

# MERCHANT ORGANIZING GRANT

### **IMPACT REPORT 2024**





The NYC Department of Small Business Services launched the Merchant Organizing Grant program to fund nonprofit organizations to support commercial districts and merchants associations across New York City. Grantees develop and implement place-based projects that aim to form new merchants associations or revitalize existing merchants associations in a specific neighborhood. In Fiscal Year 2024, SBS awarded \$915,000 to 10 community-based organizations to spearhead merchant organizing efforts across five boroughs from December 2023 through June 2024.

# THE POWER OF ORGANIZING

#### STRONGER VOICE

When merchants organize, they can share resources, raise their concerns, and bring attention to the common issues of the commercial corridor.

#### **GREATER RESOURCES**

Merchants associations provide opportunities for funding and resources to develop and implement projects. Collaboration allows merchants to accomplish more tasks to support the commercial district with less time and effort.

#### STRONGER BUSINESS COMMUNITY

Individual merchants may struggle with accessing business assistance, but merchants associations provide business owners with expanded professional networks, shared technical assistance, business development advice, and more.

#### **IMPROVED QUALITY OF LIFE**

When merchants organize, they work together to establish standards for the entire commercial district.




# ASIAN AMERICAN FEDERATION
