New York State Liquor Authority (SLA) Chairman - Jerome Goldman

Self-Explanatory

MOTION: Therefore be it resolved that Community Board 3, Staten Island recommends approval of a new on premise liquor license for a gentlemen's club for Kill Dare Corp. d/b/a Allure, 2945 Arthur Kill Road, SI NY 10309 so long as statements that the applicant presented are accurate and complete, and that those conditions are incorporated into the "method of operation" on the SLA on premise liquor license.

- 1. The security guard licenses will state unarmed security guards.
- 2. The minimum age will be 25 years old.
- 3. Scanners will be used to download and take pictures of drivers' licenses presented at the door. Fraudulent licenses will be confiscated and the patrons removed. Patrons who exit will be rescanned upon entry.
- 4. A dress code will be implemented no tank tops, no cut offs, hats or caps.
- 5. Valet Parking is mandatory. The reason for this is to be able to prevent patrons who are intoxicated from driving when leaving the premise.
- 6. Parking lot safety rules:
 - a) Install NO LOITERING and NO TRESPASSING signs across the lot. Private security guards will enforce the parking lot safety rules and conduct random checks of outdoor parking lot and contact law enforcement immediately if they see suspicious persons or activities.
 - b) Install video cameras in the outdoor parking lot and announce their presence with prominently posted signs.
 - c) Keep the outdoor parking lot as brightly lit as possible.

MOTION: Therefore be it resolved that Community Board 3, Staten Island recommends **approval** of a renewal on premise liquor license for a restaurant for Patrizia's of Staten Island, 4255 Amboy Road, Staten Island NY 10308 so long as statements the applicant has presented are accurate and complete, and that those conditions and stipulations agreed to by the applicant are incorporated into the "Method of Operation" on the SLA Restaurant On Premise Liquor license.

- 1. Applicants discontinue use of city streets for the purpose of valet services, as it is illegal.
- 2. Old Amboy Road will not be used for valet services, illegally double parking cars and blocking available spots to service drivers frequenting Patrizia's of Staten Island.
- 3. If applicant does not obtain the proper Department of Consumer Affairs permit (CDA) for operating a sidewalk café, applicant will remove the licensed outdoor are from their application

BSA 2019-1-A to 5-A Nello Court

An application for a waiver of GCL36 to construct five (5), two-family, two-story, detached homes that do not front upon a legally mapped street. Current block 7826, lots 215, 220, 550 will be subdivided into 5 lots. Joe Loccisano, architect presented the project. The property is located off Sprague Avenue between Hylan Blvd and Surf Avenue. Total property is 30,000 sq. ft. in an R3X zone. Homes will be 2,400 sq. feet, 3 parking spots, and private easement. Buffer zones do not encroach on property. Fire Department approved plan. Sewers will connect to Sprague.

Statement - Land Use Chairman Thomas Barlotta

The application before us is located on a newly developed private street with a homeowners association and like so many others that come before the board; it has a unique set of issues. The private street, HOA situation has also been in the spotlight with Borough Hall and City Planning because they carry negative consequences. Residents in HOA's encounter the following:

- ✓ Homeowner Associations (HOA) have monthly dues per home.
- ✓ Most HOA's have managing agents which charge yearly fee.
- ✓ Financial responsibilities include: road repair, paving, sewer maintenance, insurances, legal etc.
- ✓ Drywell repairs.
- ✓ 15-18% of homes do not pay their dues which creates a burden on the HOAs.
- ✓ Assessments are placed on each homeowner for capital projects.

Our Community Board has always fought against density and substandard parking. I believe we need to reconsider applications that include HOA's. All new streets should be built to NYC DOT standards with the same requirements as city mapped streets. Sidewalks, setbacks, and adequate widths of the road will should be required for approvals which will reduce density. GCL36 is NYC law; they are asking for a waiver, we should not grant waivers.

Statement - Chairman Frank Morano

The Land Use Committee voted for this application that is before us because it was one of the rare times that an application included a decent parking plan. I am in total agreement with Thomas Barlotta that there should be no private streets.

Discussion among board members was extensive

- ✓ HOA's are set up as loopholes, self-regulatory organization with no enforcement power. If we have the opportunity in a small way to disallow private streets we should voice our opinion to BSA, City Planning and our elected.
- ✓ Community Board 3 has asked the FDNY for an interpretation of their approval for this application because it is not clear if parking is permitted on a 34' wide street; FDNY is reviewing.
