


















Recommendations

- <u>Street cleaning score 5</u> check 311 data to identify most frequently complained about locations and coordinate efforts with DSNY to increase street cleaning activities and also improve enforcement of fines for littering or other activities.
- <u>Street conditions score 3</u> check 311 data to identify most frequently complained about locations and coordinate efforts with DSNY to increase street cleaning activities and also improve enforcement of fines for littering or other activities. Coordinate efforts with Department of Parks and other city agencies to improve the streetscape and maintenance of streets and sidewalks in the district.
- <u>Potholes score 3</u> check 311 data to identify most frequently complained about locations and lobby and advocate DOT to improve maintenance of the streets in the district.
- <u>Signage and wayfinding score 2</u> lobby DOT to better maintain signage in the district and explore programs that involve collaboration with local artists and designers to come up with creative wayfinding solutions. Makes a stronger case for DOT to carry out the traffic and congestion study that is being pushed for by CB1. Coordinate efforts with Buro Happold on the development of a tourist trail map, and with Downtown Alliance to improve wayfinding in the district.
- Average response times of emergency (EMS & FDNY) vehicles score 8 and 9 coordinate efforts with DOT and other city agencies to relieve congestion and promote programs.
- Adult stability score 0 more renters in the area, so more difficult to form long term bonds and community building. This also makes residents more vulnerable to increasing housing costs. As residents in the district move away due to affordability issues or due to other factors in the district, it makes it hard to plan for the future demand of residents effectively. Programs to promote affordable housing options and rent stabilization may be promoted to retain residents long term.
