Memorandum of Understanding Justice For Families' Consulting Committee

Safe Horizon, the local court system and community-based organizations have joined in a collaboration to provide visitation and exchange services for victims of domestic violence, dating violence, child sexual abuse, sexual assault, and stalking.

 WHEREAS, Safe Horizon, the Office of Court Administration, the Mayor's Office to Combat Domestic Violence, Administration for Children's Services, Sanctuary for Families, New York Legal Assistance Group, New York State Chapter of the Supervised Visitation Network, and the Children's Law Center have come together to collaborate in convening a Justice For Families' Consulting Committee; and WHEREAS, the programs herein desire to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) setting forth the responsibilities of the Consulting Committee.

Description of Partners/Partner Agencies:

Safe Horizon offers a range of services at nearly 70 sites across the five boroughs of New York City that help more than 250,000 victims of violence each year. Safe Horizon is the main gateway to the New York City domestic violence shelter system, operating a 24-hour domestic violence hotline and shelters for battered woman in all five boroughs. Safe Horizon has staff stationed throughout the NYC criminal and family courts, and Operates five Child Advocacy Centers, one of which is in Brooklyn. Staff is sought out as experts on issues of violence and victimization by programs around the country.

Esther M. Morgenstern - Esther M. Morgenstern is a Justice of the Supreme Court, Kings County. She presides over the Integrated Domestic Violence Court which provides an opportunity to address the myriad of inter related family issues that bring a family into the court system in a comprehensive manner while providing integrated service delivery and improving both court efficiency and informed judicial decision making. Judge Morgenstern was elected in 1995 and presided over the Domestic Violence Court in Criminal Court and the custody/visitation/family offense Part in Family Court. She was re-elected in 2005 and was instrumental in creating the protocol for the Model IDV Court.

The Office of Court Administration is the administrative arm of the court system, functioning under the auspices of the Chief Administrative Judge, who is responsible for supervising the administration and operation of the trial courts. OCA has taken a strong role in addressing domestic violence through the development of Domestic Violence Courts and Integrated Domestic Violence Courts. OCA hosts a workgroup through its Committee on Women and the Courts, on the judiciary's needs regarding supervised visitation. The Mayor's Office to Combat Domestic Violence - In November 2001, New York City voters approved an amendment to the City Charter to make the Commission to Combat Family Violence (established by Executive Order in 1994) into a permanent office of City government, headed by a Commissioner. OCDV formulates policies and programs, coordinates the citywide delivery of domestic violence services, and works with diverse communities to increase awareness about domestic violence and the resources and services available for victims in the City.

OCDV operates the NYC Family Justice Centers (FJCs) which are currently located in the Bronx, Brooklyn, Manhattan, and Queens, provide comprehensive multi-agency services for victims of intimate partner violence, elder abuse and sex trafficking in one location. Each Center is co-located with the local District Attorney's Office and has NYPD Domestic Violence Prevention Officers (DVPOs) on-site, in addition to staff from over 35 community organization partners who offer counseling services for adults and children, civil legal assistance, immigration assistance, economic empowerment and supportive services. The FJCs are walk-in Centers that provide free and confidential services regardless of the client's language, income, immigration status, gender identity or sexual orientation. A fifth Family Justice Center is expected to open in Staten Island in early 2016, making the NYC Centers the largest network of FJCs in the country.

On January 10, 1996, Administration for Children's Services (ACS) was created by Mayoral Executive Order. ACS became a permanent mayoral agency through a charter revision approved by New York City's voters in November 2001. ACS is the first NYC agency devoted solely to serving children and their families; its mission is to ensure the safety and well being of New York City's children. To fulfill this mission, ACS protects children by investigating more than 50,000 reports of abuse or neglect each year; helps families in need through counseling, referrals to drug rehabilitation programs and other preventive services; recruits and trains foster parents and caregivers to provide safe, temporary homes for approximately 27,000 foster children; assures that children in foster care find safe, permanent homes as quickly as possible, either with their birth or adoptive parents; assists older children in foster care in making the transition to adulthood through Independent Living programs; provides family day care and center-based child care, as well as Head Start programs; and ensures that non-custodial parents provide financial support. ACS has established the Office of Clinical Practice, Policy and Support, within the Office of Child and Family Health, which works across all program areas of the agency to ensure a coordinated and cohesive response to families affected by domestic violence, through policy and program development as well as staff training.

