BRIEF REMARKS OF DOI COMMISSIONER MARGARET GARNETT AT CITY HALL PRESS CONFERENCE ANNOUNCING INVESTIGATION OF NYPD'S INTERACTION WITH NEW YORK CITY PROTESTORS

Thank you, Mr. Mayor. I think we all know that our City is in crisis, with the events of this weekend only the latest manifestation of that. It's clear that the vast majority of protestors were peaceful and the vast majority of police action was appropriate. But I want to be clear that where that was not the case, we rightly have a higher standard for the police who are given tremendous power and who we rely on to protect us and to deal appropriately with criminal activity when it does occur.

As the Mayor said, I spent most of my adult life working in law enforcement but with the overarching principle of trying to do justice. So, I really look forward to working with Jim Johnson on this important effort which I know will be guided by the facts and the law and which I hope will be a positive contribution to improving the relationship between our City and the NYPD. So, thank you.

DOI is one of the oldest law-enforcement agencies in the country and New York City's corruption watchdog. Investigations may involve any agency, officer, elected official or employee of the City, as well as those who do business with or receive benefits from the City. DOI's strategy attacks corruption comprehensively through systemic investigations that lead to high-impact arrests, preventive internal controls and operational reforms that improve the way the City runs.
