Pledge of Allegiance

Roll call attendance taken. A quorum was present.

Motion made and seconded to accept December 2009 Board Minutes. Minutes accepted.

OFFICERS' REPORTS

<u>FIRST VICE-CHAIRMAN, ANTHONY COSENTINO</u> – The Steering Committee Minutes are in the packet.

<u>DISTRICT MANAGER, JOSEPH CARROLL</u> –Mr. Carroll invited everyone on behalf of Jacob Massaquoi, III to the induction of the new officers of the Liberian Community Association, Saturday, January 17, 2009 – 8:00 P.M. at the Staaten, Forest Avenue.

On Thursday January 15, 2009 – 6:00 P.M. at the Staten Island Hotel, 1415 Richmond Avenue the Medical Society will release the results of a study, which analyzed the disparities in health care services across the boroughs.

"The Judge dismissed the law suit to over turn the Council vote on term limits. The race is on."

Chairman Marra introduced Mr. Leonard Garcia-Duran, Director, Staten Island City Planning and Ms. Liz Kays of the Department of City Planning.

Mr. Garcia-Duran and Ms. Kays gave a power point, presentation on a proposed text amendment to require indoor, secure, long-term bicycle parking in new multi-family residential, community facility, and commercial buildings. The proposed text amendment would provide for bicycle parking and storage both at home and in the workplace, with standards that serve the needs of cyclists while providing flexibility to accommodate the needs of development.

The goals are for new or significantly enlarged buildings and buildings converted to residential use to have facilities for secure parking and long-term storage of bicycles:

Multifamily residential – provide parking where bicycles are stored most of the time. **Commercial and community facilities** – provide parking for employees to support bicycle commutation.

Public parking garages- support bicycles as a transportation mode.

Balance bicycle parking with the needs of new development: allow a range of parking solutions and flexibility in meeting requirements; will not count required facilities toward floor area; would allow waiver of requirements for small buildings and other unusual conditions.

The general requirements are: 15 square feet per bicycle parking space; space can be reduced to 6 square feet with efficient parking systems; requirements apply to new buildings, enlargements of 50% or more, conversions to residential use; parking must be enclosed, secure and accessible to designated user; bicycle parking does not count as floor area; (up to a maximum amount requirement) allow enclosed bicycle parking as permitted obstruction in rear yards; and requirements are waived for residential buildings with 10 or fewer units.

Gary Washinsky, NYC DOT, Bicycle Unit said there will be approximately 200 bike lanes in the 5 boroughs with 20 on Staten Island.

Ms. Adena Long asked why Staten Island is not getting more bike lanes and requested more on Staten Island.

Mr. Washinsky suggested anyone who would like to have bike lanes to contact the Staten Island Office of the Department of Transportation with the location and a study would be done of the location.

Mr. Fred Wilmers, Architect, showed plans for the new 121st Pct. to be located at 970 Richmond Avenue. The Police Department has already acquired the land.

The facility would be a two-story 48,000 square foot building with 103 off-street parking spaces for police officers and staff in the rear of the building and 5 public parking spaces in the front of the building.

The exterior cladding of the building mass is a low luster stainless steel formed panels that provide the horizontal and linear pattern of the building. Anchoring the building to the surrounding grade is a base made of natural granite.

The building, as shown would meet Silver LEED certification mostly through energy efficiency.

Inspector Anthony Tria, New York City Police Department explained the 121st Precinct has the support of the Mayor and the Police Commissioner. The money is there.

The creation of the new 121st Pct. is a response to the growing population of Staten Island and the statistically high crime area surrounding the proposed project. The 121st Pct. would be located on the northwestern shore of Staten Island, created from the western portions of the existing 120th and 122nd precincts.

A brief question and answer period ensued.

Mr. Thomas Aiello, representing Governor Patterson presented Chairman Marra with a Proclamation commemorating Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Day on January 19, 2009 and Black History Month.

PUBLIC SESSION

Ms. Kay Pyum, owner of the 7-11 on Forest and Decker Avenues requested help from Community Board #1. Ms. Pyum has owned the store for 27 years and has found out that she ha lost the lease. The owner has asked them to move in six weeks. Ms. Pyum claims that is not

sufficient time to relocate the store and asked Community Board #1 to intervene in trying to get an extension of time in order to find another location for the store.

Ms. Jonna McKone, City Harvest spoke of a community food assessment they are undertaking in the Stapleton and Park Hill community. The community food assessment seeks to understand the food system in local communities by hearing from residents about their needs as well as interest in developing food-related projects.

Mr. Artie Cappabianco of the Decker Avenue Civic Assn. spoke on behalf of Mr. Pyum and said they have been there for 27 years and the neighborhood is very upset that she lost the lease. They employ neighborhood people. The owners of the property are going to close and demolition the 7-11 and the adjacent automotive repair shop to the 7-11 and put up a TD Bank. Any help the board can give Ms. Pyum would be appreciated.

Mr. Paul Saryian spoke of the need for a Public Hospital on Staten Island, the increase of homicides on the Island, the atrocity of closing some firehouses at night when most fires occur. Mr. Saryian urged all Islanders to contact their local politicians to urge them to keep all firehouses open 24/7, urge to build a public hospital and the 121 Pct.

Mr. MarQuette Elliot spoke of his program "Shoot Hoops Not Guns Inc." and their mission to stop gun violence. Mr. Elliot would like to work with the Community and the Police Department to stop gun violence. Mr. Elliot has tickets available for the Wagner College Basketball game vs. Sacred Heart University on January 25, 2009 if anyone is interested.
