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1 TLC PUBLIC HEARING 3/10/11 2 CHAIRMAN: --rules to their home 3 boroughs, both are currently in private practice and interestingly, so served in the 4 5 military, so - - the experience represented 6 on the commission. First, Nora Marino is an 7 attorney in Queens. She's a graduate of CUNY law school at Queens College. She is 9 an active member in numerous New York State 10 and Queens County professional associations. 11 She served as a first lieutenant in the Army 12 Reserve Jag Core. She now occupies the seat 13 of the Commission that was occupied so long 14 and so capably by former Commissioner Harry 15 Giannoulis. Nora's term runs through 16 January 2015, so we are really thrilled to 17 have Nora Marino join us. Speaking of Harry, 18 I just should mention, I want to call to 19 congratulate him on his new status. As a 20 former TLC Commissioner, he asked to be 21 excused from today because he had another 22 commitment, but he promised me that he would 23 join us for the April meetings so that we 24 can all meet in person and say our thank 25 you's for his long and extremely

    extinguished service. So, fear not, we will
2
    see Harry in April. Frank Carone is an
3
    attorney in private practice in Brooklyn.
4
    He's a graduate of Brooklyn Law School. He
5
    has a background in mortgage banking as well
    as in law. Early in his career he was a
6
7
    second lieutenant in the Marine Corp. He is
    active in numerous civil, charitable and
9
    professional organizations. Frank's term
10
    also runs through January 2015. I met Nora,
11
    really just at this process here. I've
12
    known Frank for several years and I couldn't
13
    be more delighted that he's joining us on
14
    the commission. I think that we are at full
15
    stretch. So that's kind of fun and exciting.
16
    So, we now have as strong of a commission as
17
    the legal New York City - - in this business.
18
    The office moved. So, don't get too
19
    sentimental but this will be the last
20
    commission meeting here at 40 Rector Street.
21
    You know, never say never. But, I have
22
    every expectation that this is the last
23
    commission meeting here at 40 Rector Street.
24
    We are relocating this office. Long Island
25
    City in Woodside will stay where they are
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```

    but this part of our operation will be
2
    relocating to 33 Beaver Street at the corner
3
    of Broad Street. As of today, as of 10:30
4
    today, I still expect that the move will
5
    take place a week from tomorrow. We will
6
    move in the afternoon and effective Monday,
7
    March 21<sup>st</sup>, we will be located at 33 Broad
    Street. I will tell you that there are-we
9
    did this on an aggressive schedule, and I
10
    want to just publicly commend and thank
11
    every Commissioner coming forward for
12
    supervising and managing this type of move
13
    and this pending move. As of last night,
14
    there were still some items on the punch
15
    list, including a couple of items necessary
    for the expectance for the - - department to
16
17
    improve the occupancy. So, at 2 p.m. today
18
    we've given them a drop dead date to finish
19
    that, so for people who have business here
20
    at the commission, at this office, by
21
    tomorrow we will know for sure whether we
22
    are actually moving tomorrow or not. If not,
23
    we feel quite certain we will be able to do
24
    it two weeks following. We'll give another
25
    two weeks and we'll do it two weeks
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```

    following. So, either a week from tomorrow
2
    or three weeks from tomorrow, we will be - -
     . If the move does take place as expected,
3
    I want you to know that our 40 Rector
4
5
    offices will be fully closed to the public
    on Friday, March 18<sup>th</sup>, and if not it will be
6
7
    on that following Monday. So, if you have -
    - closings for other business, please
8
9
    arrange for it to be done either on the
10
    Thursday or it will have to wait until the
11
    following week because we will not be open
    for business on Friday, March 18th. And in
12
13
    terms of phone calls and whatnot, I think
14
    you should expect that if you call us on
15
    Friday, on the moving day, likely we will
16
    not be able to return the call until Monday.
