'The Wall That Heals Coming to Flushing Meadows Corona Park in Fall 2023 & Commemorating the 50th Anniversary of the End of Combat Operations in Vietnam



New York —The NYC Department of Veterans' Services (DVS) took part in a Vietnam Veterans Day Ceremony to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the end of combat operations in Vietnam. Organized by the United War Veterans Council (UWVC), the event brought together over two hundred members of the community to honor the service and sacrifice of America's Vietnam Veterans. Additionally, DVS and the UVWC announced that The Wall That Heals, a traveling version of the Vietnam War Memorial in Washington D.C., will visit Queens this fall.

For over a decade, men and women fought to protect and defend this nation during a period where American involvement in the Vietnam conflict faced public scrutiny both at home and abroad. Despite its controversial nature, our Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen and Marines served with valor, dutifully protected their brothers-and-sisters-in-arms, and asked for little upon their return home outside of dignity and

respect. More than 58,000 service members paid the ultimate price during the war, and over 1,500 remain missing or unaccounted for.

It is in this acknowledgment of the sacrifice and awareness of the controversy surrounding the Vietnam War that we have the chance to make clear to those who served that New York City still cares. Today, 50 years after the last American troops left Vietnam, we must recommit to the Veterans of this era and reframe our collective consciousness in a way that prioritizes the healing of every American affected by this conflict.

For the people of New York City the opportunity to remember and offer their respect will present itself later this year with The Wall That Heals—a three-quarter scale replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington D.C., along with a mobile education center, will be coming to Flushing Meadows Corona Park from September 28, 2023 to October 1, 2023 and will be free and open to the public. The Wall That Heals is a partnership with the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund (VVMF) that honors the more than three million Americans who served in the U.S. Armed forces in the Vietnam War.

"This week, we commemorate the 50th anniversary of the end of combat operations in the Vietnam War and honor the sacrifice of the brave men and women in uniform, our Gold Star Families, and all the families of those who have served our country so bravely," said **New York City Mayor Eric Adams**. "Those who have served know what it takes to put their life on the line on behalf of their fellow Americans. We owe you what we value most, our freedom, and hope that you will join us this fall when The Wall That Heals comes to Flushing Meadows Corona Park to honor and offer healing to our Vietnam War era brothers and sisters."

Trailblazers: The Women in Our Ranks Making History

Growing up in Edinboro, Pennsylvania, Bobbi Hovis spent most of her free time sailing and fishing. She was determined to do something unique with her life. Ms. Hovis graduated from nursing school in 1947 and was commissioned as an officer and nurse in the U.S. Navy. "I was the first Navy nurse to volunteer for Vietnam and the first Navy flight nurse to volunteer for Korea," she says. At the age of 38, then-Lieutenant Commander Hovis volunteered to go to Vietnam. There were very few U.S. servicewomen there at the time. Bobbi Hovis was in Saigon during the tumultuous early 1960s and witnessed many of the historic events that eventually led the United States into war in Vietnam. Ms. Hovis describes what it was like to fulfill her duties to heal wounded and ill Americans and Vietnamese while witnessing incidents like the 1963 Buddhist Crisis, and the chaotic and violent coup that overthrew and killed President Ngo Dinh Diem. During the coup, she was

almost shot by an insurgent and saved only by a balcony balustrade and a lucky ricochet. "Winston Churchill said one time, 'There is nothing so exhilarating in life than to be shot at and missed.' And that's what happened to me." She still has the bullet—as well as several other distinctive artifacts acquired during her barrier-breaking Navy career.

First woman in U.S. history to oversee a military service: Vice Admiral, Vivian Crea

The early 2000s saw more barriers broken by OCS's female graduates. In 2000, Vivien Crea became the first female officer promoted to flag rank and first to assume command of a Coast Guard district. In 2004, she served concurrently as commander of Coast Guard Atlantic Area and Coast Guard Defense Force East, becoming the first woman to serve in either role. In 2006, she became the 25th

Vice-Commandant of the Coast Guard under Adm. Thad Allen. Crea was the first woman to hold the second highest position in the Coast Guard or in any military service. Moreover, while serving as acting commandant, she was the first woman in U.S. history to oversee a military service.

Applicants must demonstrate an urgent need for critical financial support. All awarded funds will be paid directly to vendor if request is approved by EDF. All approved vendors (the company we are making the payment for on your behalf), must provide a W-9 form. A Form W-9 is a form available from the IRS. It is a commonly used form and provides information to EDF about the company (vendor) EDF will be paying. It includes Name of company, address, and their EIN, which is like a social security number for companies.

Goal: The Hope Fund for Critical Financial Assistance provides financial relief to all eras of military and Veteran caregivers through a grant that aims to put you and your family on the path to financial wellness. These grants aim to provide high-impact financial assistance to prevent or address a significant crisis or to improve the quality of life of the caregiver family. These grants fill the gaps that other programs may not cover.

How was the Hope Fund for Critical Financial Assistance Program developed?

The fund is made possible by the generosity of the Bob and Dolores Hope Foundation.

Who is eligible for the grant program?

- Adult caregiver, (18 years and older), for a military service member or veteran

Vendor or name of Company is legally able to receive taxable income



This week's artist highlight is **Amanda Raquel Dorval**. Amanda, originally from Queens, NYC, is a Nuyorican-Dominican artist, library professional, Middle Eastern Studies graduate student, and anti-war Veteran who served seven years in the US Air Force as an Arabic linguist. She received her BA in art history from Barnard College and graduated in May 2022 with an MS in Library and Information Science from Long Island University with a concentration in Archives Management, Rare Books and Special Collections. Amanda was the Bibliographer of Indigenous American art at The Metropolitan Museum of Art's Watson Library from 2021 to 2022. She was a 2022-2023 Research Fellow at the Hispanic Society Museum & Library, and also has library/archive experience at the American Museum of Natural

History, World Monuments Fund, Brooklyn Museum, Jewish Museum, and Wildenstein Plattner Institute. She is also currently pursuing a second masters degree in Near Eastern Studies at New York University, where she is interested in the cross-cultural influences between the Middle East and Latin America as well as visual culture and heritage in Iraq.

Digital photo drawing

Title:

"Are you the Veteran?"



Self-portrait diptych, with son. "'Are You the Veteran?'" is a self-portrait digital photo drawing that uses some humor in order to highlight some of the not-so-great aspects of being a woman Veteran of color.

Artist Statement:

I was born in NYC to Puerto Rican and Dominican parents, but my genetic makeup is Southern Iberian, Indigenous, and Western Sub-Saharan African. This mestizaje is reflective of the racial mixture that resulted from brutal colonialismo in the Caribbean after the arrival of Columbus in 1492.

My work explores Nuyorican experience and the cultural legacy of colonialism in Puerto Rico, though I also tie in aspects of my own military experience. I explore traditional themes and motifs that either come from Puerto Rico's indigenous Taíno culture, were brought over by European conquistadores, or which exemplify Nuyorican culture. My primary media includes beadwork, photography, embroidery, sewing, weaving, costume design, and Western painting techniques. I consider my artistic style mestizo, a mixture of indigenous and Western traditions which mirrors my own genetic mestizaje. The culture of the Taínos is prominent in my art. It is estimated that 60% of modern-day Puerto Ricans have Taíno DNA. Additionally, dark-skinned women are a dominating presence in my work. Finally, I often invoke religious themes which are entrenched in modern Puerto Rican culture.
