Crisis Intercept Mapping for SMVF Suicide Prevention





Service Members, Veterans, and their Families Technical Assistance Center

September is Suicide Awareness Month and we all know that crisis care for Veterans, service members, and their families (SMVF) requires a comprehensive and coordinated approach.

The NYC Department of Veterans' Services participated in the Veteran Suicide Prevention Training Session for military, civilian, medical and behavioral health professionals, first responders, and policymakers on August 22 at Bronx Community College. Led by the Service Members, Veterans, and their Families Technical Assistance (SMVF TA) Center of the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), the session helped community stakeholders visualize at-risk Veterans' need for support in a multitude of areas.

Eligible Veterans have a unique source of healthcare available through the <u>VA</u>. However, more than half of eligible Veterans do not use Veterans Affairs benefits, instead seeking care in community settings. To bridge the gap, participants, including <u>Bronx Community College President Thomas</u> <u>Iskenegbe, PhD</u> and <u>DVS Commissioner James Hendon</u>, created an SMVF crisis intercept map to trace out the crisis care system in the Bronx.

The mapping tool identified four key "intercept points" for diverting at-risk SMVF to effective prevention and support services: First Contact, Acute Care, Care Transitions, and Ongoing Treatment and Recovery Support. With the guidance of three expert facilitators, participants identified implementation strategies to improve crisis services for at-risk SMVF in New York City.

DVS looks forward to continuing this collaborative workshop series and invites local providers to join future meetings.
