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CHAIR DO: All right. Good morning.

I'm calling this meeting to order at

10:07 a.m. I am David Do, commissioner of
the Taxi and Limousine Commission. I'm
joined today by our board of commissioners;

Commissioner Mitchell, Commissioner

Sorrentino, Commissioner Velazquez,

Commissioner Chan, Commissioner Bader, and
Commissioner Bierstein.

I want to start to say a few words
before we move on to a much anticipated vote.
As some of you already know, on June 5th,
many of us gathered at our Woodside
Inspection Facility, to celebrate a historic
milestone. More than 50 percent of our
active taxis are now wheelchair accessible.
Let's give that a round of applause.

(Applause).

CHAIR DO: It was a great event. And once again, I'd like to thank all of the advocates, including the Deputy Mayor of Operations, our Commissioner Bader, for coming out, industry partners, and my TLC team for coming and making that event a fantastic event and increasing accessibility

for years to come. That good work continues.

On that note, I'd like to remind
everyone that applications for the Accessible
Taxi Loan Assistance Service pilot program,
otherwise known as ATLAS, are now open.
Under this program, 100 small business
medallion owners who own no more than one
medallion, and meet all of the
qualifications, can apply for a special low

interest loan on a Sienna WAV. For more

information, visit newyorkcity.gov/tlc.

Now, let's get to today's business.

Making New York City a more affordable place to live is a top priority for this administration, and our vote today on the amendments to driver pay is about exactly that. I'd like to thank the driver community, who are here today, and the advocate organizations for their patience over the last year, as we worked on the revised set of rules we'll be voting on today.

In New York City, we respect and protect our driver workforce. We invented minimum pay for rideshare drivers, and we've

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in the nation. As multi-billion dollar companies have continuously sought ways to pay them less, the rule we're voting on today reflects that commitment. Our licensees have waited a long time for this vote. Last year, the City's rideshare drivers suffered through months of harmful and unnecessary lockouts by Uber and Lyft. They oftentimes found themselves locked out from the apps in the middle of their shifts, as they were working hard to pay for their bills and feed their families.

The app companies were exploiting loopholes in our rules to artificially increase utilization rates, to avoid paying drivers more, which is unacceptable. These proposed rules not only go a long way towards closing this loophole and providing further lockout protections for drivers, but they also provide a sensible pay increase based on inflation and increased expenses.

We have taken several months to carefully review the public comments we received. The statement of basis and purpose

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in the final version of the rule proposal discusses the comments and our consideration of them. One area of focus among the comments received from the high-volume companies was the assumption in Dr. Parrott's driver expense report, that gas-powered and electric vehicles are fully depreciated after five and six years, respectively, based on typical load lengths reported by survey respondents and hold minimum residual resale value. The assumption that financed vehicles are fully depreciated at the end of the loan term is consistent with the methodology we adopted in 2018 and does not represent a change in approach by Dr. Parrott or the TLC.

However, recognizing that an older, high-mileage vehicle used intensively for for-hire vehicle service may nevertheless retain some resale value. TLC deemed it reasonable to quantify an amount of residual value. This estimation was tailored to vehicles used to provide for-hire service in New York City and incorporated into the composite expense factor. Using inspection records and estimated vehicle trade-in values

provided by the Kelley Blue Book, TLC worked with Dr. Parrott on a supplemental expense report to estimate the residual value of common older vehicle still active in providing service.

The weighted average for the trade-in values derived from this analysis was \$7,200 for gas-powered vehicles and \$10,800 for EVs. These values were incorporated into the expense factors for owned vehicles on an amortized basis. These modifications to the expense model developed in December 2024 report slightly reduce the net impact on the increase per-mile expense factor to 87 -- .879 percent.

Together, TLC's increase in the per-mile driver expense rate, alteration of the time-based utilization rate, the addition of the distance-based utilization rate, and the March 2025 inflation increase to per-mile pay rate pursuant to the CPI-W of 3.92 percent, will result in a minimum per-trip payment of approximately \$29.07 for a sample trip of 7.5 miles and 30 minutes. The revision, accounting for the residual

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value of older vehicles, reflects an overall approximate increase of five percent compared to the 2024 rates and 26.3 percent compared to the original 2019 rates.

In addition, TLC also clarifies in the rule that 16-hour driver assess requirement resets after the driver has been logged out for eight hours. This is consistent with the eight-hour reset period in the TLC's longstanding driver fatigue rules.

Before I hand it over to our general counsel for official business, I'd like to ask if any of our commissioners would like to say a few words, and I think I want to recognize Commissioner Bader first, to say a few words.

COMMISSIONER BADER: Thank you very much, Commission and Chair. What we are voting on today --

AUDIENCE MEMBER: Your mic is not on.

COMMISSIONER BADER: I'm sorry. Is that better? There we go. I was waiting for the green light. You know. that's very important. We're only supposed to go forward when we have a green light; we all know that.

Red light, we stop. Yellow light, we watch. Yeah, we all have to watch. Thank you very much.

(Laughter).