17
    Our computer systems at some point will be
18
    shut down and so forth, so I would ask for
    your intelligence there. At our next
19
20
    commission meeting we will be resuming our
21
    regular schedule the third Thursday of the
22
    month. That will resume in April and I'm
23
    confident that our committee meeting will be
24
    held in the new commission meeting room,
25
    again 33 Beaver Street on the 19<sup>th</sup> floor.

    couple of business items, other items before
2
    we move to the meeting today. First is this
3
    issue of service refusal. You may have seen
4
    the news from yesterday, Mayor Bloomberg
5
    made a strong statement. Nothing new here,
6
    but reminding both the public and the
7
    industry that TLC rules require that yellow
    taxis exempt all trips within the five
9
    boroughs-Drew, as you know, within five
10
    boroughs or Westchester or Nassau or Newark
11
    Airport. But that's a refusal of service to
12
    Brooklyn, Queens, anywhere within the
13
    boroughs, is a violation of TLC rules and we
14
    enforce it as best we can and we intend to
15
    continue to do that. We, the Mayor, drew
16
    this to the attention of the public because
17
    we've had an increase and it's troubling. A
18
    thirty-six percent increase in complaints of
19
    service refusal. That's the last six months
20
    compared to same six months a year ago.
21
    Thirty-six percent is a big number and we
22
    cannot let the quality of service
23
    deteriorate. So in addition to the
24
    enforcement that we have proposed let's say
25
    to the counsel, that will increase that fine
```

    for service refusals from, now it's a
2
    $200.00 to $350.00 range to a $500.00 fine
3
    for the first offense. So, counsel has
4
    indicated to us that they intend to enact
5
    this and so this is an issue that we want to
6
    take care of. On the FHB side, Saturday
7
    inspections. Again, we do not want to let
    the wait times for inspections get long, the
9
    way they did last year. We-Gary Rice and -
10
    - have done a terrific job in making sure
11
    that does not happen. In order to maintain
12
    our short response time, we are scheduling
13
    Saturday inspections beginning this Saturday.
    So in the FHB world we now have inspections
14
15
    slots starting this Saturday. We will keep
    it for at least the next three weeks,
16
17
    possibly longer depending on demand.
18
    want to keep appointment availability within
19
    the three to five day range that it has been
20
    at for a long time now. We're currently
21
    offering appointment 6 days out, so we're
22
    just above that five day range.
23
    Saturday hours will get us back to three to
24
    five days and even though tax payers,
25
    there's overtime cost here, but we don't
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```
1
    want to let that lag time get out so I want
2
    to make sure you know that. - - this
3
    Saturday - - we're closer there.
                                      Take
4
    advantage of the Saturday if you want to
5
    keep that wait time down. Rules change. As
    commissioners know and as I think the public
6
7
    knows, the mammoth comprehensive change and
    revision to the TLC Rule Book that was
9
    effected by the Commission over the past
10
    eighteen months becomes effective April 1st.
11
    A complete copy of the rule book is now on
12
    our website, conveniently located at the new
13
    rules - - labeling on the website. Under
14
    "new rules" on the website you can find a
15
    complete copy of the rule book. You can
16
    download it. I would recommend that you
    have an extra ream of paper available if you
17
18
    intend to print it out, but it is there on
19
    the website. And you will notice that the
20
    rules do not start with chapter one, but
21
    with chapter fifty-one. I know we open
22
    ourselves to some fun-making by doing that,
23
    but we thought that would be less confusing
24
    than having Rule 104 be completely different
25
    from the old Rule 104. So, 1-04. So again,
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```
1
    we're starting with chapter fifty-one in an
2
    effort to avoid confusion.
