NYC's Annual HOPE & Youth Count

As a requirement for receiving funding from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), NYC must conduct an annual Homeless Outreach Population Estimate (HOPE). Also included is the annual NYC Youth Count, an extension of the citywide HOPE Count. HOPE is operated by DHS/DSS, while the Youth Count is conducted by DYCD. Both seek to estimate the number of individuals who are experiencing street homelessness.

HUD 2023 Annual Homeless Assessment Report

A new report from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) which provides estimates of homelessness in the U.S. The 2023 report **estimates that approximately 653,100 people were experiencing homelessness on a single night in 2023 – a 12% increase (or about 70,650 more people) from 2022**. Among people experiencing homelessness, 60% were staying in sheltered locations, while 40% were experiencing unsheltered homelessness in places not meant for human habitation. The 2023 Point-in-Time (PIT) count is the highest number of people reported as being unhoused since reporting began in 2007. Check out the report here!

Provider Spotlight: Special NOFO Series

In the third installment of our ongoing Provider Spotlight: Special NOFO Series, this month the CoC would like to spotlight **Gay Men's Health Crisis, Inc. (GMHC)** who was recently awarded funding from HUD's <u>Special NOFO</u> for their project **Connection to Housing and Care.**

Gay Men's Health Crisis, Inc. (GMHC) was founded after eighty men gathered in writer Larry Kramer's apartment to address the "gay cancer" and to raise money for research in 1981. This informal meeting provided the foundation of what would soon become Gay Men's Health Crisis (GMHC). GMHC's six founders were Nathan Fain, Larry Kramer, Larry Mass, Paul Popham, Paul Rapoport, Edmund White. Households Access Homeless Support Services and Avoid Homelessness

HUD helped more than 424,000 households across the nation access homeless support services and exit or avoid homelessness in 2023.
Collaborating with public housing authorities (PHAs) across the country to help more than 94,000 households exit or avoid homelessness in 2023, including more than 56,900 households through incremental Housing Choice Vouchers (HCVs), more than 8,200 households through public housing, and more than 28,200 households through the Emergency Housing Voucher (EHV) program. New York Plan to Pay Landlords to Fix and Rent SROs

New York State has a plan to pay landlords who rent out single room occupancy (S.R.O) units to fight homelessness by slowing the decades-long decline in the number of small, cheap rental homes. Through the program, the state will spend about \$50 million to help landlords repair and renovate about 500 S.R.O.s and keep them livable and on the market. It is the first time the state has funded such an effort, and is something of a reversal in attitudes toward S.R.O.s, which for many years were targeted for elimination by government policies.

While there used to be as many as **100,000 S.R.O.s in New York City**, according to the New York University Furman Center, the number began to decline in the mid-20th century, when they became associated with poverty, overcrowding and unsanitary conditions. <u>Click here to read the article!</u>

NYC Housing Production Snapshot

Back in June New York City's Department of City Planning released the NYC Housing Production Snapshot for 2022. Findings from the report show that **25,936** homes were completed in new buildings in 2022, with **Brooklyn accounting for 32** percent of the new completions.

There was also a significant increase in new building permits issued from past years. By all indicators, the expiration of the 421-a tax benefit in June 2022 drove developers to speed up projects to qualify for the tax benefit. Click here to view the report!
