





Grenville Clark Says U. S. May Face Decision on Resorting to Arms to Save Britain

Shortly before Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt Sr. unveiled an equestrian statue of the late President Roosevelt at the entrance of the New York State Theodore Roosevelt Memorial at the American Museum of Natural History, Central Park West and Seventy-ninth Street, yesterday afternoon, Grenville Clark, attorney, warned that this country might have to decide whether it would resort to arms to prevent defeat of Great Britain by the dictators.

Mr. Clark was one of three recipients of the Roosevelt Distinguished Service fedals for 1940. The others were Homer Folks, secretary of the State Charities Aid Association of New York, and Chester H. Rowell, California publicist. The unveiling and the awards were part of the cremonies commemorating the eighty-second anniversary of the birth of Theodore Roosevelt.

James R. Garfield, president of the Roosevelt Memorial Association, presented the medals after Hermann Hagedorn, secretary and ex-