                                If anybody, you
3
    know, thirty years from now commissioners
4
    will say what were you thinking when you
5
    started with chapter fifty-one, blame me,
6
    okay. So, - - meeting. Just a quick
7
    preview of our schedule. We have a lot
    coming up and I'm saying this for the
9
    commissioners and also for the public
10
    because a lot of these items I will ask you
11
    to begin to look at and digest and think
12
    through and give us your feedback when we
13
    make them available as part of the
14
    commentary and not a couple of days before
15
    the meeting because for each of the next few
16
    meetings, significant, substantive rule
17
    proposals that we will be bringing before
18
    the commission. We are, as you know and I
19
    hope you feel, we are serious about the
20
    public feedback part and the staple feedback
21
    part, but it's a lot easier for us to digest
22
    your feedback if it's weeks before the
23
    meeting rather than a few days before the
24
    meeting. So, as soon as they become
25
    available, please take a look and start to
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```
1
    think - - . In April, you'll have the fine
2
    structure provision that we talked about at
3
    the last commission meeting. I won't repeat
4
    everything we said there, but this is to
5
    modernize outdated amounts and to increase
6
    consistency by eliminating ranges so it's
7
    not a different fine for the same offense,
    but a different quote room.
                                 To allow for a
9
    plea bargain discount, for people to pay a
10
    reduced fine if they plead guilty in advance
11
    and to eliminate inconsistencies between the
12
    same offense for different-depending on
13
    which license category is involved.
14
    what we will have available, not just the
15
    rules of course, which - - but we will
16
    prepare a kind of chart to make it easy to
17
    understand what is being proposed and that
18
    we will make available to anyone who wishes
19
    it sometime in the next couple of weeks-two
20
    to three weeks. That's April. In May we
21
    should have, or this is all pending which -
22
    - the law department process, but I think we
23
    should have maybe a revision to the rule
24
    defining the fitness standards.
                                     This has
25
    been an issue that many of you have been
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1
    concerned about for some time. Fitness
2
    standards currently in the rules and in the
3
    administrative code are kind of vague.
4
    means that quite frequently people that
5
    apply for a license go to have a fitness
6
    hearing before a judge. I don't think we
    offer the consistency of results that we
7
    should be offering, so what this rule change
9
    will do will be to define more clearly the
10
    categories of applicants that are not fit
11
    for a license. So, if today somebody
12
    applies for a license and they would have a
13
    drunk driving conviction from three weeks
14
    ago, the rules don't define that as not fit.
15
    Rather, that person goes to a fitness
16
    hearing and then the judge makes a decision.
17
    Now, I think in that case you can expect
18
    some consistency but in too many cases we
19
    don't. What we will propose are categories
20
    where people will know right of the bat that
21
    they do not qualify for a license so they
22
    don't have to go to licensing, spend months
23
    waiting to see what the answer is and then
    get the answer back if it's not a good
24
25
    answer. That's for May. For June, we
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1
    should have ready our new rule on
2
    accessibility for people with wheelchairs.
3
    As you know, we put out a request for
4
    information, we got back a wealth of
5
    feedback and I thank the industry for all of
6
    the feedback that you provided. The staff
7
    is working its way through that, I think
    pretty speedily. We hope to have for the
9
    June meeting, and we should have for the
10
    June meeting a proposed rule that will
11
    accomplish, I think, the goals that we set
12
    out that was discussed in January and also
13
    the goals that were shared by the industry.
14
    And somewhere, either in May or June, we
15
    will also have revisions to the owner must
16
    drive rules. As - - know, we've been
17
    working with commissioners. We have not
18
    talked about this previously, but we've been
19
    working with industry stake holders
20
    intensively on revisions of the owner must
21
    drive rules. What we now know is that
22
    there's been more non-compliance of the
23
    owner must drive rule than we would like to
24
    see. For each of the years 2009 and 2010,
25
    several hundred instances of people - -
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```
1
    owner must drive violation of medallions who
2
    were not driving vehicles. I think what our
3
    perspective is, and this points out both
4
    that maybe the rules are more rigid than
5
    they need to be and we should offer some
6
    more flexibility to the medallion owners and
7
    how they comply. But also, maybe in part
    due to the overly rigid nature of the rules,
9
    too many folks in the industry have gotten
10
    into the habit of non-compliance. So we've
11
    been working, as I said, quite intensively
12
    with some of the people in this room on a
13
    proposal that I believe we can present to
14
    you as a product of the staff work and with
15
    the support of the industry for how to
16
    revise - - driver rules. It might be ready
17
    by May, if not by June. Fair to say? Fair
18
    to say. And last but not least, Frasier - -
19
    has suggested a number of times that the
20
    commission meetings should not always be in
21
    downtown Manhattan, they should be in some
22
    of the other boroughs as well so that the
23
    public can have easier access to our - - .