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COMMISSIONER BADER: What we are about to vote on today is a reflection of a lot of watching that this Commission and the staff have done for a number of years. This dynamic of for-hire vehicles is a relatively new dynamic in the City of New York, considering how old the City is and how long we've had taxis on the streets of New York. So, we, as the regulatory body, are in a position where we have to constantly reassess what works and what doesn't work and what the priorities are and how we protect the passengers, the riders, the drivers, the vehicles, so that we have a safe and responsible industry in the City of New York.

And I think that what we are proposing today and what we'll be voting on today is a reflection of that, and it is a step forward in making sure that there is a lot of -- that we'll have that protection, particularly for these proposals, which are mostly about

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protecting the drivers. There was a big issue in previous relative to lockouts.

Personally, I was very upset about that. No one wants to go to any kind of work environment where they don't know for sure when they're going to be working.

So, by putting in what we did today, what we're proposing today, which is a 72-hour advance notice to any driver if they will not be available, plus the fact that if there is a lockout, there is a penalty and a fine that's pretty severe for each individual action, we feel we're moving in that direction, to ensure that people for whom driving a for-hire vehicle is their profession, is their career, that they will have some protection, and they will be able to earn an income that will make their life, as the magic word in New York City is today, so they can live affordably in the City of New York, and that's the direction that we're moving in with these proposals today.

So, I want to thank everybody on the Commission and all the staff for making this possible. We listen, and I think the

1 proponents who are here were helpful and we 2 listened, and I want to thank everybody 3 involved. 4 (Applause). 5 CHAIR DO: Thank you, Commissioner Bader. 6 7 Commissioner Bierstein. 8 COMMISSIONER BIERSTEIN: Yes. I just want to say, I wanted to thank our Chair, 10 Commissioner Do, and the staff of the TLC for 11 their hard work on these regulations. 12 Commissioner Do mentioned, it's been a 13 process of identifying the problem, finding 14 the regulations that would help to address it 15 and getting it through to today where we're 16 doing the vote, and I thank everyone for 17 their hard work. I think this is a really 18 important vote in terms of protecting drivers 19 from the predatory actions of companies that 2.0 would, you know -- that might otherwise be 21 exploiting drivers unfairly, and that this is 22 an important step in protecting drivers and 2.3 protecting their livelihoods. 24 (Applause). 25 CHAIR DO: Commissioner Velazquez.

1	COMMISSIONER VELAZQUEZ: Thank you. I
2	would like to thank you, Chair Do, and I
3	would like to also just thank my fellow
4	commissioners for their comments, and I
5	totally concur. I also want to thank the
6	staff at the TLC for working collaboratively
7	with the stakeholders in this room.
8	And just to add to what was eloquently
9	said, the drivers are part of the skeleton of
10	this city or part of the infrastructure. If
11	we don't have a strong skeleton and a strong
12	infrastructure, we will not be able to
13	support what New York City does every day.
14	So, what we are doing today ensure that
15	we are shoring that up, and I'm very proud to
16	be part of it.
17	Thank you very much.
18	(Applause).
19	CHAIR DO: Thank you, Commissioner
20	Velazquez.
21	And now, onto our official business, so
22	that we can vote on this extraordinary pay
23	increase.
24	MS. ELUTO: Okay. Commissioners, a few
25	items before the vote. So, the first item

1	before you are the minutes for the April 30,
2	2025, Commission meeting. I will now call a
3	vote to adopt those minutes.
4	All those in favor, please raise your
5	hands.

9	I will now call on our Director for
10	Base and Business Services, Fabian Cancel, to

15	Base Business Licensing Unit.
16	20 bases have been submitted for your
17	review, and we are awaiting your approval.
18	MS. ELUTO: Commissioners, any
19	questions, or can we move to a vote on
20	adopting the base license recommendations?
21	All those in favor of adopting, please raise
22	your hands.
23	(All hands raised).
24	MS. ELUTO: Thank you. They pass
25	unanimously.

1	MR. CANCEL: Thank you.
2	MS. ELUTO: Commissioners, we will now
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3	turn to Item 5A on the agenda, the driver pay
4	for high-volume for-hire vehicles rule
5	package. The proposed rules were published
6	in the City Record on January 3, 2025, for
7	public comment. A public hearing was held by
8	the TLC on February 5th, and the public
9	comment period ended on March 5th. On
10	June 20th, the final version of the proposed
11	rule was posted on our website and circulated
12	to the commissioners, along with the hearing
13	transcript and all written comments that were
14	received.
15	Commissioners, may we move for a vote?
16	All those in favor of adopting the rules
17	amended, please raise your hands.
18	(All hands raised).
19	MS. ELUTO: And the vote is unanimous.
20	(Applause).
21	AUDIENCE MEMBER: Let's do it again in
22	six months.
23	(Laughter).
24	CHAIR DO: All right. Today is a great
25	day for our drivers, for our advocates, and

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for all those who work in the for-hire
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             industry.
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                  (Applauses).
                   CHAIR DO: Your advocacy over the last
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             year has made today a reality. It is all of
             your outreach work and dedication that made
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             us to this point today. So, again, I want to
