Additional officers began to be placed into steady assignments in December and January. However, these posts have not yet been officially awarded. Once awarded, increases in steady staffing percentages will begin to be reflected in upcoming reports.

- Safe Crisis Management
 - Number/Percent received (GMDC) – 887/96.3%
 - Number/Percent received (Department-wide) – 5,343/48.6%
 - Number/Percent current (GMDC) – 529/57.4%
 - Number/Percent current (Department-wide) – 2532/23%

- Specialized Training - For its specialized housing units (Second Chance, TRU, and Secure), DOC will be providing additional training to include the following:
 - 2-day collaborative training (DOC and H&H) – focusing on DOC programming strategy, 14-point agenda, youth development, trauma, behavior modification principles, and unit protocols
 - The 2-day training was not offered in January as there was an Emotional Intelligence Training by the Moss Group scheduled this month for designated staff from TRU, SCH, Secure, and ESH. 137 staff members were trained. Additionally, 5 designated staff members from ESH were provided training on American Prison Data System tablet assisted programming.
 - 1-day overview of Dialectical Behavior Therapy and programming strategies
 - The training has been postponed and the Department is evaluating whether the DBT overview and programming strategies can be integrated into the 2-day training.

The Department will begin providing these trainings to young adult-only ESH housing units after they have been implemented in Second Chance, TRU, and Secure.
