#### DEAR NEW YORKERS,

The last 21 months have been challenging for our small businesses. COVID-19 has forced our city's small business owners to innovate and adapt by rethinking their business models and their approaches to staffing. Yet despite these efforts, COVID-19 has forced many businesses to choose closing as their last option. Here at the NYC Department of Small Business Services (SBS) we have been working with the small business community to ensure that there is a long-term future for small businesses here in New York City, especially for Black, Indigenous and People of Color (BIPOC), women, and immigrant entrepreneurs. One such way is through our support for the worker cooperative business model.

The Worker Cooperative Business Development Initiative (WCBDI) has connected New Yorkers with an innovative structure that is resilient and adaptive to challenging times. Over the last seven years, WCBDI has built a strong network of cooperatives in NYC that have been able to thrive in the face of adversity. # THE WORKER COOPERATIVE BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT INITIATIVE

(WCBDI)

In partnership with the NYC Council and the Office of the Mayor, New York City agencies are working to build a more vibrant and inclusive city. The NYC Department of Small Business Services (SBS) contributes to this vision by connecting New Yorkers to good jobs, creating stronger businesses, and building thriving neighborhoods across the five boroughs.

WORKER COOPERATIVES — businesses that are owned and controlled by their workers — are an effective tool to achieve this mission. They give New Yorkers the opportunity to co-own a business, creating sustainable and dignified jobs while developing community wealth — particularly for people who lack access to traditional business ownership. Worker cooperatives are also run on democratic principles, giving New Yorkers the opportunity to practice democracy daily in their workplace.

Mayor Bill de Blasio and the NYC Council launched the Worker Cooperative Business Development Initiative (WCBDI) in Fiscal Year 2015 (FY2015) to support the positive impact worker cooperatives have on New York City. WCBDI was created to strengthen the existing ecosystem of cooperative developers in NYC, promote the creation of new cooperatives, and grow existing cooperatives.

Fiscal Year 2021 (FY2021) marks the seventh year of the initiative. Like all small businesses, worker cooperatives have been met with incredible challenges since the COVID-19 pandemic began. The WCBDI partners have reacted quickly to the restrictions brought on by COVID-19, offering tailored support to cooperatives as they have navigated the complex and rapidly changing business landscape. Worker-members demonstrated the resilience of the cooperative model by supporting each other through the shutdown and subsequent reopening, prioritizing safety and security.

SBS supported WCBDI throughout the year by collecting and analyzing program metrics, holding quarterly meetings, sharing up-to-date information on City resources, and connecting WCBDI partners to other agency initiatives. SBS also continued discussions with WCBDI partners to identify barriers and possible solutions to increase public contracting for worker cooperatives.

This is the seventh annual report in the "Working Together" series, which highlights the achievements of this initiative. SBS is committed to helping worker cooperatives thrive in New York City and proud to showcase the work of WCBDI throughout the past fiscal year.



The WCBDI measures its success using four metrics on worker cooperative development:

A worker cooperative is a business owned and managed by its workers. In contrast to traditional companies, profits from worker cooperatives are distributed among "worker-members," who make governance decisions using democratic principles on a one-member, one-vote basis.

WCBDI encourages both the creation of worker cooperatives and the conversion of traditional businesses into cooperatives through specialized trainings and one-on-one services. Since creating a cooperative takes significant time and resources, WCBDI partners often work with worker-members for several years to either incubate or convert their business into a cooperative. During this period of time, prospective cooperatives receive business planning, market research, financial planning, access to capital, governance and legal support, and many other forms of assistance to establish the business and organizational viability of each worker cooperative.

In FY2021, WCBDI partners helped 11 new worker cooperatives formally launch by helping them acquire a federal tax ID, formation documents, appropriate licenses and permits, and register as a New York State sales tax vendor when applicable.

WCBDI partners also assisted 21 worker cooperatives "in the pipeline" who are in the process of forming or conversion. These worker cooperatives did not fully complete the formal launch steps listed above but are in the process of registering their business and finding an appropriate legal structure. These businesses have tentatively determined their name, industry, and number of worker-members and non-member workers.

The cumulative outcomes listed above were reported by 12 WCBDI partners and summarize the activities conducted in the initiative's seventh year. WCBDI partners received a total of \$3.067 million in FY2021.

