Coast Guard recognizes New York City as official Coast Guard City

New York City was re-designated a "Coast Guard City" by the Coast Guard this past Monday, an honor that recognizes New York's longstanding efforts to embrace Coast Guard members and their families stationed in New York during their tour of duty.

There are currently 29 cities that have received the distinction, and the designation must pass through Congress for approval. The designation comes with an active and ongoing commitment to acknowledge and empower the work of the Coast Guard members and make them feel at home while protecting our shores.

The ceremony pictured above was held port side of the famous *USCGA Eagle*, nicknamed "America's Tall Ship." Used for training by the U.S. Coast Guard Academy, the *USCGA Eagle* is the only square-rigger ship in U.S. government service.

Also on display was FDNY's fire boat, spraying its hoses in celebration of the renewed

promise.

At the event, the promotion of Captain Zeita Merchant was also announced, marking a historic achievement as the first Black woman selected for flag rank of Rear Admiral in the U.S. Coast Guard's 233-year history.

This August 10th marks the 62nd anniversary of the first use of Agent Orange in the Vietnam War.

The **58,479** who died in combat in the Vietnam War have their names engraved on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington DC and are forever memorialized. However, almost eight times that number, the **400,000** who died from Agent Orange illnesses after they came home from Vietnam do not have a monument in New York City.

Your participation is simple and straightforward. Come to the event and honor those we lost or are afflicted with Agent Orange caused illnesses. If you have a loved one who is suffering or has passed because of Agent Orange, give us their name and we will read out their name and light a candle for them at the dedication ceremony. 

There are lots of reasons that veterans put off getting screened for toxic exposures. Dan Nevins can relate.

"Damn, I've already paid all my dues. I lost both legs. I have a traumatic brain injury. I have all these lingering issues ... I don't deserve more!" says Nevins, who lost both his legs to a bomb blast in Iraq. But he's urging vets to go to the VA anyhow.

"Yeah, cancer doesn't discriminate," he says.

A cancer diagnosis surprised Nevins and his doctor two years ago. He's young and healthy with no clear risk factors, except having been in Iraq, where hundreds of thousands of troops were exposed to toxic fumes from burn pits — open fields where the military incinerated all manner of waste.

"They're like, 'Well, it could be some of the "environmental impacts" you had from your service,' " he says.

Nevis says he's lucky, because they caught it early. And he's also lucky because in the past, it might have taken years for the VA to grant that his cancer was connected to his service, the key to getting VA disability benefits. [READ MORE...]
