4	MR. FIDEL F. DEL VALLE, ESQ.,
5	CHAIRPERSON, COMMISSIONER & CHIEF ADMINISTRATIVE
6	LAW JUDGE, OATH: Good morning everyone.
7	ALL: Good morning.
8	MR. DEL VALLE: We may have some guests
9	from the People's Democratic Republic of China
10	coming in later on to observe, take notes and
11	collect our names, I don't know. So if you see
12	some folks coming in, it's about six or seven of
13	them, that's what that's all about. They're from
14	Yale University. They're in a program at Yale.
15	Some of them were here last week doing basically
16	the same thing.
17	Anyway, is there a motion to accept the
18	minutes of the last meeting? It's unanimous.
19	MR. JOSE MARQUEZ, FIRE DEPARTMENT: I
20	abstain.
21	MR. DEL VALLE: With one abstention.
22	MS. MICHELE DEFREITAS-WITHIM, ESQ.,
23	DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH & MENTAL HYGIENE: Abstain.
24	MR. DEL VALLE: And the Fire Department

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is abstaining. And the Health Department is
abstaining. So otherwise it's accepted, unless
anybody's got any questions or issues with it.
I'll ask DEP to do their thing,
requesting cease and desist orders.
MR. RUSSELL PECUNIES, ESQ., DEPARTMENT
OF ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION: Okay. Good morning.
I am Russell Pecunies, Assistant Counsel with the
Department of Environmental Protection. This
month DEP is requesting that the Board issue one
cease and desist order under the noise code. This
is for Blick Art Materials LLC, which is located
at 1 Bond Street. The HVAC unit at that location
has been cited on three occasions, most recently
at the end of September, for excessive noise. And
based on the repeated violations and continuing
failure to come into compliance, DEP is asking
that the board issue an order to cease and
desist.
MR. DEL VALLE: Any questions? Motion?
It's unanimous with one abstention.
MR. PECUNIES: Mm-hmm, thank you. And
then DEP is also requesting that the Board issue

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2 21 cease and desist orders to building owners, relating to failure to install backflow 3 4 prevention devices. In each of these cases, the 5 building owner has been issued a Commissioner's 6 Order and a summons. They've been adjudicated in 7 violation with regard to the summons and they 8 have still not complied by installing the 9 required devices. So in each of these cases, the 10 Department is asking the Board to issue an order 11 to cease and desist. 12 Any questions? When did MR. DEL VALLE: 13 the law on backflow preventers come into effect?

14 MR. PECUNIES: It has actually been 15 around -- the law says that it's -- the State law 16 says that the local water supplier is responsible 17 for ensuring that this get done. That law has been around for a long time. We actually started 18 19 to enforce it about I would say 15 years ago, 20 maybe a little less; somewhere between ten to 15 21 years ago.

2.2 MR. DEL VALLE: Okay. So it shouldn't go 23 into a shocker -- to shock anybody.

MR. PECUNIES: And we've got a long way

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2	to go before everybody who needs one has one, so.
3	MR. DEL VALLE: Is there a motion? It's
4	unanimous two exemptions.
5	MR. PECUNIES: Thank you.
6	MR. DEL VALLE: That was short and
7	sweet. Pre-sealing reports, Kelly Corso.
8	MS. KELLY CORSO, ESQ., ASSISTANT
9	DIRECTOR OF ADJUDICATIONS, OATH: Good morning.
10	I'm Kelly Corso. I am Assistant Director for
11	Adjudications for OATH Hearings Division. We have
12	seven pre-sealing reports today and one post-
13	sealing report. For the pre-sealing reports, they
14	all involve backflow violations. And in all the
15	cases the hearing officers recommend that there
16	be no sealing or other action. For six of those
17	cases, the hearing officers' recommendations are
18	based on the evidence of compliance of the
19	respondents presented at the hearings. In one of
20	the cases, the seventh case, the hearing officer
21	recommended no sealing or other action based on a
22	report that DEP presented at the hearing of a re-
23	inspection of the premises indicating that the
24	backflow device we no longer necessary.

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2	Now, the post-sealing case involves a
3	noise code violation. And the respondent in that
4	case is Lucky Seven Restaurant and Bar LLC. That
5	restaurant and bar is located at 1447 St.
6	Nicholas Street in Manhattan. This case started
7	back in April of 2014 when DEP issued a summons
8	to the respondent for a violation of the noise
9	code with respect to its sound reproduction
10	equipment that was located in the restaurant and
11	bar. The sound reproduction equipment was
12	exceeding the permitted levels of noise in a
13	complainant's apartment that was located above
14	the restaurant and bar.
15	The respondent did appear for the first
16	hearing in August of 2014 and was found in
17	violation and was ordered to comply with the
18	noise code. They did not comply with the noise
19	code and they were subsequently issued three more
20	summonses. A re-inspection by DEP in June of 2016
21	showed the respondent still had not complied with
22	the noise code. And in July of 2016 the Board
23	approved a cease and desist order for the case.
24	The order had required the respondent appear at a

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special hearing in August of 2016 and the respondent failed to appear. Respondent rescheduled a hearing for September and again they failed to appear. And as a result of that, DEP sealed the equipment.

