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Proceedings 1 2 THE CHAIR: Good morning. The time 3 is 10:30 and we're going to start our public meeting. 4 We've had an active last few weeks 5 6 so I'm going to go through some of the 7 highlights. On March 30th, we previewed a video which is called "Drive Like Your 8 Family Lives Here", and I encourage 9 everyone here if they have 15 minutes, 10 11 which I'm sure if you find it, you'll find 12 that you have it, to watch the video. Ιt was a generous contribution of five 13 families who helped us to send a message to 14 15 all drivers in New York City. We're, you know, primarily focused on TLC licensed 16 17 drivers, but the video has universal appeal 18 in the message that it sends. 19 They shared their stories of losing a family member to a traffic fatality and 20 the stories when told through their eyes 21 and with their family members surrounding 22 23 them are extremely gripping and I think the 24 film you'll find -- you'll drive 25 differently after you watch it. So I

2	strongly encourage everybody to take the
3	time out to watch it. It's available on
4	our website and on YouTube, "Drive Like
5	Your Family Lives Here", and share it with
6	your friends and loved ones, and anybody
7	that you know who drives.
8	So we're incorporating it into taxi
9	school. It will be part of FHV school.
10	It's publicly available so any garage or
11	drivers group that wants to go ahead and
12	take the opportunity to use it in any
13	training or public gathering, please feel
14	free. The MTA is going to use it with
15	their bus drivers, NYPD is going to use it
16	with training, and DOT is going to use it
17	as well for all of their vehicle drivers.
18	So we hope to expand the universe of City
19	agencies that adopt this as part of their
20	driving protocol.
21	We also, in the last few days, the
22	City announced that we are going to look to
23	propose an amendment to State law on
24	seatbelts that would require passengers in
25	the front seat and passengers in the back

2	seat to wear seatbelts, as well as drivers.
3	Drivers would not be held responsible for a
4	passengers failure to wear seatbelts, which
5	I think is important for our drivers. But
6	safety, we know seatbelts saves life and to
7	the extent that we can make by law a
8	requirement that will, you know, further
9	encourage people to put their seatbelt on,
10	I think that will have an important effect
11	on all of our driving habits and also
12	reduce fatalities and injuries.
13	We also announced on April 7th that
14	we have our first black box pilot
15	participant, IonFleets IonFleets, sorry,
16	and Ion is currently looking for vehicles
17	to participate in the pilot. So if you're
18	interested in participating, you can call
19	them at 917-387-3400 or visit their
20	website, www.ionfleets.com, or just grab
21	anybody from the Policy Department that's
22	hanging around this room and I'm sure
23	they'll direct you to where you need to go.
24	On April 11th, we had a hackathon
25	that we did over the weekend in conjunction

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with Google and the Rudin Center for
transportation. And basically it was a
chance for civic hackers from all over the
City and some from outside of the City to
come together in a shared environment it
was at the Rudin Center, it was hosted by
Google, they funded it and really take a
look at all of our driver data, that's TPEP
data, LPEP data, as well as some of the FHV
trip records that we've gotten so far.
And the idea is this is the first of
many events that we will have, but this
first event looked at one problem and
that's taxi availability during shift
change. It turns out the problem is a lot
harder and the data is a lot more dense, so
it's going to take more than one day.
They're still looking at the data, but
their preliminary findings are, some of
them I think are things that are not
surprising, but more flexibility in
shifting and easier locations for shift
change that don't require a driver to go
back to the garage. But we'll be meeting

2	with them as they finalize those results
3	and hopefully we'll be able to we'll
4	definitely be sharing them and hopefully
5	we'll be able to generate some good ideas
6	for best practices to make more taxis
7	available during rush hour and give drivers
8	better income opportunities during those
9	hours.
10	The taxicab improvement surcharge,
11	which we began collecting at the beginning
12	of this year, is going to be due
13	April 24th. We put out an industry notice,
14	which is also available in the back of the
15	room, describing the process. It's
16	industry notice 15-13. There's a few
17	deadline not deadline dates but dates
18	you should keep in mind. On April 5th, the
19	statements were made available, that's how
20	much each medallion owner owes in the taxi
21	medallion each vehicle is it vehicle
22	or medallion owner medallion owner owes
23	for the taxi improvement surcharge.
24	On April 20th, we'll be finalizing
25	those amounts. There's a period where you