A worker-member is a person who owns

a share of the worker cooperative, is a beneficiary of a trust, or controls the cooperative with other worker-members. A non-member worker is anyone who works for a worker cooperative but is not a worker-member. WCBDI helps worker cooperatives take on new worker-members and/or non-member workers through capacity-building services. Adding new worker-members to an existing business can be a long process but encourages personal investment in the success of the business.

This metric represents the total number of jobs created by WCBDI-supported cooperatives in FY2021 and reflects employment of worker-members and non-member workers.

BUSINESSES AND/OR COMMUNITY-BASED ORGANIZATIONS

WCBDI partner organizations provide one-on-one, specialized services focused on worker cooperative development to entrepreneurs planning to become worker cooperatives, businesses interested in converting to cooperatives, and existing worker cooperatives. These services cover a range of topics including bookkeeping, business plan development, financial planning, governance, marketing and market research, strategic planning, succession planning, and translation.

One-on-one services allow cooperatives to continue growing and providing sustainable jobs for worker-members.

At the same time, WCBDI partners help other community-based organizations in New York City that provide business development services extend those services to worker cooperatives in their communities. These partnerships allow WCBDI to extend its impact and further strengthen New York City's worker cooperative ecosystem.

EDUCATIONAL SERVICES PROVIDED

WCBDI hosts workshops, intensive academies, and networking events for current and prospective cooperative members. Educational services provided by WCBDI can be standalone workshops for anyone to attend, or a curriculumbased series of trainings that require an application. Events cover a wide range of business and cooperative management topics, such as bookkeeping, legal entity choice, computer skills, democratic decision making, and conflict resolution. Others aim to connect worker-members and cooperative developers with their communities to teach them about the cooperative model.

This metric represents the number of individuals who were involved in a series of curriculum-based workshops, conferences, lectures, and group trainings hosted by WCBDI in FY2021.

#### CENTER FOR FAMILY LIFE (CFL)/ SCO FAMILY OF SERVICES

Center for Family Life, a program of SCO Family of Services, seeks to promote positive outcomes for children, adults, and families in the low-income immigrant neighborhood of Sunset Park through the provision of neighborhood-based family and social services including family counseling, foster care, school-based programs, youth employment, adult employment, and other community services.

# COMMUNITY & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT CLINIC (CUNY SCHOOL OF LAW)

CUNY School of Law's Community & Economic Development (CED) Clinic partners with community-led organizations to address structural inequalities in New York City through transactional representation, strategic litigation, community legal education, and policy reform.

## **DEMOCRACY AT WORK INSTITUTE** (DAWI)

Created by the U.S. Federation of Worker Cooperatives, the Democracy at Work Institute is a national organization that provides technical, financial, business development, and educational assistance to nonprofits that assist in the development of worker cooperatives as well as the worker cooperatives themselves.

# GREEN WORKER COOPERATIVES (GWC)

Green Worker Cooperatives provides technical assistance and training to prospective and current worker cooperatives through a Co-op Academy, an intensive five-month long training and support program that helps teams of aspiring entrepreneurs develop workerowned green businesses.

#### THE ICA GROUP (ICA)

The ICA Group is the oldest national organization dedicated to the development of worker cooperatives in the United States. ICA provides business development, strategic analysis, and industry-focused support for businesses interested in employee ownership.

# NEW YORK CITY NETWORK OF WORKER COOPERATIVES (NYC NOWC)

The NYC Network of Worker Cooperatives, the trade association for New York City's worker cooperatives, is dedicated to sharing and cultivating the educational, financial, and technical resources of its members and supporting the growth of worker cooperatives for social and economic justice. NYC NOWC helps existing and new worker cooperatives in all communities within the New York City metropolitan area, with a focus on the development of cooperatives within marginalized communities. They offer programming, a basic training series, technical assistance, and limited financial support, as well as an initial consultation for those who want further support from other partners. NYC NOWC also advocates on behalf of New York City's worker cooperatives and hosts the annual NYC Worker Cooperative Assembly.

#### **TAKEROOT JUSTICE**

TakeRoot Justice provides legal, participatory research, and policy support to strengthen the work of grassroots and community-based groups in New York City to dismantle racial, economic, and social oppression.

