Rasika Deosthali of DCP introduced the new CB1 Representative, Justin Rivera taking Rasika's place. We all wished Rasika well.

BSA Cal. No. 44-99-BZIV, Extension of Term previously granted variance for Automotive Service Station, 194 Brighton Avenue.

Peter Rampulla of Rampulla Associates Architects spoke about the site.

Extension of term for a previously granted variance for a Automotive Service Station on the corner of Brighton Avenue and Sumner Place. Looking to not have term limits with the BSA moving forward. Came to CB1 in 1999 and granted a variance of 5 years. In 2005, approval for another 5 year variance. 2010 we received the application and looked for a 15-year term. Now in 2025, looking for no term limits.

No proposed changes and no violations. Was a violation in 1999 which has been resolved. Operator compliant with all inspections and certifications.

Three curb cuts on a corner lot. Had gas pumps but no longer used as a gas station. Trash locked after hours. 2010 was asked to plant evergreens which is now fully grown.

Q&A - Lindy Peter Crescitelli, President of New Brighton Civics - Commercial corridor and they are good neighbors/good experiences and we would miss them if they were gone. Near the Goodhue Center.

Mr. Rampulla said it's up to CB1 to request the removal of the term limits in their recommendation.

Friday Ogbewele said that is not common for CB1 and feels uncomfortable with that.

Phil Rampulla said in the past if anyone has a problem with no term limits and they see lack of cleanliness, gravity, etc., they can make a complaint to BSA and they would ask the building department to make an inspection. CB1 can have the application reopened for a hearing and asked to show compliance. Mr. Rampulla said if the term is not extinguished, the owners have a problem with mortgage financing and puts a strain on small business. It's not like amortized mortgages at 20-30 years. If the owner ever sold, the no term limits is only for this use and would have to come back to the board if another use in this zone but it is transferrable to the new owner for the same type of business. The C/O would be amended for what was permitted.

Mr. Crescitelli said this area is around the corner from Jersey Street/Lafayette Avenue and we have a hard time attracting business owners. We are thrilled to have a successful business. Friday Ogbewele asked if the owner of the shop was the owner of the property and the answer is no.

Peter Lisi said there is a floor in the system for these upstanding business owners to have limits and this isn't the first one we've had.

Tony Cosentino said years ago there were issues there but now looks like it's compliant. CB1 will get the phone number of the owner in case of any problems in the future. It's going to be up to the BSA in the end. Peter Lisi, Motion to call the question and Lindy Peter seconded. Motion to Approve the Application with no term limit as stated. Passes Unanimously, 13 yes, 0 no.

BSA Cal. No. 2025-423-BZ, 5 Wheeler Avenue (formerly 2010 Victory Blvd), Special permit for eating and drinking establishment with an accessory drive-through (McDonalds).

Peter Rampulla - Originally filed an application with the board in 2021. June of 2022 presented to CB1 and was approved when it was for a Starbucks. Issues with requirements with the operator on line busting techniques. If you go to a drive-thru station at a fast food restaurant with restaurant employees coming up to you outside to take your order at your car to expedite the process. The operator wasn't wiling to do this and the application was withdrawn in November of 2024. Now 2025, the owner has found a new operator, McDonald's. The drive through comes from he rear of the property which is a better configuration then it was for Starbucks. We are containing the line for the drive through with no spillage or backups to the main streets on this corner lot. First floor of 2,020 square feet. A cellar of 1,680 square feet. Two means of egress and ingress. One in and out from Victory Blvd. and one in and out from Wheeler Avenue. 18 proposed parking spaces with a gated trash enclosure. Residential district with a commercial overlay where the car drive through would be contained. There will be a 6 foot high vinyl fence with a retaining wall on the residential side with sound attenuation matt. A carryover from the previous application is that the owner is still going to widen Victory Blvd., moving utility poles, fire hydrants, in compliance with the FDNY. The main entrance is on Wheeler Avenue. When it was Starbucks, the main entrance was Victory Blvd. A&Q

Lillian Lagazzo asked about the ingress and egress from both streets with Wheeler Avenue being a one-way street. The cost of the street widening will be the responsibility of the owner. George Turner said it will be like Clove Road and Victory Blvd which is working. Michael Morrell asked about the traffic signal which Phil Rampulla said now is a 3-way signal. Requesting what was done on Lincoln Avenue and Richmond Road to change the signal to a 4-way signal. We want a light at the McDonald's parking lot.

