A Word from the District Manager ...

Dear Community Board 8 Resident:

You may have seen clothing collection vans parked in the street. Many of our well-meaning residents bring their families' used clothing to these vans. It is commendable that they want to help the less fortunate.; however, there are some issues with this practice that I would like to bring to your attention.

These clothing collection vans/vehicles park in excess of the seven (7) day limit without moving, which takes away valuable parking spots from local residents. They park illegally during alternate side parking days and do not move to allow sanitation to sweep the roads. Once these vehicles are filled with used clothing, as the owners do not empty them often enough, some residents leave the used clothing next to the vehicles. In spite of the due diligence of the Police Department and Sanitation, the neighbors often are left with a real mess (see pictures below). There are other ways to donate used clothing that do not create these issues. You can go to www.nyc.gov/donate and look for other not for profit organizations that accept used clothing or maybe you can donate to homeless shelters.

Ultimately, it is up to you to which organization you choose to donate to. I urge you to consider the quality of life of the neighbors who reside on the block (s) where the collection vehicles are located, when you do. Please do not leave your donations on the sidewalks adjacent to the vehicle. It is unfair to the property owner who must do the clean-up, as he/she may incur fines for dirty area.

Please share this information with your friends and neighbors. It takes more than City Hall to make New York City great, it takes us all!

The virus was named COVID-19. This new type of coronavirus was first identified in Wuhan, China. The origins have been linked to illegally traded wildlife at Wuhan's seafood market. The exact source of the outbreak has not been identified. It can spread from person to person usually through respiratory droplets. If someone with the virus coughs or sneezes and the person is close to another person who breathes it in, then it can spread.

There are cases in the US but those are all people that have been to Wuhan or were exposed to people that were. Currently, it is not spreading in communities in the US. The greatest risk of infection remains for people who are in China, recently traveled to China, and people who have been in close contact with someone who has been infected.

The symptoms may appear in as few as two days, or fourteen days after exposure. There is currently no vaccine to prevent the 2019-nCoV illness. The best way to prevent infection is to avoid being exposed to the virus, wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, and avoid close contact with people who are sick. Stay home when you are sick.

Wearing a mask is not going to prevent you from getting somebody else's germs. Those masks work to prevent other people from getting sick.

Queens Complete Count Committee (QCCC) - Kevin Forrestal:

Census 2020 – Mr. Forrestal informed everyone that the information provided to the Census is protected by law. On or about March 12th the Census Bureau will be sending out mailings to candidates to respond by computer. There will be a second mailing in paper form. He discussed and explained the Census questions on the application step by step. It is important for everyone including immigrants to respond. All information received will be kept confidential.

Capital and Expense Budget Committee - Marc A. Haken, Committee Chair -

The budget requests were submitted. The City answered all budget requests. Many of the responses were the same as it has been for about 30 years. He thanked Kevin who did all the work and had helped him put everything together at the Monday nights meeting. A letter was drafted with responses to the City's responses.

Need Financial Assistance to Repair Lead Paint Hazards?

Free grants are available for owners of eligible buildings to repair lead paint hazards and address other conditions that pose potential health risks.

On average, eligible grants are \$8,000 to \$10,000 per unit!



Buildings may be eligible if:

- They are constructed prior to 1960
- They are occupied mostly by low and very-low income tenants
- Some units have children under the age of six or pregnant under the age of six pregnant women residing in them.

Peeling and cracking lead paint is the most commonly identified source of lead poisoning in young children, who can swallow lead paint dust and chips from window sills and floors. Under the City's Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Act, property owners must inspect and remediate all potential lead hazards safely - or face enforcement and penalties.

The **Lead Hazard Reduction and Healthy Homes Program**, a joint initiative of the Department of Housing Preservation and Development (HPD) and Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (DOHMH) is intended to assist property owners correct such issues before incurring violations and enforcement action.

The program is available in any of the five boroughs of New York City.

Census 2020

Towards the middle of this month, you will receive an invitation to complete the 2020 Census, you should respond within a couple of days either online, by telephone or by mail.

When completing your household form, count any children, including newborns who usually live and sleep at your home - even if they are not your own. If they split their time evenly between two households, count them if they will be living in your household on April 1, 2020.

We have included a sample of the Census 2020 questionnaire that you will have to complete

[pages for person 3, 4, 5, & 6 have been omitted to save space]. The paper questionnaire only allows space for you to identify ten (10) members of your household. When answering Question 1. , “ ***How many people were living or staying in this house, apartment of mobile home on April 1, 2020?***” if the answer is more than 10, then fill out information for 10 people. You will get a call later on from the Census Bureau to obtain information for the rest of the family. When completing the questionnaire online, you will be able to respond for more than 10 members in your household.

Please be aware of scams. *The Census will **never** ask you for your **Social Security Number** or **Bank Account Number**.*

In 2010, New York was undercounted which resulted in less representation in Congress. This also meant that we did not receive our fair share of federal dollars to meet our needs. We cannot let that reoccur. To assist in getting a complete count,

- Forms W-2, 1098, 1099, or income and expense records if you are self-employed (Go to nyc.gov/taxprep for a list.)



Other

- 2018 tax return or transcript (if available)
To request a transcript, call the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) at 1-800-908-9946 or visit irs.gov and search "Get Transcript."
- Proof of health insurance coverage or Health Insurance Exemption Certificate for you, your spouse, and your dependents
- Payment records for child care, including the provider's name, address, and Employer Identification Number, Taxpayer Identification Number, or Social Security number
- Records of educational expenses such as Form 1098-T for tuition payments to attend a university or technical college or Form 1098-E if you paid student loan interest
- Account and routing numbers for direct deposit of your refund

If you are filing a joint return, both spouses must be present.

Did you know???

Alternate Side Parking Fee Schedule

Alternate Side Parking penalties were \$65 in Manhattan below 96th Street and \$45 elsewhere in New York City.

Effective **Thursday, February 20, 2020**, the Alternate Side Parking fines became uniform across the entire city and is \$65.

Switch to Reusable Bags!

Effective **March 1, 2020**, single use plastic carryout bags are **banned**, with limited exceptions, in New York State. In New York City, businesses will begin collecting a **five-cent fee** on paper carryout bags. This fee will not apply to any customers using SNAP (food stamps) or WIC. For more information or to get a free reusable bag, visit nyc.gov/bags or call 311.

Your Right to Vote in NYS

You lose your right to vote while you are in prison or on parole for a felony conviction. If you are convicted of a **felony** and your sentence is suspended, you **can vote**. If you are convicted of a **felony** and there was no prison sentence, you **can vote**. Your right to **vote** is automatically returned to you once you are out of state prison and off of parole. All you have to **do** is register, or re-register to **vote**.
