New Business

John Felicetti attended the meeting to discuss the current crime wave plaguing our city and the broken criminal justice system. He wants to present a Motion to write a letter to the elected officials.

Motion: (Diane Peruggia)

I move to send a strongly worded letter to our elected officials: Our State Assemblymen, State Senators, City Council members, the Mayor, and the Governor, stating that we need amendments to our broken Justice System. We propose the following:

1. **Repeal the "No Cash Bail" law**. Add to the list of crimes for which bail may be set with consideration of *criminal history* and or *dangerous firearm use*. Reconsider the *elimination of statutes*.

2. Judicial Discretion—Judges have the discretion to determine whether a defendant poses a serious risk and danger to the community and whether they should be held as a result.

3. **Refine the 2019 "Discovery Reform,"** which created tight deadlines for our District Attorney's office to gather discoverable information.

4. Place a **mandatory life prison sentence** with no parole for the killing of a police officer.

5. **Remove the "Raise the Age Proposal"** so that adolescent offenders are accountable for serious crimes.
