**POPS Map:** Marks the locations of nearly 600 Privately Owned Public Spaces. It is part of our Facilities Explorer, a comprehensive dataset of public and private facilities, from libraries to schools, parks and health and social service providers, that shape the quality of our neighborhoods. **Population FactFinder:** Allows anyone to easily define a study area and examine local population profiles, with detailed demographic information and housing statistics, and how these statistics have changed over time. This data was previously available only to those who knew how to access and read complex statistical tables—not even the federal government has such a precise and useful tool for the public.
