Transportation Committee Chair: Nicholas Zvegintzov Report of February 12, 2019

- 1. No Transportation Committee meet January or February
- 2. Speed camera on St. Paul's Ave at PS. 65 -- Success



On December 11, 2018 CB1 voted unanimously to support the P.S. 65 P.T.A. for additional street calming measures on St. Paul's Avenue including a permanent speed camera at P.S. 65 near Grant Street.

With this (and other) pressure a camera was installed at Swan St. on or before January 25. (P.S. 65 is one block south, left. The camera is aimed at the rear license plate.)

The speed camera law was in trouble in Albany until the last election, but may now be extended.

### New NYC Ferry route from / to Staten Island



On Jan 10 2019 the Mayor announced a future route of the fast NYC Ferry for the fifth borough — a route to open in 2020 from St. George to Battery Park City and 39th S. on the West Side.

This will be Staten Island's first route, NYC Ferry's first stops on the West Side, and a route not connecting with any other NYC Ferry route.

It was obviously selected long before October 16, when the City 'consulted' with elected and interest groups (including the CBs) about future routes. All of the other SI sites proposed at this meeting were rejected.

And no link to Brooklyn, as requested by CB1 since April 5 2017.

# Called to Order 7:00 pm

**The first order of business** addressed the application to approve Board of Standards & Appeals Application No. 822-59-BZ for 1774 Victory Blvd. Amendment to the existing automotive service station to convert the existing 1,794 square foot building to a convenience store.

A brief discussion ensued regarding the existing gas station, small convenience store, and 2 garage auto repair that presently occupies the space. Review of hard copy submission and discussion held. The current occupants are looking to remove auto repair and put in a convenience store. There was a question regarding the project expanding the intersection of Manor & Victory, and if that would have an impact on the proposed changes, but it would only affect the curb cut. **Result: Seeing no further discussion, the motion to approve was passed unanimously.** 

**The second order of business** was the application No. 190057ZAR and N 190058 ZAR for an authorization requesting 636 Howard Avenue (the Athletic Field of Wagner College) to facilitate the enlargement of an existing one story athletic facility and expand dug out.

A brief discussion and review of the hard copy of proposal and photos was conducted. The area would be under the grandstand expanding the dug- out and leveling the small man made slope. **Result: A motion was made to approve and passed unanimously.** 

We had an update on the ongoing sewer/gas lines/water mains utilities project for Westerleigh as well as the intersection of Manor Road & Victory Blvd. Mike Morrell stated the Westerleigh utilities project is projected to be completed by the end of Summer 2019, seeing no unforeseen delays.

There was a concern from residents regarding the proposed development of Cecelia Court (across from St. John's University on Howard Avenue). This will be addressed by Stapleton Area & presented to Land Use on February 12. However the contingency from Serpentine Commons had numerous concerns and objections. Protectors of Pine Oak Woods submitted a letter of opposition to the proposal. On file at Board Office & referred to Land Use Chair.

## PRESENTATIONS: Jump Bikes

Serving the CB1/North Shore area; another popular destination is South Beach. The company hopes to expand Island-wide. Currently, costs are \$2 per ½ hour, then 7 cents/min thereafter. Access through UBER app, or purchase RFID at CVS or 7/11. "Boost Program" offers a discount for NYCHA residents, persons receiving HEAP, and/or SNAP of \$5/month, giving an hour/day of ride time. All bikes are "E-Assist" – a motor augments the pedal-power, providing a less taxing ride.

Currently operating out of a facility on Park Ave, Jump plans to "ramp up" operations when the weather warms, increasing hiring of local residents for redistribution and overall support. Bike seats may be raised/lowered to fit the rider. Users who do not secure the bikes properly will receive a warning; continued problems will engender a \$25 fine and ultimately a ban from the service.

Community Board 1, SI, thanks you for this opportunity to comment on the Citywide Statement of Needs for FY 2020-2021.

#### Infrastructure

Community Board 1 is supportive of and grateful for the relocation of Sanitation 1 to Fresh Kills.

CB1 recommends relocating DOT's Sidewalk Inspection management/Concrete Crushing activity to 1853 Richmond Terrace.

#### **Public Safety**

Community Board 1 recommends the relocation of NYPD's Special Victims' Office to One Edgewater Plaza.

CB1 also recommends the location of NYPD's Raise the Age HQ to 60 Bay Street.

CB1 recommends siting the NYPD Medical District Office in space at the main building at the Bayley Seton Hospital site.

Dear Mayor de Blasio:

Community Board 1 represents Staten Island's North Shore and has been a tireless advocate for improving the quality of life for our residents. This encompasses increased affordable housing, expanded youth and senior services, upgrading the mass transit and street transit system, adding school seats and improving the waterfront.

CB1 is grateful Sanitation 1 is being relocated to Fresh Kills and that HHC has placed a clinic in Clifton; however, there are major aspects of our budget requests that have been unresolved.

#### **Parks**

The funding for Cromwell Center cannot be attached to the Bay Street Corridor. The Center should be held harmless since its reconstruction has been so greatly muddled over the years and since its cost will drain corridor funding if included.

Every Park should have either a bathroom or portable toilets as well as water fountains and parks with facilities and should be staffed during regular park hours.

Parks should have a base line capital budget of \$100 million to end the game of getting local elected to pay for park projects out of their budgets.

The North Shore Greenway needs to be designed and built.

With the inception of "Parks without Borders," more PEP officers are required.

#### HHC

The Corporation must be provided 5% of the tax-levy capital budget to be given to the Island's two health care systems to address the inequity of the lack of an HHC hospital facility on Staten Island.

#### **EDC**

The site of the failed NY Wheel, which NYC refused to help, must become a tour de force economic development site to enhance the growth engendered by the Empire Outlets and to provide local businesses the opportunity to flourish.

The Corporation needs to go beyond considering and fund the project to improve truck access, a new pier and an expansion of NY Container Port.

#### **Schools**

The district has an identified need for elementary and middle school capacity. Therefore, sites must be selected and such schools built.

#### **FDNY**

The Bay Street Corridor and Empire Outlet projects coupled with increased response time make the siting of a fire house with the Bay Street area essential.

#### NYPD

The increase in population, drug activity and certain other crimes coupled with the congestion at the current 120<sup>th</sup> make it important to develop the new Hill Street property for a precinct.

#### HRA

While shelter service funding is adequate, more money is needed on prevention programs.

As domestic violence increases, the DA needs to be funded to increase the Borough's push-back.

The confluence of Amazon and other warehouses near the Container Port has created a congestion issue that needs to be resolved by providing a separate entrance into the port.

Smart lights, better signal algorithms, sequential signals and turning lanes are needed to ease congestion at traffic choke points.

SBS routes need to be created in ways that isolate the busses from traffic congestion.

Bus shelters should be redesigned with this Borough in mind. Since SI lacks the luxury of wide sidewalks, the generic design used by the Agency does not work and are commuters are left to the elements.

#### DEP

The sewer system along the Bay Street Corridor must be upgraded if the proposed ULURP is to succeed.

#### **DFTA**

The rise in crime against the aged requires an increased commitment from NYC to protect them.

These are CB1's major unaddressed concerns in your preliminary 2020 budget and we hope you will review these requests in a more positive way before final budget adoption.
