Credentialing and Military Job Translator through DOD COOL



Department of Defense (DOD) Credentialing Opportunities On-Line (COOL) is the result of extensive inter-Service collaboration to facilitate credentialing of Service members. All Services recognize the important role that occupational credentials can play in professionalizing the Force and in enhancing the Service member's ability to transition to the civilian workforce upon completion of military service. The Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps and Coast Guard each have their own Service-specific COOL programs designed to match military occupations to civilian credentials (occupational certifications, licenses, and apprenticeships) and provide resources to help Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen, Marines and Coast Guardsmen attain these credentials. The Services disseminate this information on their own COOL websites. DOD COOL is the umbrella site providing a single point of access to the Services' COOL websites.

In addition, DOD COOL includes the following features:

- DOD Civilian COOL Built from the same mold as its sister sites, DOD Civilian
 COOL helps federal civilian employees find detailed information on certifications
 and licenses related to their federal jobs. They can also use DOD Civilian COOL to
 get background information on credentialing and related topics.
- Military Occupations Explorer Learn how military occupations related to each other among the military branches, to civilian occupations and to civilian credentials.

The COOL initiatives began in 2002 when the Army launched the first COOL web site. In 2006, the Army and Navy entered into an agreement to allow for collaboration on COOL for Soldiers and Sailors. The Navy launched its COOL web site in 2006, and the Marine Corps and Air Force joined the COOL Team and launched their own sites in 2014. In 2019, the Coast Guard and DOD Civilian sites completed the COOL team.

The collaboration among the Services in implementing their COOL programs is in keeping with Department of Defense guidance to the Services to realize potential future savings and attain greater efficiency and effectiveness by combining joint functionality.

VFW Unmet Needs Program



The VFW understands the challenges that our active-duty service members (to include activated Guard/Reserve members) and their families can face, and they believe that experiencing financial difficulties should not be one of them. That's the premise behind the VFW's **Unmet Needs** program.

Unmet Needs is here to help America's active-duty service members (to include activated Guard/Reserve members) and their families who have run into unexpected financial difficulties because of deployment or other military-related activity or injury. The program provides financial assistance up to \$2,500 to assist daily necessities in the form of a grant – not a loan – so no repayment is required. To further ease the burden, they pay the creditor(s) directly.

The needs of our active-duty service members (to include activated Guard/Reserve members) and their families should never go unmet. Let VFW offer you a hand-up when you need it!

What does the Unmet Needs Program do?

 Unmet Needs provides grants (not loans) and referrals to other organizations to active duty service members and their immediate families to assist with daily necessities.

Who is eligible to receive assistance?

Service members who are currently serving on active duty (to include activated

Guard/Reserve members) whose financial hardship is a direct result of one of the following:

- A current deployment.
- Military pay error at no fault of the service member.
- Currently pending a medical discharge due to service-connected injuries/illnesses received while on active duty.

Who is not eligible to receive assistance?


Anyone who has not served in the military, or the financial hardship is caused by one of the following:

- Misconduct.
- Civilian, legal, or domestic issues.
- Issues that are a result of spousal separation or divorce.
- Financial mismanagement by self or others, or due to bankruptcy.

Second Round of Veterans Non-Profit Capital Program



The Veterans Nonprofit Capital Grant Program overseen by the New York State Department of Veterans' Services and administered by the Dormitory Authority of the State of New York, is a vital initiative dedicated to enhancing and enabling critical upgrades to the facilities of veterans organizations across the state. Following a successful first round with over \$2.5 million distributed, an additional \$2.4 million will be available through a second round of applications.

In this second round of funding, which will open for applications on **November 29**, **2023**, selected organizations will receive reimbursement for costs related to capital improvements, with awards ranging from \$25,000 to \$75,000. This invaluable support will enable these organizations to make critical upgrades, including new roofs, ADA-compliant enhancements, and renovations to common areas and kitchens.

A live presentation to provide interested organizations with information about how to prepare to apply for this funding opportunity was held on Friday, November 17 at 12:00 PM. A recording of the presentation has been made available on the DVS website.

On **December 16, 2022 at 12:00 pm**, Wreaths Across America will be at <u>Cypress Hills National Cemetery</u> to Remember and Honor Veterans through the laying of Remembrance wreaths on the graves of our country's fallen heroes and the act of saying the name of each and every veteran aloud.

History of Cypress Hills National Cemetery:

Cypress Hills National Cemetery, established in 1862, holds the distinction of being the first and largest national cemetery in New York City. Stretching 18 acres, it is the final resting place for some 27,000 individuals, spanning from the American Revolution to the Vietnam War. Among those interred are 24 Medal of Honor recipients, including three who received the honor twice. Last year's wreath-laying ceremony saw the placement of 6,048 wreaths, honoring the legacy and sacrifice of those interred there.

VA halts foreclosures for thousands of veterans about to needlessly lose their homes

The Department of Veterans Affairs is halting foreclosures for 6 months for veterans and servicemembers who have VA Loans.

The move follows an <u>investigation by NPR</u> that found thousands of veterans who took what's called a COVID forbearance are now at risk of losing their homes through no fault of their own.

"Helping Veterans and their families stay in their homes is a top priority at VA," said VA Press Secretary Terrence Hayes in a statement. "We are calling on mortgage servicers to pause foreclosures of VA-guaranteed loans through May 31, 2024."

The forbearance program was set up by Congress after the pandemic hit in order to let people who suffered a loss of income skip mortgage payments for six or 12 months, and then have an affordable way to start paying their mortgage again.

But in October 2022, the VA ended the part of the program that allowed

homeowners an affordable way to get current on their loans again, which has left many veterans facing foreclosure. The VA has a new program to replace it, but says it will take four or five months to implement. [READ MORE...]


