22	there ever been a situation where now you have to
23	actively do a lot more than that? I'm just
24	thinking about being overwhelmed with so much.

3	a, at this point, because we have a commissioner,
4	it's basically a ceremonial title. It's
5	something, it's, it's a, it's a carryover that's
6	still in our rules, so we want to have it in the
7	event of litigation and make sure we appoint
8	someone. So at this point, it's a ceremonial
9	thing. And the tribunal, basically, does that
10	work. It receives the applications, determines
11	the applications and processes the work.
12	MS. GRAHAM: Okay. Yes. And, and, and
13	one last thing, because I do recall this coming
14	up before when, when an Executive Director was
15	appointed. If I recall correctly, the rules do
16	allow the Executive Director to designate, to
17	have designees?
18	MS. STATZ: Exactly. Yes.
19	MS. GRAHAM: So I, I think I get it.
20	Basically, as long as you have the Executive
21	Director in place, then so-, then that director
22	can designate other folks to do things if it
23	becomes a need to actually physically do a whole
24	bunch of stuff. But, in any event, I vote yes.

24	we've been wasting all this time moving penalty

It's a, it's sort of an embarrassing 5 thing, I think. 6 7 AlSo we can load votes into Webex into Polls or put this into Chat so people like 8 9 Shamonda don't get stranded on the phone. We 10 need to harness this technology a little bit. 11 I'm out, but I do vote yes, and 12 congratulations. 13 MR. DIETZ: Thanks. 3	Hudson River Park Trust penalty schedule.
4	MR. DIETZ: Right. Okay, thank you.
5	Good morning. I'm Nicholas Dietz. I'm an
6	Assistant General Counsel at OATH. And, So today
7	we're proposing a rule to repeal OATH's Hudson
8	River Park Trust penalty schedule, and I'm going
9	to refer to that as HRPT, because it's a
10	mouthful. And, So this is for violations that
11	occur at Hudson River Park.
12	Just as a quick background, HRPT is a
13	hybrid state/city agency that controls Hudson
14	River Park, which is a strip of land on the West
15	Side that runs from Riverside Park down to
16	Battery Park. Now, it's independent of the Parks
17	Department, but works very closely with it.
18	So OATH is proposing to re- repeal
19	HRPT's penalty schedule I mean OATH's HRPT
20	penalty schedule because the Hudson River Park
21	Trust is in the process of pro- promulgating its
22	own penalty schedule. So then, in the future,
23	it'll be HRPT, rather than OATH, that sets the
24	penalties for HRPT violations.

4	Jorge Martinez. Just for my background, are
5	there any other Ci-, are there, are there any
6	City regulations that would apply to HRTP [sic]?

8	the most part, with the, many of the Parks
9	Department rules. But they're, they mostly are
10	citat- cited for the New York State Code of Rules
11	and Regulations. So even though they're
12	virtually identical rules, they're under the
13	rubric of, of state rules, if that makes sense.
14	MR. MARTINEZ: Are those in the
15	Administrative Code?
16	MS. STATZ: No, they're in the New York
17	Code of Rules and Regulations. It's the State,
18	it's the State rules. Like City rules are RCNY,
19	State rules are NYCRR. So their rules are, it's,
20	they're basically more a State entity than they
21	are a City entity. In fact, they do their
22	rulemaking through SAPA and not through CAPA, the
23	way we do.

24	come we keep discovering them and moving them

3	MS. STATZ: Because it's the nature,

9	meetings. So now that everything is every two
10	months, everything has to be pushed over.
11	So a thing that would normally for
12	example, if we're going to do this soup to nuts,
13	it should take about 10 days to come up with
14	everything. But we have posting obligations,
15	hearing obligations, certification obligations
16	with the Law Department, certification
17	obligations with the Mayor's Office. We have to
18	publish, we have to take in. So it's just, it's
19	a drama. Because we
20	MR. SHPETNER: Are you suggesting, Olga
21	I mean, I don't want to misinterpret this, but
22	are you su- suggesting that they have to be done
23	consecutively and can't be done concurrently?
24	MS. STATZ: We have to, we have to speak

16	fines.		
17	The proposed rule had been unanimously		
18	approved by the Board at the April 30th meeting.		
19	The rule was then published in the City Record on		
20	May 8, 2020. A public hearing was held via Webex		
21	just on June 9th, but we did not re- receive any		
22	public comment. The final rule has been reviewed		
23	and certified by the New York City Law		
24	Department, and the final rule has not been