24
    We're going to try that, so this, for you
25
    that come to these meetings, we are going to
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1
    try that and see how it works. And I know
2
    for some people it may actually be less
3
    convenient to go to a different borough, but
4
    for other people it may be more. So we're
5
    not saying this is going to be a regular
6
    practice, period. We're going to try it and
7
    see how it goes. We're going to start with
    the June meeting which I expect to take
9
    place in the Bronx. We don't have a
10
    location. When we know we'll give you
11
    plenty of advance notice as to where that
12
    will be. We're going to try that and see
13
    how it goes in the June meeting. With that
14
    I think you we get down to business.
15
    the first order of business before us is the
16
    Adoption of Minutes. You have in your
17
    packets the Minutes of the January 2011
18
    Commission Meeting. All in favor of the
19
    adopting of the Minutes say "aye".
20

         CHAIRMAN: Proposed "no". We have
22
    proposed the Minutes of the January 2011 are
23
    adopted. We have a number of Base
24
    Applications. Georgia you are still the new
25
    commissioner's assistant - - .

         GEORGIA: Good morning.
2
         CHAIRMAN: Georgia has been presenting
3
    the base applications for some time.
4
    was recently promoted within the TLC but
5
    she's still doing also these license
6
    applications, so she's got a double duty
7
    until she finds a replacement.
         GEORGIA: Thank you. Licensing would
8
9
    like to present before the Commission,
10
    twenty-four bases with a recommendation for
11
    approval.
12
         CHAIRMAN: Commissioners should have
13
    the list of do and renewal bases in your
14
    packet. All in favor of approving the base
15
    applications say "aye".
16
         [Collective "aye"]
17
         CHAIRMAN: Opposed "no". We vote the
18
    bases presented - - are approved and there
19
    is one base being presented for denial?
20
         GEORGIA: Correct, and licensing is
21
    requested that they be granted an additional
22
    thirty days so that they may submit the
23
    outstanding items.
24
         CHAIRMAN: All in favor say "aye".
25
         [Collective "aye"]
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CHAIRMAN: Opposed, "no". - - is
1
2
    adopted.

         CHAIRMAN: We have one rule before us
4
5
    today. General counsel Charles Frasier?
         MR. FRASIER: This is a proposed rule
6
7
    that was ordered for public hearing in
    January. It makes a variety of revisions to
9
    our license application process. At the
10
    January-there were no written comments
11
    received during the comment period and no
12
    one testified at the public hearing.
13
    though say that we wanted to rethink some of
14
    the deadlines in the proposal and we've done
15
    that. The revisions are stated in the
16
    bullet points in the end of the Statement of
17
    Basis and Purpose. We've shortened the
18
    deadline for renewal applications.
19
    renewal applications must be completed by
20
    the time the license expires rather than
21
    after the license expires which seems to
22
    make sense. And the new applications must
23
    be completed within ninety days for drivers,
24
    forty-five days for vehicles and ninety days
25
    for businesses. Those are shorter than the
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1
    deadlines in the originally published rule.
2
    The staff recommends that the Commission
3
    adopt the rule as revised.
4
         CHAIRMAN: Are there any-there's no
5
    opposed - - in public comment?
         MR. FRASIER: No comments.
6
7
         CHAIRMAN: Okay. If there are any
8
    questions, feel free, otherwise we will
9
    adopt the proposed rule. All in favor say
    "aye".
10

         CHAIRMAN: Hands voted, it's adopted.
13
    Thank you Charles and your staff. This is
    the technical stuff that takes hours and
14

    hours that Charles' staff worked, - - so
16
    thank you. With that, the meeting is

    your presence here this morning and I look