Michael Morrell said Bradley Avenue and Jewett Avenue is very congested and backed up traffic. Phil Rampulla said there will be a turning lane which will alleviate that problem (see diagram). At least 5 cars will be able to make that left alleviating traffic. Pam asked if this would be a 24 hour operation. Phil Rampulla said it shouldn't and we should mention that in our CB1 Recommendation.


With concern from a guest on the meeting about traffic on Wheeler Avenue, Peter Lisi said a Starbucks has much lower traffic than a McDonald's. A traffic light is needed on Wheeler and Victory Blvd. "I love McDonald's". No objection to it. George Turner thinks a traffic light would be wrong. George asked Phil if BSA was asking them to do a traffic study? Tony Cosentino said there was a restaurant there before. Phil said it was called Waterfalls and they lost their lease.



Meeting called to order by Chair, Nicholas Siclari Pledge of Allegiance

Roll Call and attendance waiting for a quorum.

Nick Siclari, Chair introduced the New Parks Borough Commissioner, Joseph Homsey.

"I am a Staten Islander, joined by my Chief of Staff Katrina Toal and Nicole Brooks, North Shore. I was chief of staff for 6 years". A few Capital Projects happening. Clove Lakes Park pathways under construction. Opened up Waterfront Faber Park Basketball courts a few weeks ago. Also the Mary Cali Dalton Recreation Center, State of the Art Rec Center. Not a full replacement of Cromwell but the next step. That is just a snapshot of the projects we have. We celebrated with the New Brighton Citizens Committee yesterday for the renaming of Skyline Park to Cottages Hill New Brighton Park. I appreciate the support of the community board as well as the civics. Although it's early, start thinking about being a lifeguard next summer. Go to the Parks website for the qualifying tests. Vital Parks Explorer online has a grading system. You can see how all the projects are going in real time. Finally thank you because we couldn't do what we do without CB's and Civics.

Q&A

Street trees - 125,000 street trees on Staten Island. We have a census for trees. Don't touch those trees. Let an arborist inspect it. Call 311 for a tracking number.

Question about Sanitation in the Parks should be doing a better job. Mr. Homsey said they will look into the schedule and see why the garbage has not been picked up.

Question regarding the Porta Potty serviced in Clove Lakes Park. Mr. Homsey said they will check it.

Question about Silver Lake Park Road changes. Hoping the Parks Department is monitoring the safety of the Park users. There is a very narrow trail for runners, cyclists, etc. Mr.. Homsey said the road is open to the vehicles now. Road closures for the holidays are based on the DOE school calendar.

Nick Siclari, Chair introduced Councilwoman Kamillah Hanks:

Michael Arvenitis will be doing a presentation about the Transportation Study later on that we just completed.

Welcome everyone! I am here to speak about the propositions in the back of the ballot on November 4th Election Day. This is very important for Staten Islanders. A few months ago we had the Charter Revision. One of the questions is, Do you want to make New York more affordable? That is a misleading questions because everyone wants this. What they actually want to do is take the power away from you. We come here to figure out what's going on in our neighborhoods. This is saying the City Council members, your vote doesn't matter that our no doesn't really mean a no and go directly to BSA. These ballots are saying we are not building enough affordable housing, so they want to go passed the Councilmember and do whatever we want. My job is to take what you say and go to City Hall. We are not against affordable housing but we want to protect our way of life in certain areas. We want to be able to negotiate where developing and zoning are so important. It means it takes away the communities voice. Understand what the ramifications are. Tell your neighbors.

Michael Arvenitis - First question is statewide ballot question. Proposal 1 Adirondack Amendment at resolving a decades old land issue centering around the Mount Van Hoevenberg Olympic Sports Complex, a state-operated facility near Lake Placid. Proposal amends the constitution to allow the state to use up to 323 acres of Adirondack Forest Preserve land for Nordic Skiing and Biathlon trails. In return, NY would be required to purchase and add 2,500 acres of new land to the Adirondack Forest Preserve. This transfers power to the City Planning Commission. This changes the ULLURP process to an advisory vote with no negotiations. The 4th question is the BP Topographical Unit will be eliminated and removed to City Planning.

Taking the power away from someone on Staten Island and giving it to a Queens representative. The ULLURP power will be taken away from all of us.

Councilwoman, Kamillah Hanks said we want to be building here and St. George and Stapleton likes that, etc.

Michael Arvenitis, Transportation study: we gave out 4,000 surveys and received 1,000 back about ferries and local bus service and the lack of connectivity between them. When the bus leaves before the ferry gets there. Advertising on local buses. Another fare and toll hike. We will utilize the information to hopefully makes changes. How to speed up buses, etc. (please see video for more information).