Sanctuary for Families is the leading nonprofit in New York State dedicated exclusively to serving domestic violence victims, sex trafficking victims, and their children. Each year, Sanctuary helps thousands of victims and their children build safe lives by offering a range of high quality services to meet their complex needs. These services include clinical, legal, shelter, children's and economic empowerment services. Sanctuary also works to end domestic violence and its far-reaching impact through outreach, education, and advocacy. New York Legal Assistance Group (NYLAG) is a nonprofit civil legal services agency serving domestic violence victims, immigrants, seniors, families facing foreclosure, renters facing eviction, consumers, those in need of government assistance, children in need of special education, persons with disabilities, patients with chronic illness or disease, members of the LGBT community, and others in need of free legal services. Founded in 1990, NYLAG works to empower individuals, protect fundamental legal rights, and promote access to justice among vulnerable New Yorkers. NYLAG provides direct representation, advocacy and consultation to domestic violence victims on contested and uncontested divorces, including maintenance and equitable distribution, child custody and visitation, family offenses and immigration matters.

The New York State Chapter of the Supervised Visitation Network (NYSSVN), is a multi-national, non-profit, membership organization, started in 1995 at a meeting of the New York Society for Ethical Culture in New York City. Its purpose is to give supervised visitation providers an opportunity to share ideas with the goal of assuring that children can have safe, conflict-free access to parents with whom they do not reside.

The Children's Law Center (CLC) is a nonprofit law firm funded by the New York State Office of Court Administration which provides representation to children in custody/visitation, domestic violence, and guardianship cases. The Mission of CLC is to give a child a strong and effective voice in a legal proceeding that has a critical impact on his or her life. The core values of the organization include: representation of high quality; respect for a child and advocacy of his or her wishes and interests in legal proceedings; specialized and enhanced representation that is sensitive to the psychological and emotional impact of a legal proceeding on a child.

II) History of Relationship

All of the named partners have been working collaboratively to enhance services to victims of domestic violence and their children, by participating in joint task forces, committees, and special projects. The organizations are represented in regular Brooklynbased and city-wide work groups and task forces, including the Lawyers Committee Against Domestic Violence, Family Justice Center meetings, the Brooklyn Family Court Domestic Violence Working Group, and the Integrated Domestic Violence Courts Stakeholders' meetings.

Beginning in the summer of 2010, the Consulting Committee was formed and Committee members have met quarterly. The Committee is committed to the project goals of supporting the creation of safe places for visitation and exchanges; supporting a borough-wide conversation regarding how to ensure safe visitation and exchanges, and providing recommendations regarding long-term sustainability as an essential component of a coordinated community response to domestic violence, dating violence, child abuse and sexual assault. The members are committed to participating in coordination meetings and assisting, as practicable, with the development of practice standards.

III) Development of Application

The development of the Brooklyn Family Court Consulting Committee began in the summer of 2010 when Safe Horizon reached out to potential members of the Committee. Outreach was made to providers of legal and social services to children and families, court representatives, and supervised visitation experts. The membership list was finalized and meetings were subsequently scheduled and held.

IV) Roles and Responsibilities

NOW, THEREFORE, it is hereby agreed by and between the partners as follows:

Safe Horizon will operate a supervised visitation program in Brooklyn, New York, modeled on Office on Violence Against Women (OVW)Guiding Principles. Safe Horizon will provide supervised visitation and/or monitored exchanges five days per week. Safe Horizon will take the lead in developing policies and procedures for the supervised visitation program, coordinate consulting committee meetings to seek the advice of partners regarding program policies and procedures, and be responsible for the daily operation and functioning of the supervised visitation program.

