Q. John Tsavalos asked, "What is the zoning?"

A. Mitchell Ross responded, "R7, C1."

Q. Arlene Fleishman asked, "What is a bulkhead?"

A. Mitchell Ross responded, "It is where the elevator and stairs end."

Committee Chair, Rev. Richard McEachern closed the hearing. The Committee met on **February 4**, **2020.** The Committee made a motion to approve the application. The **vote unanimously passed in favor** with a **Vote of (4) for Approval**. The applicant met all the requirements.

Chairman Kelty repeated the motion made by the Committee to the board members to approve the application. The motion was **seconded by Pablo Hernandez**.

No Discussion on the Motion.

A roll call vote was taken resulting in 32 for Approval. The motion carried.

BSA Cal. No. 2019-282 to 2019-291 A– 18-26 to 18-50 Bay Lane, Bayside (West side of 212th St. between 23rd Ave. and 18th Ave.)– Proposed site with 33 two-family townhouses, which ten are subject to instant appeals on the existing lot 102 and to be apportioned into new tax lots (to comprise a single zoning lot). The site will also include a proposed private road to be known as Bay Lane within the development site and conform to requirements of an R5 zoning district with a FAR of 0.75.

Committee Chair, Paul Rifino provided some background information on the **Land Use Committee Meeting** which met on **January 23, 2020**. The Committee made a motion to approve the application with six conditions agreed by Cord Meyer Development Company. The vote unanimously passed in favor with a Vote of (9) for Approval.

Chair Paul Rifino introduced the applicant's attorney, Adam Rothkrug (Rothkrug Rothkrug & Spector, LLC) to present the application. The applicant/property owner is Cord Meyer Development Company. Ten two-family townhouses located in the middle of the development do not front on a legally mapped street. The application is pending because the NYC Department of Buildings determined the ten townhouses should go to the Board of Standards and Appeals. The NYC Fire Department, Bureau of Operations approved the site plan. The development was a result of negotiations between Bell Apartments Owners Corp., Councilman Paul Vallone and the local community. After meeting with Paul Vallone, Transit Chair Warren Schreiber and Paul Rifino, a list of items was established to address the concerns of the community since the development is under construction. The biggest concern was school safety since the elementary school PS 169Q Bay Terrace is located within the development.

Cord Meyer Development Company is a local resident and owner of Bay Terrace Shopping Center. In response to community concerns and the Land Use Committee Meeting, Cord Meyer **Development Company agreed** to the following to limit egress from the development:

- "Left Turn Only" and "Right Turn Only" signage to avoid traffic directly in front of the school. Signs will be placed at the two exits from Bay Lane onto 212th Street, limiting cars to left turns (toward 18th Ave.) or right turns (toward 23rd Ave.) during school drop-off (7:00 a.m. to 8:00 a.m.) and pick-up (3:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m.) hours.
- 2. Private Security- In addition to making sure the community and residents of the development are aware of the traffic patterns, the applicant agreed to have a security guard. A private security officer will be posted within the development during the drop-off and pick-up hours to supervise drivers exiting Bay Lane, aid in student safety and assist in compliance with turn signage. The security guard will be posted for a minimum of 6 months after the development reaches 60% occupancy. If necessary, a guard will be posted longer.
- 3. **Restricted Hours for Private Sanitation-** Homeowners Association (HOA) and the declaration of maintenance for Bay Lane required by the Board of Standards and Appeals restrict sanitation pick-up during school pick-up and drop-off hours.
- 4. **Bay Terrace Teacher Parking-** As agreed with the school, Cord Meyer Development Company will continue to make parking available for teachers in the Bay Terrace Shopping Center during school hours. Parking permits will be available at Cord Meyer's office in Bay Terrace.
- 5. 18th Avenue Exit- Cord Meyer will review the possibility of obtaining approval from the Department of Buildings to allow the houses fronting on 18th Avenue to exit directly onto 18th Avenue. The reconfiguration is dependent upon removal of the MTA bus stop at the corner of 18th Avenue and 212th Street.
- 6. New School Drop-off Access from 23rd Avenue.

As part of Cord Meyer's practice, the company will continue to make capital commitments in support of the local community.

A new traffic light was installed at 212th Street which is located midway between the entrance to the development however, the traffic control was not part of the site plan.

Questions from the Floor

Q. Second Vice Chair Warren Schreiber asked, "How does the new traffic light impact the egress of the development?"

A. Adam Rothkrug responded, "Hopefully it is improving the traffic flow. It should help drivers follow the turning direction. This is not a large development; though, as-of-right 200 apartments could have been built. Cord Meyer and the community felt, two-family houses were more appropriate and desirable. Cord Meyer also feels the development will be an asset.

Q. Selma Moses asked, "Was Samuel Field Y located in Bay Terrace taken into consideration; since it offers preschool, summer camp programs and a pool club?"

A. Adam Rothkrug responded, "Overall school safety was taken into consideration in constructing the development. Reducing the number of townhouses built, along with traffic control and limited access at 212th Street provides safety around the development."

Q. Richard Forman asked, "The egress on Bay Lane will be left and right turns?"

A. Adam Rothkrug responded, "Yes, but limited during school hours."

Q. Richard Forman asked, "Do the 10 townhouses face 212th Street?"

A. Adam Rothkrug responded, "No, they are inside and face Bay Lane."

Q. Selma Moses asked, "What is the cost of a townhouse?"

A. Adam Rothkrug responded, "I do not have an answer; since marketing has not officially started."

Q. Pablo Hernandez asked, "How are the restricted hours going to be communicated to the residents?"

A. Adam Rothkrug responded, "It will be included in the by-laws of the Homeowners Association (HOA) regulations."

Q. Arlene Fleishman asked, "Has Cord Meyer communicated with the school principal?"

A. Adam Rothkrug responded, "Yes."

Q. Arlene Fleishman asked, "When there are buses during the day, will private security be considered at other times in addition to school drop-off and pick-up hours?"