Secretary, Loretta Cauldwell - Attendance taken and we have a quorum.

Public Session -

Makeda Campbell – Jessica Scarcella Spanton's office - Veteran's BBQ, October 26th at the Hillside Swim Club, 159 Signs Road from 1-4 PM. In partnership with Senator Lanza's office. Thanksgiving Showcase - submitting essays, poems, songs, etc. what they are thankful for. Deadline

11/21. Mobile offices on a weekly basis at places of worship, schools, parks etc. This week we are at Rab's from 10-12. Thursday at PS 46. On 10/17 at the West Brighton Community Center from 9:30-11AM.

Cathleen Kenny, Assemblyman Sam Pirozzolo's office – Sam is voting no on the Ballot Proposals. Proposals 2-4 intend to strip the community decisions occurring in our neighborhoods.

New Yorkers should begin to receive the inflation refund checks. Cathleen received the garbage can reimbursement check.

Agnes McBeth, Community & Youth Liaison, Office of DA McMahon's office – Agnes McBeth with Jack Barlow - Crime continues to trend in the right direction. We aware many people don't feel safe. Horrible homicide last week. Scams are increasing due to the holidays coming up. There is a brushing scam, you receive a package with a QR code, when you scan it you download malware.

We proseuted a case last week Rayquan Douglas and Dustin Johns pled guilty to robbery in the second degree of a smoke shop in West Brighton. Sentence is 8 years behind bars and 5 years post supervision.

A motion to amend the bylaws <u>Article VIII</u>: Committees and <u>Reports</u>, <u>Section 1</u> to <u>add Parks and Recreation Committee as a permanent functional committee as Item #9.</u>

a) Section 1

- i) Add Item 9. Parks and Recreation Committee. Identify and report on improvements and maintenance of NYC Parks Department parks and recreation centers.
 - (1) Due to the growing needs for improvement and maintenance of parks and recreation facilities, the Parks Committee should be upgraded from an Ad Hoc Committee to a permanent functional committee. The title of which should be Parks and Recreation.

This motion was discussed by the Rules and Legislation committee and was unanimously approved.

II. Motion 2

A motion to amend the <u>Standard Operating Procedures</u> of the <u>Bylaws</u>, <u>General Full Board Meetings</u>

a) Section 1

All motions coming from Executive Committee must be first sent to the Executive Committee. If for some reason the Executive Committee does not meet to consider the motions, or if there are extenuating circumstances (i.e. where time is of the essence), a motion may be made during the committee report to suspend the Rules in order to consider that motion outside of the normal course of the business. If the Rules are suspended, then the Chairperson will open the floor for debate on the new motion. The motion to suspend the Rules will require a second and a majority vote.

This is not currently being done and should be stricken.

b) Section 2

- i) Amend section 2 by striking language from the second line of the paragraph:
 - The motion must be submitted in writing and seconded.
- ii) Amend section 2 by striking part of the third line of the paragraph:

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The Board Chairperson will have the authority to may send the motion to the appropriate committee for its consideration.

- iii) Add to section 2

 If the motion is not referred to committee, then the Chairperson will open the floor up for debate on the new motion. A vote will then follow.
- iv) Amend section 2 by striking the remainder of the paragraph If for some extenuating circumstance (i.e. where time is of the essence), the motion cannot wait to be sent to a committee, a motion may be made to suspend the Rules in order to consider that motion outside of the normal course of business. If the Rules are suspended then the chairperson will open the floor up for debate on the new motion. The motion to suspend the rules will require a second and a majority vote.

This is derived from a conflict between:

Bylaws Article IV Section 9, which reads, "At the discretion of the Chair, all motions may be required to be reduced to writing before being placed in order for them to be considered by the Board." and

Bylaws Standard Operating Procedures, General Full Board Meetings #2, which states, "A member may bring a motion from the floor during new business. The motion must be submitted in writing and seconded. The Board Chairperson will have the authority to send the motion to the appropriate committee for its consideration. If, for some extenuating circumstance (i.e where time is of the essence), the motion cannot wait to be sent to a committee, a motion may be made to suspend the Rules in order to consider that motion outside of the normal course of business. If the Rules are suspended, then the chairperson will open the floor up for debate on the new motion. The motion to suspend the rules will require a second and a majority vote.

This identifies the public session. A quorum is required for the public session