7 After the equipment was sealed, the 8 respondent appeared for a post-sealing hearing --9 a number of post-sealing hearings. There was one 10 in September, October and November. At the 11 November hearing, DEP submitted an inspection 12 report showing that the respondent had installed 13 a limiter on its sound reproduction equipment and 14 that noise readings that were taken from the 15 complainant's apartment were now within the 16 decibel range required by the noise code. So the 17 hearing officer in this case has agreed with DEP's recommendation that the equipment remain 18 19 unsealed if DEP's re-inspection and subsequent 20 re-inspection for a period of 180 days show no 21 violation.

22 MR. DEL VALLE: Motion? Unanimous with 23 one inspection. And I'm sure their neighbors are 24 very happy.

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2	MS. CORSO: I'm sure.
3	MR. DEL VALLE: You made it fast. Is
4	there a motion to go into executive session for
5	additional review? Granted.
6	[OFF THE RECORD]
7	[ON THE RECORD]
8	MR. DEL VALLE: Before we wrap up, I
9	just want to give a little bit of update of
10	thrills and chills. As everyone knows I think, we
11	are in the middle so far of a two-year
12	reorganization of an administrative adjudication
13	agreement in the City. And part of that process
14	involves shifting a lot of legacy things that
15	were brought over from other agencies: probably
16	the Health Department or the Taxi Limousine
17	Commission or DEP and a whole bunch of other
18	stuff. And one of those items involves legacy
19	rules that are more appropriately in Buildings
20	Department, Sanitation Department and so forth.
21	The original target from the First
22	Deputy Mayor was to have that completed by 2017.
23	And earlier this month we noticed that there's
24	two months left till 2017. So, various agencies

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will be getting a goose from us about that stuff in the coming couple of months before they get a goose from a higher authority as it were. That's just FYI.

Other than that, the consolidation of 6 7 the Hearings Division is moving along very well. 8 At this current stage, we are getting new space 9 in the Bronx. The current space is too small. And 10 it was determined that with the Criminal Justice 11 Reform Act coming online in June of next year, 12 it's going to be way too small. So, we are 13 starting negotiations with a space in a building 14 in the -- right in the middle of the court 15 complex up on 161st Street, which I think is 16 really neat. The other option was the old Central 17 Post Office in the Bronx, which would have been 18 really, really impressive but not very practical 19 unfortunately because we can't destroy any of the 20 landmark WPA murals that are there, which would 21 be I think a mortal sin if that were done.

22 So that's going very well. And we're 23 getting more space likewise in Queens because 24 we're consolidating all our Queens operations at

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the Falchi building in Long Island City. The facility in Jamaica, which we share with the DOF -- Department of Finance, is getting too tight. So, we're getting another floor in the Falchi building, which should be completed about this time next year for us to start moving cases in there.

9 And along those lines, we're starting to 10 circulate personnel from venue to venue, to do 11 cross-pollination of good practices and making 12 sure that hearing officers can do whatever cases 13 come before them. The only complication so far 14 has been scheduling and in particular certain 15 types of summonses; one of the issues that is 16 important to the Administration is that 17 individuals be able to deal with whatever summons 18 they got from whatever agency at any location 19 basically at any time.

That's easier said than done when in particular types of violations you need the enforcement agent present for the hearing. Actually the vast majority of summonses we deal with don't require the enforcement agent to be

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2	present. But there are certain ones that require
3	the enforcement agent to be present and that
4	involves creating a complicated matrix for
5	scheduling those types of things.
6	One of the things that is very Buck
7	Rogers'y that is coming down the pike is the
8	mechanism for teleconferencing hearings; not only
9	for the benefit of a respondent but for the
10	benefit of enforcement agencies. We've been doing
11	this for several months already with the Port
12	Authority police and it seems to work great. But
13	again it's a technology thing that has to be
14	flushed through and budgeted and no one be
15	traumatized over it too much, which they're
16	already traumatized by the Criminal Justice
17	Reform Act stuff.
18	Any questions? Yeah?
19	MR. PECUNIES: Yeah. The new locations
20	in the Bronx and Queens will mean that the
21	existing locations will be closing or they're in
22	addition to the existing locations?
23	MR. DEL VALLE: Existing locations will
24	be closing.

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2	MR. PECUNIES: Okay. And the timeframe
3	for that tentatively on both of them is about a
4	year from now?
5	MR. DEL VALLE: Yeah. Yeah. In Staten
6	Island location, which we're getting a new
7	location there anyway, which was started long
8	before the Criminal Justice Reform Act stuff,
9	hasn't been settled exactly where it's going to
10	be; although it looks like a particular location
11	is being focused on. And the Staten Island reason
12	is mostly because the building is decrepit, to
13	put it politely. I mean, I don't
14	MR. PECUNIES: Will that still be in the
15	vicinity of the ferry terminal or
16	MR. DEL VALLE: I think it's within
17	range of it, yeah. We don't want to I don't
18	want to say that too much because the Buildings
19	Department might run over there and condemn it.
20	Is there a motion to adjourn? We are adjourned.
