RESOLUTION SUPPORTING CARBON FREE AND HEALTHY NYC SCHOOL BUILDINGS

WHEREAS, greenhouse gas emissions are a leading cause of drastic global climate change that is affecting New York City, through worsening air pollution, temperature changes, extreme weather events, flooding, and other impacts.

WHEREAS, New York City, and our Borough's front-line, low-wage workers, communities of color, and children bear a disproportionate amount of the effects of the climate crisis;

WHEREAS, buildings constitute 70% of carbon emissions in New York City contributing to a health and environmental crisis in our neighborhoods because of energy-inefficient buildings, many of which are public school buildings, and as a result, New York City spends hundreds of millions of dollars in energy costs;

WHEREAS, many of these school buildings are in need of infrastructure upgrades and retrofits that will improve the conditions of school buildings to benefit our students, teachers, staff and administrators, and reduce emissions;

WHEREAS, the \$275 million the NYC public school system spends annually in energy costs can be dramatically reduced through deep energy efficient building retrofits and installation of renewable energy systems such as solar panels;

WHEREAS, now is an opportune time to take advantage of the Federal Inflation Reduction Act's Direct Pay provision for municipalities and school districts to offset up to 50% of investment costs for decarbonization projects of NYC public schools, and enable the projected cost savings from building retrofits and solar installations to outpace the financing costs of the program;

WHEREAS, work done under this initiative, when performed under a Project Labor Agreement, will employ thousands of workers across a variety of unionized trades and help New Yorkers from historically marginalized communities' access world-class pre-apprenticeship and apprenticeship training pathways to gain the transferable skills that lead to family-sustaining union careers;

WHEREAS, this initiative will provide renewable energy for public schools while significantly contributing to the City's targeted 80% reduction in carbon emissions by 2050, and in the process, create good union jobs across the five boroughs;

WHEREAS, the New York City school system, our country's largest, has the opportunity to lead the nation in decarbonizing public schools, improving our students' learning environment and the working environment for teachers, staff, and administrators while increasing environmental and economic resiliency of the City's frontline communities;

BE IT RESOLVED, that the (example) BRONX BP Gibson / Bronx Borough Board, in order to greatly contribute to New York City's decarbonization and resiliency goals and expand economic mobility through the creation of good union jobs, and other workforce development opportunities, strongly supports prioritizing investment in New York City's Fiscal Year 2024 Budget for school building retrofits and solar energy installations to move towards carbon free and healthy schools now.

Cannot discuss the union negotiations. These are performed by NYC's Office of Labor Relations.

Cannot discuss why the schedule cancelations are not announced in

Cannot discuss the cause of the Sandy Ground fire.

Cannot discuss the substitution of NYC Ferry (NY Waterway) ferries for several runs on New Year's Eve. The MEBA Union has filed an 'Improper Practice' complaint.

All the toilets on the ferries are open. [But is this really

The toilets in the terminals are closed for several hours in the early morning because of 'damage'.

No progress on the RFP for eats and drinks on the ferries.

The MTA is working on real-time bus departure signs to be posted in the SI Terminal main hall. The Ferry will put them up when they are ready.

The ferries are to be equipped with passenger counters (more reliable than the 'turnstiles'). Undergoing testing right now.

How a passenger standing in one of the terminals can discover when the next ferry will leave

(According to the DOT)

- 1. There may have been an announcement before the passenger arrived, and there may be one later. ['Not in the unheated downstairs bicycle waiting area' said one commenter.]
- 2. You could have signed up for social media.
- 3. The large lighted board shows the official schedule.
- 4. The canine handlers usually know.
- 5. The Passenger Service Office is open during business hours on weekdays.
- 6. 'Anyway, the Ferry is free.' ['Not to the taxpayer' said one commenter.]
- 7. The Ferry is working on 'software' to enable the Ferry Dock Office to update the schedule on the monitors in each terminal. [Currently not working.]

There are no Ferry staff in the public areas of either Ferry Terminal except when the Customer Service Office is open. Presently trying to hire somebody for that position.

Customer Service

(According to the DOT)

The crew get Customer Service training every two years. This comprises such topics as CPA, ADA regulations, etc.

Would the Ferry consider conducting focus groups on what passengers are concerned about? No. The Ferry already knows this.

P.S. Ferry performance since the meeting...

... Has been even worse.

On Friday and Saturday, February 2 and 3, there was no boat at all at 2 am, making a 2-hour wait in both terminals.

Construction on Hannah St. and Murray Hulbert Ave.

At least three large projects are imminently, and possibly simultaneously, scheduled for the vicinity of Hannah St. and Murray Hulbert Ave.:

- The Mary Cali Dalton Recreation Center at Lyons Pool.
- Reconstruction of the waterfront promenade and roadway.
- Reconstruction of the NYC Dock Builders Pier.

Murray Hulbert Ave. is also the sole vehicular entrance to the large Bay St. Landing development.

What is being done to ensure free access during this construction period?

DOT: Cannot speak to this alone. Involves also NYC EDC, NYC Construction Services, FDNY, NYC Parks Department...

Re: 9/11 Postcards Memorial Revitalization

Dear NYC Public Design Commissioners:

I am writing to express my support for the design put forth by New York City Economic Development Corporation for the proposed upgrades to the 9/11 Postcards Memorial in St. George, Staten Island. Postcards is a site of great importance, honoring Staten Island residents lost on September 11 and during the 1993 World Trade Center bombing. It is of the upmost importance that the Memorial is kept in condition befitting its local, national and international significance.

We believe that the planned improvements provide positive and necessary upgrades to the site. The plan includes: upgraded, submergible lighting; repair of pavement damaged by Superstorm Sandy, replacement of all broken granite plan pavers, refurbish/replacement of all damaged granite silhouettes and dividers, a new electrical panel raised outside of the flood zone, incorporation of the Survivor Tree into the Memorial area via a new pathway, new signage for the Postcards Memorial and the Survivor Tree, and new plantings and landscaping. The plan allows for much needed repairs, and also for upgrades to overall site through landscaping, signage, and the incorporation of the Survivor Tree.

We at Community Board 1 support this proposal, and are pleased to see much needed improvements planned for the site.