Esther M. Morgenstern is a Justice of the Supreme Court, Kings County who presides over the Integrated Domestic Violence Court (IDVC). Judge Morgenstern attends and participates in Consulting Committee meetings and uses her expertise to assist in the development of protocols and to enhance the supervised visitation and safe exchange programming. Judge Morgenstern works collaboratively with the Consulting Committee members to enhance services to victims of domestic violence and their children. The IDVC views supervised visitation as an important option to have available for all parties and will make referrals in appropriate domestic violence cases. Judge Morgenstern will give input regarding the referral and reporting process and court procedures.

The Office of Court Administration (OCA) is the administrative arm of the court system. OCA will work cooperatively to ensure safety at the supervised visitation program. A representative from OCA attends and participates in Consulting Committee meetings and provides expertise related to the safety of all parties in the supervised visitation and safe exchange programming. OCA works collaboratively with the Consulting Committee members to enhance services to victims of domestic violence and their children by participating in joint task forces and committees.

The Mayor's Office to Combat Domestic Violence (OCDV) formulates policies and programs, coordinates the citywide delivery of domestic violence services, and works with diverse communities to increase awareness about domestic violence and the resources and services available for victims in the City. OCDV operates the New York City Family Justice Centers. A representative from the NYC Family Justice Center, Brooklyn (BKFJC) attends and participates in Consulting Committee meetings and provides expertise related to safety planning for victims of intimate partner violence and their children to enhance supervised visitation and safe exchange programming. The BKFJC administrative team works collaboratively with the Consulting Committee members to enhance services to victims of domestic violence and their children and supports the creation of safe places for visitation and safe exchanges by participating in joint task forces, committees, and special projects that further the goal of a coordinated community response.

Administration for Children's Services (ACS) is the NYC agency devoted solely to serving children and their families. A representative from ACS attends and participates in Consulting Committee meetings and provides expertise related to the safety of children to enhance supervised visitation and safe exchange programming. ACS works collaboratively with the Consulting Committee members to enhance services to victims of domestic violence and their children by participating in joint task forces, committees, and special projects. ACS supports the creation of safe places for visitation and exchanges and participates in borough-wide conversations regarding how to ensure safe visitation and exchanges and provides recommendations regarding long-term sustainability as an essential component of a coordinated community response to domestic violence, child abuse and sexual assault.

Sanctuary for Families (SFF) is a nonprofit organization dedicated exclusively to serving domestic violence victims, sex trafficking victims, and their children. A representative from SFF attends and participates in Consulting Committee meetings, assists in the development of protocols, and provides expertise related to the safety of victimized parents and children to enhance supervised visitation and safe exchange programming. SFF works collaboratively with the Consulting Committee members to enhance services to victims of domestic violence and their children by participating in joint task forces, committees, and special projects. SFF supports the creation of safe places for visitation and exchanges and participates in borough-wide conversations regarding safe visitation and exchanges and provides recommendations regarding longterm sustainability as an essential component of a coordinated community response to domestic violence, child abuse and sexual assault.

New York Legal Assistance Group (NYLAG) is a nonprofit civil legal services agency serving domestic violence victims, immigrants, seniors, families facing foreclosure/ eviction and others in need of free legal services. A representative from NYLAG attends and participates in Consulting Committee meetings, assists in the development of protocols, and provides expertise related to the safety of victimized parents and children to enhance supervised visitation and safe exchange programming. NYLAG works collaboratively with the Consulting Committee members to enhance services to victims of domestic violence and their children by participating in joint task forces, committees, and special projects. NYLAG supports the creation of safe places for visitation and exchanges and participates in borough-wide conversations regarding safe visitation and exchanges and provides recommendations regarding long-term sustainability as an essential component of a coordinated community response to domestic violence, child abuse and sexual assault.

The New York State Chapter of the Supervised Visitation Network (NYSSVN) is a multi-national, non-profit, membership organization whose purpose is to give supervised visitation providers an opportunity to share ideas with the goal of assuring that children

can have safe, conflict-free access to parents with whom they do not reside. A representative from SVN attends and participates in Consulting Committee meetings and provides expertise related to the safety of victimized parents and children to enhance supervised visitation and safe exchange programming. SVN supports the creation of safe places for visitation and exchanges and participates in borough-wide conversations regarding safe visitation and exchanges and provides recommendations regarding long-term sustainability as an essential component of a coordinated community response to domestic violence, child abuse and sexual assault. SVN is committed to participating in coordination meetings and assisting, as practicable, with the development of practice standards.