#### THE WORKING WORLD (TWW)

The Working World provides nonextractive loans, financial education, and technical assistance specifically designed for worker cooperatives, building wealth in low-income communities.

#### **URBAN UPBOUND (UU)**

Urban Upbound is dedicated to breaking cycles of poverty in New York City public housing and other low-income neighborhoods. They provide underserved youth and adults with the tools and resources needed to achieve economic prosperity and self-sufficiency through five comprehensive, integrated programs: Employment Services, Financial Counseling, Income Support Services, Community Revitalization, and Financial Inclusion services anchored by the Urban

#### WORKERS JUSTICE PROJECT (WJP)

Upbound Federal Credit Union.

Workers Justice Project is a community-based organization that promotes social, economic, and political conditions of low-wage workers and immigrant families in New York City. WJP runs a worker cooperative development program that provides training and technical assistance to low-wage workers that are venturing in building workerowned cooperatives.

This year, The Working World assisted Donna Cocktail Club to convert into a worker-owned business. Donna is a Williamsburg restaurant and cocktail bar, founded in 2012. Its founder and owner, Leif Huckman, became excited about the possibility of converting to worker ownership when he attended a webinar hosted by members of the Equitable Industrial Development Initiative in 2020.

In November 2020, Donna Cocktail Club was forced to close and leave their original space due to the pandemic and their landlord selling the building. However, this setback did not dampen their enthusiasm for reopening the beloved bar as a worker cooperative in a new space. After an initial consultation, The Working World provided financial planning and strategic planning to evaluate the viability of new locations and governance assistance to help eight workers prepare to become workerowners. Starting in June, Donna Cocktail Club also participated in an eight-week training program run by The Working World, which brought cooperative businesses together to learn key tools for cooperative business management and to learn from each other. While they work to reopen, Donna Cocktail Club has remained in the public eye by speaking at a webinar hosted by the Owner to Owners initiative in May and catering the annual NYC NOWC fundraiser in June. They are now close to signing a lease for a new space and had multiple pop-up appearances over the summer, including a "Bar Buds Reunion" event at the top of the Box House Hotel in Greenpoint on August 17.

# TOTAL HIRES

WCBDI helps newly created, converted, and/or existing worker cooperatives get new worker-members and/or non-member workers. WCBDI helped cooperatives hire 121 new workers in FY2021. This section of the report highlights a success story about a cooperative that was able to grow in FY2021.

## RADIATE CONSULTING

#### **ASSISTING WCBDI PARTNER(S)**

Democracy at Work Institute (DAWI)

Radiate Consulting NYC, launched in 2019 with DAWI's support, is a diverse group of professionals providing a variety of reliable services to nonprofit organizations and small businesses to achieve their goals. Their work encompasses administrative, branding, and programming needs, and is driven by a social justice and community-focused lens.

In FY2021, Radiate Consulting grew by four new members with recruiting and hiring support from DAWI. The four new members increased the business' capacity to provide bookkeeping services and new services like grant writing and development. The cooperative was also

able to provide worker-owners with access to vision and dental care. As a result, the cooperative is now profitable and able to be a stronger asset for New York City's ecosystem of nonprofits.

Through DAWI's support, the cooperative has been able to independently manage its democratic workplace while accessing services as needed to improve operations and grow as individual professionals and as a business.

# ONE-ON-ONE SERVICES PROVIDED

WCBDI provides specialized one-on-one services to business entities and community-based organizations to strengthen the city's worker cooperative ecosystem. These one-on-one services focus on worker cooperative development. Technical assistance is critical to the success of new and established cooperatives, helping mitigate risk for cooperative worker-members and the institutions that invest in them. In FY2021, WCBDI provided 1,785 one-on-one services to 197 unique entities.

This section of the report highlights some success stories for one-on-one services provided by WCBDI partners.

Launched in 2017, OSHA Solutions is a cooperative of trainers authorized to provide occupational safety and health courses for construction and other industries. The cooperative is one of the first to offer OSHA safety training classes in Spanish. The business currently consists of four immigrant Latinx worker-owners that call Queens home. They are also the first immigrantled cooperative to be certified as a Minority-owned Business Enterprise (MBE) by the City of New York, an achievement that resulted from the partnership with Urban Upbound.