A. Adam Rothkrug responded, "Private security services will be provided during staggered school hours during admission and dismissal for all class grades."

Q. Arlene Fleishman asked, "Is this commitment in writing?"

A. Adam Rothkrug responded, "Yes, a letter was submitted and signed by Cord Meyer Development to Community Board #7."

Q. Matthew Silverstein asked, "Will Cord Meyer Development improve the drop-off and pick-up location?"

A. Adam Rothkrug responded, "Cord Meyer Development agreed to assist with the schools."

Chairman Kelty expressed his concern of meetings being held without including the Department of Transportation who should be included in the development stage process.

Q. Chairman Kelty asked, "Is there affordable housing?"

A. Adam Rothkrug responded, "If we were rezoning from manufacturing to residential then it would be required to have affordable housing."

Q. Chairman Kelty asked, "Why is this private sanitation?"

A. Adam Rothkrug responded, "This is a private street; therefore, the development is not entitled to City sanitation. There will be a Homeowners Association and dues for maintenance of the street, sanitation and common areas."

Q. Chairman Kelty asked, "Is there parking on the street?"

A. Adam Rothkrug responded, "There is no parking on the street. The townhouses have two-car garages and driveways and there is <u>additional</u> parking in the rear. Cord Meyer Development is required to <u>post</u> <u>no parking signs</u> and is required to give the fire department an agreement which allows the fire department to issue tickets to the Homeowners Association, in the event they find parked cars on the private street. Enforcement is the responsibility of the Homeowners Association (HOA) subject to summons and towing not by HOA. The Fire Department will have the right to issue summons and violations to HOA not individual owners, pursuant to a recorded declaration. In my experience, similar agreements were executed in which the Fire Department requested the authority to issue violations to HOA. This has been in policy for the past year and is required by the Board of Standards and Appeals. It is recorded against the property and included in the Homeowners Association."

Chairman Kelty is concerned that the Fire Department will receive numerous calls from residents of the development to summon violators.

Q. Chairman Kelty asked, "What is the distance between the townhouses?"

A. Adam Rothkrug responded, "50 feet between each building."

Q. Chairman Kelty asked, "Will there be enough parking for visitors?"

A. Adam Rothkrug responded, "They would have to park on the street."

Chairman Kelty commented, this will impact public and resident parking, especially 212th Street.

Matthew Silverstein requested from Cord Meyer to provide a guest pass for visitors.

A. Adam Rothkrug responded, "If necessary, Cord Meyer will consider but does not want to commit to it."

Q. Millicent O'Meally asked, "Will the parking permits for teachers interfere with parking spots for shoppers at Bay Terrace?"

A. Committee Chair, Paul Rifino responded, "It will probably impede with shoppers, but Cord Meyer will deal with it."

Q. Pablo Hernandez asked, "How many spots are available?"

A. Anthony Morali responded, "66 spots." "There are 33 two-family townhouses, each with a two-car garage."

Q. Pablo Hernandez asked, "Does the building code require visitor parking?"

A. Anthony Morali responded, "No."

Cord Meyer's Chief Operating Officer, Anthony Colletti spoke, he has been with the company for 36 years and was involved from the beginning of the project. All parking was designed to be contained on the property but will consider the possibility of providing visitor parking passes. He would have to go through the details and look at everything.

Matthew Whalen, President and CEO of Cord Meyer Development Company also spoke and gave recognition to Anthony Morali, the architect of the development. The CEO emphasized that there will be a parking garage inside the development in addition to the two-family car garage spots. He will also consider the possibility of issuing parking passes to guests, but the CEO does not want to take away parking permits for the teachers.

The sales center will open in the next couple of months and physical construction will run slightly into Year 2021.

In addition, Cord Meyer's Chief Financial Officer, Kevin Schmidt was present.

Committee Chair, Paul Rifino put forward **two conditions** to be added to the **six conditions** in which CEO, **Matthew Whalen** agreed to.

- 7. The Homeowners Association to employ a private towing company.
- 8. Cord Meyer Development Company to review visitor parking.

Chair Paul Rifino made a motion to approve the application with the 8 conditions.

Discussion on the Motion from the Board

Chairman Gene Kelty, First Vice Chair Charles Apelian, Second Vice Chair Warren Schreiber, Pablo Hernandez and Matthew Silverstein supported the Committee's decision to approve the application under the 8 conditions.

Chair Kelty repeated the motion made by the Committee to approve the application with the 8 conditions. The motion was seconded by Joseph Sweeney. A roll call vote was taken resulting in (32) in Favor and (1) Vote Abstaining with Conflict from board member, Michael Cheng. The motion carried.

<u>Addendum</u>

Board members to vote for an increase in staff hours as needed from part time to full time (required by Office of Management and Budget). Anne Krzyzanowski is part time. She performs administrative office work and reviews applications for liquor licenses within CB#7 district. She has a bachelor's degree in Computer Science from St. John's University.

Chairman Kelty made a motion to approve Anne Krzyzanowski's hours from part time to full time. The motion was **seconded by Millicent O'Meally.**

No Discussion on the Motion.

A roll call vote was taken resulting in (32) in Favor. The motion carried.