The **Children's Law Center (CLC)** is a nonprofit law firm funded by the New York State Office of Court Administration which provides representation to children in custody/visitation, domestic violence, and guardianship cases. A representative from CLC attends and participates in Consulting Committee meetings and provides expertise related to the safety of victimized parents and children to enhance supervised visitation and safe exchange programming. CLC works collaboratively with the Consulting Committee members to enhance services to victims of domestic violence and their children by participating in joint task forces, committees, and special projects. CLC supports the creation of safe places for visitation and exchanges and participates in borough-wide conversations regarding safe visitation and exchanges and provides recommendations regarding long-term sustainability as an essential component of a coordinated community response to domestic violence, child abuse and sexual assault.

The roles and responsibilities described above are contingent on the receipt of the funds requested for this project in the DOJ/Justice For Families grant application. The beginning and end dates of this collaboration would coincide with the grant period, anticipated to be 2016 through 2019.

V) Timeline

Responsibilities under this MOU would coincide with the grant period, anticipated to be 2016 through 2019.

VI) Commitment to Partnership

- The undersigned organization representatives of the Justice For Families' Consulting Committee are committed to the following proposed goals of the project:
- The Committee members agree to collaborate and participate in the Justice For Families Consulting Committee, which includes reviewing supervised visitation guidelines, participating in quarterly meetings and contributing to the development of guidelines for safe and supervised visitations between children and their non-custodial parents.

 The Committee Members will assist in developing recommendations regarding. the program's long-term sustainability as an essential component of a coordinated community response to domestic violence.

VII) Relationship of the Parties

1) Each party to this M.O.U. is an independent entity and this M.O.U. does not constitute a joint venture, partnership, or other relationship between the parties.

VIII) Affiliation

1) Nothing in this M.O.U. shall limit the right of either party to affiliate or contract with other service providers.

IX) Financial Obligations

1) A party receiving services, or utilizing the other party's facilities, shall not thereby incur any financial obligation to the party providing such services or facilities.

X) Termination

1) This M.O.U. may be terminated by either party upon at least 30 days advance notice to the other.

Internal Memorandum of Understanding for the

This Internal Memorandum of Understanding (IMOU) affirms the mutual services and support that each of the following not-for-profit victim service providers, law schools, law firms, and New York City and State government agencies will provide in the operation of Sanctuary for Families' Courtroom Advocates Project (CAP), if funded through the U.S. Department of Justice, Office on Violence Against Women (OVW) Legal Assistance for Victims Grant Program. Sanctuary for Families (Sanctuary), New York State's largest not-for-profit provider of integrated services exclusively for victims of domestic violence, sex trafficking, sexual assault, and related forms of gender-based violence as well as child victims/witnesses, will serve as the lead applicant, with the New York Legal Assistance Group (NYLAG) and the New York City Alliance Against Sexual Assault (the Alliance) as funded subcontractors on an expanded CAP program that will reach both domestic violence victims in Family Court proceedings, as well as campus sexual assault victims exploring legal options available to them.

Since 1997, CAP has been a model public-private legal services program, leveraging modest staff resources with the pro bono services of hundreds of trained lawyers and law students to provide domestic violence and sexual assault victims with skilled, holistic legal advocacy and representation in order of protection, custody, visitation, child support, and matrimonial cases. CAP attorneys from Sanctuary and NYLAG annually provide intensive trainings to 600-700 law students from all 12 New York City area law schools, and summer associates from close to 40 major NYC law firms. These "CAP Advocates" help domestic violence victims obtain orders of protection from New York City Family Courts, working with them to draft and file their petitions pro se, advocating for them during court appearances, educating them about their legal rights and remedies, and providing them with safety planning and referrals to Sanctuary and NYLAG resources, such as immigration lawyers, as well as community resources such as shelters and counseling. In addition to recruitment and training, CAP attorneys offer close supervision of cases being handled by CAP Advocates. They also assume representation of complex cases in both Family Courts and the Integrated Domestic Violence Courts, in which a single judge handles criminal, family, and matrimonial disputes for families where domestic violence is an underlying issue. These attorneys' deep experience in holistic legal representation is critical to their ability to handle a range of different case types.

