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2. Staffing

The percentage of posts staffed with steady staff decreased significantly from the previous month due to the recent transfer of numerous steady staff to NIC as well as the pre-promotional Captain's Class. In adherence to the Staff Implementation Plan, the facility is looking to place additional staff on steady tours by the week of October 23rd, 2017.

3. Staff Training

- Safe Crisis Management
 - Number/Percent received (GMDC) – 844/93%
 - Number/Percent received (Department-wide) – 5,206/50%
 - Number/Percent current (GMDC) – 474/56%
 - Number/Percent current (Department-wide) – 3,103/30%

- Specialized Training - For its specialized housing units (Second Chance, TRU, and Secure) DOC will be providing additional training to include the following:
 - 2-day collaborative training (DOC and H&H) – focusing on DOC programming strategy, 14-point agenda, youth development, trauma, behavior modification principles, and unit protocols (to begin in November 2017 in Second Chance and TRU)
 - 1-day overview of Dialectical Behavior Therapy and programming strategies (to begin in December 2017 in Second Chance and TRU)

The Department will begin providing these trainings to young adult-only ESH housing units after they have been implemented in Second Chance, TRU, and Secure.

The class sizes will vary depending on the command's need. However, we expect the first class for the 2-day collaborative training to be offered to both uniformed and non-uniformed staff at GMDC and then move to RNDC. At this time, we estimate the first class will have a minimum of 30 participants. We will have more to share in November after the first cycle is completed.

d. *Provide a plan/timeline for being able to provide the number of classes offered and average number of participants for programming in comingled units.*

DOC faces a number of challenges to providing this level of programming data for comingled units, including the following:

- The census throughout the agency changes daily, and within a reporting period, some units may not remain comingled, while others may become comingled as young adults may be transferred in or out.
- DOC does not have an automatic mechanism for tracking comingled units on a daily basis, which would be required in order to report on daily programming for all young adults in DOC custody. Doing so manually is administratively time consuming.

In order to address these challenges and provide the requested data, the Adult Programming Division is creating additional reporting requirements which will ease the administrative burden and streamline the reporting process for program providers. DOC’s IT division will create a template to auto-report the Young Adults and Adults in each unit, which will be sent daily to Adult Programs staff. Adult Programs will create a template to track and report data. Once the IT reporting and template has been established, Adult Programs will then train all applicable staff. This is anticipated to be operational in 2 months.
