The best part of the entire experience was seeing New Yorkers and Veterans coming together to support our sea services as we celebrated the return of our "Away Team" and honored the sacrifice and memory of those who paid the ultimate price in service to this country.

Here's a brief roundup of some of the memorable events held around the city during Fleet Week and Memorial Day weekend.

NASDAQ Opening Bell:

Cue the confetti! Blue Star Families and Commissioner Hendon in partnership with CSX, rang the bell to start the trading day for the NASDAQ stock exchange. Parade of Ships and Reception:

America's naval power was on display (also Canadian, Italian, and British) as New York received 12 ships into its harbor. Guests arrived at the harbor nice and early to get a sea level view of the mighty ships passing through the Hudson river. Summit at One Vanderbilt

opened its doors to guests as well to provide the sky view, capturing the entire procession at 1400 feet! In the evening New York was invited aboard the USS Wasp to celebrate with our returning Sailors.

Fleet Week Kickoff Breakfast:

Mayor Adams invited our service branches to a delicious breakfast at Gracie Mansion to jumpstart New York's hospitality and celebrate our sea servicemembers. Secretary of the Navy Carlos Del Toro (born and raised in Hell's Kitchen) exchanged gifts with the Mayor and lauded the delicious spread.



Cypress Hills National Cemetery:

When we asked people to show up and help plant flags, we didn't expect such a massive turnout! As the old saying goes, "Many hands make light work," and over 26,000 flags were placed in less than 2 hours. Afterwards, <u>Neir's Tavern</u>, one of the oldest bars in the entire country, opened their doors to honor the occasion. Memorial Day at the Intrepid Sea, Air & Space Museum:

Celebrating our heroes, the Intrepid hosted hundreds if not thousands of visitors who paid their respects and learned some military history. High ranking military and civilian officials shed light on the significance of the day for us Americans as well as laying wreaths in the harbor for our fallen brothers and sisters.

Parades:

What is the Voice of Democracy Program?

Since 1947, the Voice of Democracy has been the Veterans of Foreign Wars' (VFW's) premier scholarship program. Each year, nearly 27,000 high school students compete for more than \$2 million in scholarships and incentives. Students compete by writing and recording an audio essay on an annual patriotic theme. This year's theme is, "What are the greatest attributes of our Democracy?"

Why Should I Enter?

Prizes and scholarships can be awarded at the Post, District, state and national level. Department (State) winners receive an all-expense-paid trip to Washington DC, to tour the city, be honored by the VFW and its Auxiliary and receive their portion of \$171,000 in national awards, the top scholarship being \$35,000.

The Rules

Who can enter?

The Voice of Democracy is open to students in grades 9-12 by the Oct. 31 deadline who are enrolled in a public, private or parochial high school or home study program in the United States, its territories and possessions; or dependents of U.S. military or civilian personnel in overseas schools. Although U.S. citizenship is not required, students must be lawful U.S. permanent residents or have applied for permanent residence (the application for which has not been denied) and intends to become a U.S. citizen at the earliest opportunity allowed by law. Foreign exchange students, students age 20 or over, previous Voice of Democracy first place state winners, GED or Adult Education Students are ineligible.

What do I need to enter?

Record your original 3-5 minute (+ or – 5 second max.) audio essay on a flash drive, or other electronic device. You will submit the recording, typed essay and this completed entry form. Provide these items to your school/group competition or VFW Post for judging. In addition you can submit your emailed entry form, essay, and audio file to the VFW Post upon approval. You must be the sole author of your essay. The recording must be in your own voice and in English. Hearing/speech impaired students should email the Voice of Democracy National Office at **youthscholarships@vfw.org** for special instructions. No music, singing, poetry or sound effects are allowed. The body of the essay must not identify you in any way, (including, but not limited to your name, school, city, state, race, or national origin) although the recording & typed essay should be labeled with your name, to show ownership.

Where Do I Submit My Entry?

All entries begin at the VFW Post level. The only exception is where schools/classes/youth groups have large numbers of students and wish to conduct their own competition, submitting one winner for each 15 students to the VFW Post. Individual students may submit their entry directly to the Post. Entries sent to VFW National will be returned. One winner for every 15 entries from each Post advances to District and one District winner advances to the state (Department) competition. If you need help finding a participating VFW Post, follow these instructions: First, visit this website vfw.org/FindaPost to "Find A VFW Post." If you do not have success in finding a Post, or if you have trouble getting in touch with them, you can contact your VFW Department (state) office to see if they can offer any information or assistance. What Is the Deadline for My Entry?

All entries competing at the Post level must be in the hands of that VFW Post by midnight, **Oct. 31**, **2023**. It is the responsibility of the student to meet this deadline by submitting their entry to the proper location by ensuring it is a participating Post.

What Are the Judging Criteria?

Originality is worth 30 points:

Treatment of the theme should show imagination and human interest.

Content is worth 35 points:

Clearly express your ideas in an organized manner. Fully develop your theme and use transitions to move smoothly from one idea to another.

Delivery is worth 35 points:

Speak in a clear and credible manner.

NYC Civil Service Job Openings and Exams



Open Competitive Exams

Police Officer - Police Officers perform general police duties and related work in the New York City Police Department including connecting and building relationships with the community. They patrol an assigned area on foot or in a vehicle to prevent crime; apprehend crime suspects; intervene in various situations involving crimes in progress, aided cases, complaints, emotionally disturbed persons, etc.; respond to and investigate vehicular accidents; investigate specific offenses; interact with prisoners; operate and maintain patrol vehicles; issue summonses; obtain information regarding incidents by interviewing witnesses, victims, and/or complainants; safeguard and voucher found, seized or recovered property; provide information to the public; handle situations involving maltreated, abused, or missing children; interact with juveniles; may be assigned to crowd control for large-scale events such as demonstrations, rallies and parades; prepare forms and reports; and testify in court.

School Safety Agent - School Safety Agents patrol designated areas of school buildings and surrounding areas; identify and prevent infiltration of unlawful or prohibited items through scanning; give routine information to visitors and direct them to the proper personnel and offices; request identification of, and remove from the premises, any unauthorized persons; aid sick and injured persons and call for medical, police or fire assistance, when needed; notify supervisors of all emergency incidents and complete any related documentation; respond to altercations between students and other persons, and attempt to separate the involved persons and resolve conflicts; maintain records of persons entering and leaving buildings; monitor security camera systems to ensure facility entrances are secure; identify persons violating Department of Education Rules and Regulations; apprehend persons violating the Penal Law and notify the proper administrative personnel; prepare reports and testify in regard to these violations at Superintendent's or Principal's hearings and/or in court; monitor and use radios to request assistance from co-workers; may operate motor vehicles; and perform related work.