This year, with a new partnership with the NYC Alliance Against Sexual Assault (the Alliance), we will add a "CAP II" training module on Campus Sexual Assault for a select, motivated group of law school students who have already participated in the original intensive "CAP I" program. Building on the success of Sanctuary's campus sexual assault legal service program at Columbia University (a funded program that will be an in-kind contribution to the LAV funding request), and on CAP's highly successful Family Court training program, CAP II will train an estimated 25 CAP Advocates per year on work with campus sexual assault victims. With extensive technical assistance from the Alliance, we will develop a CAP II curriculum on sexual assault,

and a CAP II training manual. Parallel to the core CAP Family Court program, trained CAP II Advocates will: (1) assist campus sexual assault victims with safety planning; (2) help them access available resources for acute and/or other necessary follow up medical care; (3) advise them on advantages and disadvantages of pursuing criminal, and civil proceedings; (4) walk them through campus disciplinary proceedings and (5) prepare them for proceedings as complainants in criminal cases, petitioners in Family Court civil protective order cases, and/or campus disciplinary hearings.

CAP II trainings would also give Advocates the tools to do student outreach at their own school and/or other undergraduate campuses. In addition to technical assistance, the partnership with the Alliance will help Sanctuary build a mutual referral relationship with rape crisis centers (there are 17 in New York City) to provide clinical support to identified campus sexual assault victims and to refer victims to Sanctuary and the CAP II program for legal support. Several law schools have also expressed enthusiastic support for the Campus Sexual Assault training program, and would host approximately 2 trainings per semester, which students from law schools citywide would be eligible to attend.

Sanctuary, NYLAG, and the Alliance also agree to refer cases when appropriate and necessary. The Alliance, as a Co-chair of Sexual Assault Task Forces in two boroughs out of five, will introduce Sanctuary and the CAP program to Task Forces in all five boroughs to help ensure the network of referrals and support to the victims.

Lead Applicant: Sanctuary for Families (Sanctuary) is New York State's leading not-for-profit provider of integrated services exclusively for victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sex trafficking, and related forms of gender-based violence as well as child victims/witnesses. Founded in 1984 as a small network of safe homes, Sanctuary has for the past 31 years provided a comprehensive portfolio of legal, clinical, shelter, and economic stability services that has reached hundreds of thousands of the New York metropolitan region's most vulnerable domestic violence victims and child witnesses. Last year, Sanctuary's direct services reached over 14,500 adult abuse victims and children, complemented by extensive community outreach and training.

Since its inception, Sanctuary has recognized that it is not enough to offer victims immediate shelter from batterers; they also require an array of supportive services to ensure that they remain safe and thrive in the long run. Sanctuary is dedicated to providing holistic services with an empowerment philosophy that focuses on each client's strengths and needs. Sanctuary's understanding of domestic violence and related forms of gender violence is rooted in the concept of power and control.

In January 2011, Sanctuary's Board of Directors adopted a new Mission Statement, reflecting a commitment to a spectrum of related forms of gender-based violence. It reads: Sanctuary for Families is dedicated to the safety, healing and self-determination of victims of domestic violence and related forms of gender violence. Through comprehensive services for our clients and their children, and through outreach, education, and advocacy, we strive to create a world in which freedom from gender violence is a basic human right.

