All inmates who were in punitive segregation on that date were released on or before March 23. From that time on, all inmates who serve 30 consecutive days are released for at least seven days before they may return to punitive segregation.

The use of segregation will be further reduced when use is prohibited for young adult inmates. Additionally, DOC has partnered with the Vera Institute of Justice to develop safe alternatives to segregation. This nearly two year project includes a year of policy and procedure assessment before reforms are recommended and implemented. DOC will share any recommendations with the Board when they are issued.
