

## **Recognizing Agent Orange Awareness Day**



August 10, 1961 is the date thought to be the first day that the herbicide and chemical defoliant Agent Orange was sprayed in Vietnam. Agent Orange Awareness Day marks the anniversary of the substance being sprayed in Vietnam for the first time and is meant to raise awareness of the effects of the herbicide used during the Vietnam War. Not only does Agent Orange Awareness Day bring honor to Vietnam Veterans, but it also brings light to the continuing toll of Agent Orange exposure.

Agent Orange has affected the lives of thousands of Veterans and Veterans who served in Vietnam may have certain related illnesses as a result of exposure to Agent Orange and other herbicides.

In 1980, President Jimmy Carter formed the Interagency Working Group to foster and oversee federal activities relevant to Veterans' concerns about the possible adverse effects of Agent Orange. The panel, which included officials from the <u>VA</u>, and the <u>Defense</u>, and <u>Health and Human Services Departments</u>, was created to oversee Agent Orange studies and supervise the work of the VA.

The <u>Agent Orange Act of 1991</u> responded to the many health-related concerns expressed by Vietnam Veterans in relation to herbicide exposure by requiring the VA to presume that Veterans who served "boots on the ground" in Vietnam were exposed to Agent Orange. Additionally, this landmark legislation cemented a presumption of service connection in which certain diseases were presumed to be service-connected and resulting from exposure to herbicides. In 2019, <u>Congress</u> passed the <u>Blue Water Navy Veterans Act</u>, which extends

VA benefits and disability compensation for Agent Orange exposure to Blue Water Navy Veterans who served in Vietnam and the offshore waters.

Part of the broader conversation that is happening over Veterans' rights, the <u>PACT Act</u> is a new law that provides healthcare benefits for Veterans who were exposed to toxins during their service. To ensure Veterans can receive high-quality healthcare services related to toxic exposures, the PACT Act establishes expanded healthcare eligibility to Veterans exposed to burn pits and other toxic substances. Vietnam war era Veterans and survivors also stand to benefit from the legislative triumph. Whereas the VA has for decades presumed certain deployments to Vietnam exposed Veterans to Agent Orange, the PACT Act now includes post-9/11 and pre-9/11 war operations in presumptions of service connection related to toxic exposure.

# FreshConnect Checks Offered for Veterans and Their Families



In collaboration with the <u>New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets</u>, the <u>New York State Division of Veterans' Services</u> is offering <u>FreshConnect Checks</u> to assist Veterans, servicemembers, and their immediate family members with access to healthy foods.

Each eligible Veteran, servicemember, or family member may receive \$20 worth of FreshConnect Checks for redemption at participating farmers' markets and farm stands. Recipients can shop with these FreshConnect Checks and redeem them for dairy, produce, meat, fish, eggs, or any SNAP eligible food items at any farmer's market or farm stand in New York.

You may be eligible to receive FreshConnect Checks through the New York State Division of Veterans' Services on a first come, first served basis, while supplies are available.

# Mayor Eric Adams and DVS Commissioner James Hendon Celebrate Victory for Veterans as PACT Act Signed into Law