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Sanctuary has 200 full- and part-time staff working out of 5 offices, 5 shelters, and 9 public housing police stations located in Manhattan, Brooklyn, Queens, and the Bronx. Sanctuary's main office in lower Manhattan provides clinical, case management, legal, and job training services for adult victims and children. Sanctuary has full-time legal and children/family clinical staff working at three New York City Family Justice Centers (FJCs) in Brooklyn, Queens, and the Bronx, where they collaborate closely with more than 20 other not-for-profit organizations who also have on-site staff, as well as dedicated domestic violence prosecutors and police. Sanctuary also administers a 58-family transitional shelter in the Bronx and four small emergency shelters in Brooklyn. A new project at 9 public housing police stations provides case management and clinical support to vulnerable victims and families who file domestic incident reports with the police. Through active recruitment of bilingual and bicultural staff, Sanctuary offers services to clients in over 30 languages; many more languages are represented by hundreds of *pro bono* attorneys and volunteers.

Sanctuary's Center for Battered Women's Legal Services (the Legal Center) is New York City's leading provider of free legal services to domestic violence victims, trafficking victims, and their children. Established in 1988, the Legal Center has 40 staff attorneys with broad expertise in family law, matrimonial, immigration, public benefits, housing, and other practice areas critical to impoverished families who comprise the vast majority of clients. Staff attorneys work out of all five Sanctuary office locations in Manhattan, the Bronx, Brooklyn, and Queens, as well as in the Family Courts and Integrated Domestic Violence Courts. Additionally, the Legal Center enlists assistance from over 500 *pro bono* attorneys from 40 major law firms, greatly leveraging its service capacity. In addition, since last year, Columbia University has engaged the Legal Center to offer representation to student complainants in sexual assault cases at disciplinary hearings under the school's new Gender-Based Misconduct Policy, providing funding for a new sexual assault attorney.

In addition to providing <u>legal representation and advice</u> to 6,000 victims annually in order of protection, child custody, child support, divorce, immigration, housing, and public benefits cases, Sanctuary provides <u>crisis and transitional shelter</u> to 200 women and children each night (500 annually); <u>hotline/legal helpline assistance and referrals</u> to 5,000 callers annually; and <u>individual/group counseling and case management</u> to over 1,000 adults and children/teens annually. The <u>Children & Youth Services Program</u> provides counseling, educational, childcare, and recreational services to over 3,000 children annually. The <u>Economic Empowerment Program</u> provides an intensive service-sector job training program to 150 participants annually, and many more receive additional services including ESOL, GED/TASC courses, internships, and other occupational trainings. Sanctuary also provides grants for victims facing eviction or utilities shut-off, food pantries and clothing closets, public benefits assistance, and financial literacy trainings. Sanctuary staff conducts an extensive program of <u>outreach and professional training</u>, which reached 40,000 individuals last year.

<u>New York Legal Assistance Group (NYLAG)</u> is a civil legal services agency with expertise in housing, benefits, family, and immigration law, and has partnered with Sanctuary on CAP since the program's inception in 1997. NYLAG has been a sub-grantee partner in all of Sanctuary's LAV grants, employing CAP's Brooklyn Supervising attorney as a full-time staff member. Law students enrolled in NYLAG's Domestic Violence Clinical Center participate in CAP and later

often represent clients under NYLAG's student practice order. NYLAG has been closely consulted in the development of this application, and would contribute XXXX in matching funds over three years to support the salary and fringe of its CAP attorney. NYLAG's expertise representing crime victims, earned through years of receiving OVC funding, will complement CAP II.

The New York City Alliance Against Sexual Assault is the recognized "go-to" organization in new York City for training and technical assistance on sexual violence, with a mission focused on preventing sexual violence and reducing the harm it causes through education, research, and advocacy. The Alliance works closely with the City's rape crisis programs and hospitals, District Attorney's Offices, Police Department, court officials, and city leaders in all five boroughs to develop and implement best practices and policies, raise public awareness, and create sustainable change for survivors. The Alliance has provided leadership, vision and guidance with shaping comprehensive gender-sensitive and community-centered primary prevention approaches for the 76 rape crisis and sexual violence prevention programs. The Alliance also served on the New York State Department of Health's Sexual Violence Primary Prevention Committee to develop the State's Sexual Violence Primary Prevention Plan for 2009-17. Central to the Alliance's mission is its Sexual Assault Forensic Examiner Training Institute (SAFETI), the State's largest DOH-certified training program for emergency department and medical professionals, which last year trained 554 medical and human services professionals from over 120 organizations. The Alliance also provides technical assistance to members of the Sexual Assault Multidisciplinary Taskforce (NYPD, prosecutors, medical and rape crisis program providers) citywide, serving as a co-chair in both Brooklyn and Bronx task forces.

