Arches Transformative Mentoring

Group mentoring program for young adults on probation ages 16 to 24 years. The program uses an evidence-based journaling curriculum centered on cognitive behavioral principles, and incorporates positive youth development values and practices. With case management provided by DOP Probation Officers, Arches program mentors support participants to improve problem solving and social skills, and achieve attitudinal and behavioral change.

Justice Community

Engages court-involved young adults in community benefit projects, education, subsidized work, and civic engagement, as well as youth leadership, peer mentorship, life skills training, and case management.

Justice Plus

Justice Plus is a flexible wrap-around, designed to support participants by providing a range of work readiness opportunities. These opportunities include work experience placements, hard/vocational and soft job skills development, and job search and career awareness/planning competencies. Justice Plus emphasizes work readiness opportunities that link to trades/vocations and soft skills taught in a workplace context including but not limited to community benefit projects and internships.

Participants must be referred by a designated Cure Violence service provider, have been clients of the Cure Violence program or otherwise identified to be in need of such services by the Cure Violence provider.

- Participant Age and Profile: Youth between the ages of 16-30
- Duration: 1- 6 months with up to 6 month follow-up or aftercare
- Participants may also receive a stipend up to \$1,500

Advocate, Intervene, Mentor (AIM)

A court-mandated juvenile alternative-to-placement program, AIM pairs 13 to 18 year old youths on juvenile probation with paid advocates who provide intensive mentoring, as well as the structure and guidance youth need to develop self-efficacy.

Every Child Has an Opportunity to Excel and Succeed (ECHOES)

Every Child Has an Opportunity to Excel and Succeed (ECHOES) is an Alternative to Placement (ATP) program, designed to help justice-involved youth remain in their communities while developing core skills they need to lead law-abiding lives, hold a legitimate job, and maintain stable and positive personal relationships. ECHOES has three primary goals for each participant:

- 1) Create a transformational relationship with an adult using a life coaching model
- 2) Increase social and emotional competencies
- 3) Increase employability, it is also expected that participants will become more engaged with education as they see how it is connected employment to future.
