12	months. But in January 2013, we
13	set a new all-time record, TLC
14	record, for seizures of unlicensed
15	taxis, 849 in the month of January.
16	The previous month, the record was
17	719, and that was set back in 1998.
18	So with seizures of
19	contraband of all sorts, when a
20	huge amount is seized, it's not
21	good news or bad news, but
22	certainly part of the news is that
23	there are a lot out there. But I
24	think it's good news because we
25	have now beefed up our enforcement

I will skip the rest of the updates with except to note that, really, commend the industry for its assistance in the recent school

Then we have one last item 3 on our agenda, a set of proposed 4 rules regarding security standards 5 6 for TPEP.

> Meera, would you describe them briefly? And there's one person signed up to speak, and then we'll do a vote.

11 MS. JOSHI: Before the 12 Commissioners are proposed rules to establish information security 13 14 standards for authorized TPEP 15 providers. The rules were published in the city record on 16 17 January 18, 2013. Today, the Commission will hold a CAPA hearing 18 and vote. We received one comment 19 20 on the rules and no changes have 21 been made to the rules before you 22 now, and no changes have been made from the published version to the 23 24 version that you have before you

protecting the Cardholder Data

Environment, known as the CDE, from

24

2	untrusted access. One major
3	challenge has been balancing strong
4	security levels with the cost of
5	compliance. The PCI DSS security
6	standard version 1.2 is the global
7	data security standard adopted by
8	the card brands for all
9	organizations that process, store
10	or transmit cardholder data to
11	build and maintain a secure network
12	according to the 12 requirements as
13	published by the PCI security
14	counsel. I'm not going to recite
15	these, but the list of 12 are shown
16	here.
17	While the proposed Chapter
18	76 security rules generally covers
19	all of these code requirements, it
20	is solely the right and
21	responsibility of the Payment Card
22	Industry to regulate branded
23	payment card operations. However,
24	the definition TPEP Data, subject
25	to Chapter 76 rules includes,

2	quote, "data related to credit,
3	debit and prepaid card
4	transactions," end quote.
5	Therefore, the TPEP CDE, which
6	includes the passenger cardholders'
7	Primary Account Number, known as
8	the PAN, should be removed from the
9	Chapter 76 and replaced with a
10	requirement that the TPEP must
11	process fare payments through a
12	certified PCI compliant Payment
13	Gateway, which, in any event, is a
14	requirement of the Merchant Payment
15	Transaction Processing Industry.
16	The security requirements
17	applied to the remaining TPEP trip
18	data should be reexamined for the
19	necessity to apply the same level
20	of security as required for the CDE
21	in order to provide data integrity
22	and protection for the remaining
23	TPEP trip data. As an example, the
24	number of passengers per trip does

not need a security level equal to

2 the cardholder PAN data. The TPEP security and fare 3 payment rules have not kept up with 4 recent advances in mobile cash 5 payments providing a direct cash 6 transfer to a driver at greater 7 payment card security, more rapid 8 transaction time, greater passenger 9 10 convenience and lower transaction 11 Therefore, on a case-by-case cost. basis, mobile cash should be 12 13 regulated by the rules for cash 14 payment and not be subject to the 15 TPEP rules for cashless payment. 16 Regarding the 17 confidentiality of TPEP data 18 including tracking information, the Commission must forbid the access 19 and release of TPEP data to private 20 21 third parties not essential for the collection of TPEP data under 22 contract with a TPEP vendor 23 24 requiring confidentiality.

The Commission should be

2	complimented for setting open
3	standards for TPEP approval.
4	However, given the original
5	contract termination date of
6	February 2013, if new TPEP
7	contracts with taxi operators must
8	not be executed between March and
9	April, there is insufficient time
10	for all eligible TPEP vendors to
11	complete the approval process.
12	With full knowledge years
13	ago of the original contract
14	termination date this month, to let
15	the clock run close to the contract
16	termination before enabling the
17	approval process for eligible TPEP
18	vendors has again resulted in a
19	restricted, anticompetitive market
20	denying medallion operators the
21	opportunity to evaluate and select
22	the best TPEP systems by the April
23	date.
24	CHAIRMAN YASSKY: Let me
25	just ask you to conclude, if you

2 would.

3 MR. THALER: Yes. Just, the last sentence -- therefore, 4 assuming the current vendors are 5 6 found to meet the requirements of 7 Chapter 75 and 76, the Commission should extend the time enabling a 8 9 taxi operator to switch their TPEP 10 vendor contract at least for an 11 additional six months without any termination fee. 12 13 But I would like to ask, 14 based on my confusion of the 15 February 6th notice, there seems to be some conflict. It says that the 16 17 current contracts terminate 18 March 1st. And on March 2nd, for the first time, there will be a 19 list provided for all of the 20 21 approved vendors. Now, I called 22 the TLC legal as to when the window would be open to submit 23 24 applications for approval, and I 25 was told that there would be a

2	notice filed, and I would be told.
3	But presumably, there's been no
4	window opening for approval for new
5	vendors.
6	So my question is, first,
7	where it says, by April 30th, it
8	says, the TPEP vendor only has to
9	comply with Chapter 75. Does that
10	mean
11	CHAIRMAN YASSKY: Just to
12	clarify that, currently, that
13	window is open. We are
14	MR. THALER: There was no
15	notice, ever. And we were supposed
16	to be informed. So I take
17	CHAIRMAN YASSKY: Just so
18	you know now, if anyone wishes to
19	apply for approved vendor status, I
20	believe I'm looking at Gary, or
21	I'm looking for Gary I believe
22	that the form is on our website.
23	Am I right? Yes. It is on our
24	website.
25	MR. THALER: Could you tell

12	was implemented and what, I
13	thought, was a rush. However, I
14	believe, having a final report is
15	better than not having a final
16	report. It's kind of a lesser than
17	two evils.
18	So I just want to change my
19	vote. I will vote, yes, but I just
20	want it clear that I'm not this