The Alliance will participate in the CAP II trainings, educating CAP Advocates on key topics including effects of trauma and multidisciplinary resources (acute care, criminal justice, rape crisis advocates, and law enforcement). CAP Advocates will also be supported by processing cases with the Alliance's Licensed Social Worker (LCSW), Josie Torielli, in a group setting. The Alliance will provide ongoing support to CAP Advocates as necessary.

Other Partners: CAP collaborates with an array of community-based organizations (CBOs) serving immigrant and other traditionally marginalized abuse victims including disabled, elderly, teen, and LGBT victims. CAP provides trainings to CBO staff, provides legal advice and technical assistance on an ongoing basis, accepts referrals from them for direct representation of CBO clients, and makes referrals for some culturally specific social services. CBO collaborators who have pledged their support on this IMOU are: Mt. Sinai SAVI - Sexual Assault and Violence Intervention Program (free and confidential therapy, advocacy, support, and referral services to survivors of all forms of sexual violence and domestic violence), African Services Committee (agency dedicated to improving the health and self-sufficiency of the African community in New York City and beyond), Barrier-Free Living (agency that provides counseling, case management, advocacy, and other services to domestic violence victims with disabilities), Day One (organization focusing solely on dating abuse among youth), The Healing Center (Brooklyn faith-based DV program assisting Latina immigrant victims through the provision of supportive therapeutic services), The Korean American Family Services Center (a Queens-based domestic violence agency offering individual and group counseling and community outreach to Koreans), The New York Asian Women's Center (a NYC-wide domestic

violence agency offering individual and group counseling, shelter, and outreach to a range of Asian populations), and <u>Northern Manhattan Improvement Corporation</u> (a community organizing group and service provider to the poorest families of Washington Heights and Inwood).

Law School Partners: The 12 aforementioned law school student organizations will recruit students, host and coordinate trainings twice annually, and mentor law students. Each law school provides in-kind contributions including training facilities, copies of training materials, and a hotline for CAP clients to call and reach their CAP Advocate with any questions or concerns during their case.

Law Firm and Corporate Partners: In addition to the six law firms that have signed this IMOU as members of the CAP Advisory Committee, CAP will continue to collaborate with close to 40 law firms and corporate legal divisions whose summer associates participate in CAP and whose attorneys represent CAP clients *pro bono* in family law matters. <u>NYC Family Courts</u>: New York City's Family Courts all collaborate closely with CAP. CAP attorneys and advocates assist victims in the NYC Family Courts with the express permission and support of the court system and the City of New York. The Family Courts have worked with CAP for many years, beginning in 1997 in Manhattan Family Court and expanding to the Family Courts in Brooklyn, Queens, the Bronx, and Staten Island in the following years, providing use of space in the petition rooms at the court buildings as well as on-site computers and printers.

Integrated Domestic Violence (IDV) Courts: CAP attorneys handle multiple cases for CAP clients in the IDV Courts, which operate on the "one family/one judge" model, centralizing the handling of criminal, family (civil), and matrimonial (divorce) disputes for families where domestic violence is an underlying issue. Like CAP's long-standing efforts to simplify the Family Court process for domestic violence victims, the IDV Courts are intended to simplify the often confusing court process for vulnerable families. CAP has been working in the IDV Courts since 2004, and its attorneys provide a significant amount of direct representation at these courts.