OSHA Solutions was negatively impacted by the economic downturn resulting from the COVID-19 lockdown. During those months, the cooperative and Urban Upbound continued working together to help them transition to digital classes and apply for small business relief grants. Urban Upbound created and implemented trainings to familiarize the co-op members with Zoom for virtual classes. They also worked with the co-op to provide translation and interpretation services in the application process for the grant.

Urban Upbound also helped OSHA Solutions win a \$10,000 small business grant from Local Initiatives Support Corporation (LISC). This crucial grant, offered in collaboration with the Long Island City Partnership, has allowed OSHA Solutions to cover rent, payroll, and expand their customer base by upskilling their worker-members and allowing them to offer new services such as scaffolding safety training.

### **GREEN MOUNTAIN GRAPHICS**

#### **ASSISTING WCBDI PARTNER(S)**

The ICA Group

Green Mountain Graphics is a multigenerational manufacturing business based in Long Island City. It has more than 50 years of sign-making experience. Eric Greenberg bought the business from his parents in 1994 and plans to retire soon. Eric wanted to reward long-tenured employees who helped to make the business successful. People of color, women, and immigrants make up most of his workforce. He also wanted to get a fair market price and have a phased retirement.

After considering many potential options for the succession of his business, Eric attended a forum sponsored by Long Island City Partnership and Deputy Mayor Thompson's office to learn about employee ownership in 2019. The event

panel included the ICA Group's Executive Director Dave Hammer, and several months later, Eric started the conversion process with ICA.

ICA completed an assessment of Green Mountain Graphics and found that converting to a worker cooperative matched Eric's retirement goal. Green Mountain Graphics' business operations, finances, and readiness would also support a successful conversion. ICA Group assisted the business with understanding and documenting cooperative governance, financial planning, and organizational planning to prepare for conversion. Green Mountain Graphics will complete its conversion later in 2021.



### GREEN WORKER CO-OP ACADEMY

#### ASSISTING WCBDI PARTNER(S)

Green Worker Cooperatives, in collaboration with TakeRoot Justice

In FY2021, Green Worker Cooperatives (GWC) successfully transitioned their Co-op Academy program into an online course. To encourage the same sense of community they achieve in-person, they used a digital platform to host discussions, post questions, and keep participants up-to-date on coursework between class sessions.

Meeting weekly from October 2020 through March 2021, groups were trained in topics such as:

- cooperatives and cooperative principles
- · consensus decision-making
- governance
- costs and revenues
- market research
- developing a business model canvas

# Eight successful new co-ops graduated from the 20th cohort of the Green Worker Co-op Academy in March:

#### A HEALER'S TOUCH

promotes holistic wellness practices as a pathway for harm reduction, mental health, and addiction recovery through complementary and alternative medicine and health education.

#### **BREADFRUIT**

is a woodworking worker cooperative that brings refurbished furniture, home goods, and carpentry skill shares to low-income Black and Indigenous communities in NYC and beyond.

#### **BRONX CLAY**

provides pottery classes to Black and Brown communities in the South Bronx. They offer accessible and affordable sliding scale options and scholarships to attend classes.

#### **GREEN APPLE TECH**

is a consultant cooperative that designs and implements cloud, on-premises, and hybrid technology solutions for small-medium business clients to streamline security, backup, and data flows.

They offer on-call support for clients to demystify tech tools to create an effortless experience and peace of mind.

#### **GROOVEVSN**

is a Black queer-led, worker-owner communications cooperative supporting organizations, businesses, and individuals with brand strategies, web design, social media, and marketing.

#### **SWALLOWTAIL HEALING**

is a consulting cooperative and a network of healers providing support and alternative services to people impacted by the criminalization of sex work.

#### **TECH SAVVY CITIZENS COLLECTIVE**

offers remote technology coaching to clients of all ages. They provide training using the client's own technology while connecting across communities by hosting events via tech demos and supporting community-based organizations to transition to paperless systems and online tools.

#### **WE ARE EARTH**

offers a marketplace for people who grow and make food and medicinal plants and vegetables. They offer fair trade, ethically made goods, made affordable by a convenient community supported agricultural model.

In FY2021, WCBDI helped 107 worker cooperatives and an additional 118 business entities and/or CBOs that applied for services.