<u>The New York City Mayor's Office to Combat Domestic Violence (OCDV)</u>: In November 2001, New York City voters approved an amendment to the City Charter to make the Commission to Combat Family Violence (established by Executive Order in 1994) into a permanent office of City government, headed by a Commissioner. OCDV formulates policies and program, coordinates the Citywide delivery of domestic violence services, and works with

diverse communities to increase awareness about domestic violence and resources and services available for victims. OCDV operates the NYC Family Justice Centers (FJCs), currently located in the Bronx, Brooklyn, Manhattan, and Queens, and provide comprehensive multi-agency services for victims of intimate partner violence, elder abuse and sex trafficking in one location. Each Center is co-located with the local District Attorney's Office and has NYPD Domestic Violence Prevention Officers (DVPOs) on-site, in addition to staff from over 35 community organization partners who offer counseling services for adults and children, civil legal assistance, immigration assistance, economic empowerment and supportive services. The FJCs are walk-in Centers that provide free and confidential services regardless of the client's language, income, immigration status, gender identity, or sexual orientation. A fifth FJC is expected to open in Spring 2016, making the NYC Centers the largest network of FJCs in the country. Sanctuary has been a legal services partner at the four current FJCs since the first FJC opened in Brooklyn in 2005. CAP attorneys collaborate closely with other Sanctuary immigration and family law attorneys working at the FJCs, as well as the many other on-site community-based organizations and government entities.

<u>Commitment to Sustaining the Partnership</u>: Sanctuary for Families, the New York Legal Assistance Group, the New York City Alliance Against Sexual Assault, and the aforementioned not-for-profit organizations, government agencies, law firms, and law schools agree to the partnership outlined in the attached proposal, and are committed to achieving the stated goals both for domestic violence victims seeking legal advice and assistance in Family Court and for campus sexual assault victims seeking legal advice and assistance in civil court or campus disciplinary hearings.

CAP is a flagship program of Sanctuary's Legal Center. Sanctuary's Board of Directors and Development Department work together closely to ensure the long-term stability of the agency and its core programs, including CAP. Over the years, Sanctuary has developed a strong base of funders committed to CAP and other core Legal Center projects, including a foundation grant of \$300,000 over two years renewed in 2015 specifically for CAP, as well as additional dedicated CAP funding through the NYS Office of Court Administration's Civil Legal Services Program.

<u>Commitment to Campus Sexual Assault Priority:</u> In addition to continuing and building on the highly successful efforts of the CAP Family Court program, the partners commit to developing and implementing legal services targeted specifically at college and university students to identify and serve victims of campus sexual assault.

Approval of Budget and Additional Resources Provided by Sanctuary and Partners: The three funded partners—Sanctuary, NYLAG, and the Alliance—have all seen and approved the proposed project budget for a total of \$599,999 over three years, with a total of \$474,633 over 3 years allocated to Sanctuary for salary and fringe benefits of three attorneys as well as OTPS and travel costs; \$84,116 over 3 years allocated to NYLAG for salary and fringe of a staff attorney; and \$41,250 over 3 years allocated to the NYC Alliance Against Sexual Assault for training, technical assistance and coordination activities as detailed in the Budget and Budget Narrative.

Pending receipt of a Legal Assistance for Victims grant at the requested level, Sanctuary would contribute in-kind matching funds of approximately \$400,000 per year in salaries and fringe

benefits for two additional family law attorneys and a paralegal/project assistant as well as the balance of salaries and fringe for the three attorneys shown on the budget. Sanctuary will also offer full in-kind support from its extensive additional program staff, which includes 36 additional attorneys; 50 counselors, case managers, and clinical support staff; 10 staff in our service-sector job training program; and 35 shelter staff working out of a large transitional shelter and four crisis shelters. NYLAG would contribute approximately \$66,600 per year matching funds to support the salary and fringe of its CAP attorney. CAP receives extensive inkind support from the Family Courts, including use of workstations, printers, and computer terminals in the courthouse. CAP Advocates closely coordinate with Legal Center attorneys who have office space, networked computers, and instant access to interpretation in over 150 languages through the City's Language Line in the four Family Justice Centers, located in the secure District Attorneys' Offices buildings in the Bronx, Brooklyn, Manhattan, and Queens. CAP trainings are held at law schools and law firms, with all costs borne by the hosts as in-kind contributions. Law firm collaborators also provide extensive in-kind matching support through hundreds of pro bono attorney hours, financing in full the printing costs for the large CAP Training Manuals, and covering legal fees (e.g. court filing fees) for DV victims' cases on which they are working.