Proceedings 1 2 can dispute your amount between April 5th and April 20th, and tomorrow, April 24th is 3 when you can start submitting payment. 4 The way to avoid any fees in submitting payment 5 6 is through eCheck, and if you have any 7 questions on how to do eCheck, please talk to somebody in the back. We're also going 8 to be putting out another industry notice 9 that pictorially tells you how to submit 10 11 via eCheck. So anybody that has a credit 12 or debit account is going to have a checking account, utilize that checking 13 account to make your payments and you'll 14 15 avoid any fees. We cannot waive the fees 16 that the City charges for credit and debit 17 purchases online, but you can avoid them if you just pay by eCheck, and if you have any 18 19 trouble let us know so we can help walk you through it, and spread the word so other 20 21 people aren't unnecessarily incurring those 22 fees. 23 We also began the process of 24 collecting FHV trip records. That's a rule 25 that we passed last year and went into

2	effect December 31st. Because it's so new
3	and so many bases are unaccustomed to
4	providing us this amount of data on a
5	regular and consistent basis, we've been
6	rolling it out slowly in waves and doing a
7	lot of outreach. We did about five
8	information sessions in April, one in each
9	borough, and questions ranging from, I
10	don't have a computer or where do I get
11	programs to codify my trip records to
12	people that are very sophisticated and
13	clearly are capable of providing us the
14	records with the push of a button.
15	But we're continuing to work with
16	the industry to make sure everybody can
17	come into the fold and the objective is
18	that not only the agency, but the City as a
19	whole has a better understanding of how
20	for-hire transportation works and the
21	public has more transparency on that, and
22	that we are better policy makers because of
23	that. So we look forward to continued
24	compliance and more information.
25	We had our JFK squad was featured

2	in a CBS exclusive, the undercover work
3	that they do there catching illegal hails.
4	And I think the TV exclusive showed the
5	variety of situations that they encounter
6	with illegal hails at the airport. So I
7	think there was one green car that was
8	seized, one TLC-plated car that was
9	illegally picking up and some stray plates
10	that were picking up, but the bottom line
11	was there is only there is no pick up by
12	hand hail at the airport. There are taxi
13	stands for yellow taxis, there's
14	prearranged for license vehicles, and all
15	other forms of trying to get a passenger in
16	your car are illegal and that our
17	enforcement staff is out there and is
18	seizing cars when they see it. So I hope
19	that serves as a good deterrent for
20	everybody who saw the exclusive or saw them
21	in action. And we're extending those
22	efforts to JFK. I think I've said this
23	before, we have authorized in the budget a
24	new JFK squad. Once we can bring them
25	online, we'll be permanently in place at

1 Proceedings 2 JFK doing the -- I'm sorry, LaGuardia doing 3 the same work, but until we get that LaGuardia squad in place, we're just 4 putting more of our squads routinely at 5 6 LaGuardia to do that same kind of 7 enforcement work at LaGuardia. On April 15th, we graduated 20 8 inspectors. That's our newest class of 9 inspectors so we welcome them to the lots 10 11 and lots of work that's ahead of them, and 12 they had a lot of fun at graduation so I 13 hope they have just as much fun in the field, which I'm sure they will. 14 15 And I think that might cover it. We did have a busy four weeks since we last 16 17 met and that does cover it. So today's meeting is short. First we have adoption 18 19 of the minutes. So all in favor of adopting the March, 2015 Commission Meeting 20 minutes? 21 (Chorus of Ayes.) 22 23 THE CHAIR: The minutes are adopted. 24 Next we have base applications with 25 Chris Tormey. Thank you.

13 Proceedings 1 2 MR. TORMEY: Hi. Good morning, 3 Commissioners. My name is Chris Tormey, Director of Applicant Licensing with the 4 Taxi & Limousine Commission, Long Island 5 6 City. 7 This month we have two bases for approval and one for denial. 8 THE CHAIR: All in favor accepting 9 Chris's report? 10 11 (Chorus of Ayes.) 12 MR. TORMEY: Thank you. 13 THE CHAIR: Next on the agenda, we just have one vote, no hearing on rules 14 15 that -- proposed rules that we had a hearing on March 5th. Rodney Stiles and 16 17 Charlie Furrey are going to do a presentation so that you have an outline of 18 the rules. We did one at the prior hearing 19 as well but in sum, today's rules in 20 essence just lift some of the prestrictive 21 time regulations over vehicle and driver 22 23 fitness in favor of greater reliance on 24 TLC's review processes for licensure, which were vehicles is the 200 point triangle 25

1 Proceedings 2 inspection, and for individuals is our individual review of applicants driving 3 records. 4 A vehicle retirement, the proposed 5 6 rule really reflects reality. It's been 7 commonly thought that most taxis run on a three-year retirement cycle, but that's 8 been elongated over time through a number 9 of TLC and local law exemptions resulting 10 11 in today's fleet with 55 percent on a 12 seven-year retirement, and the next large 13 group about half that size, on a five or six-year retirement as 21 percent, and the 14 15 smallest group is actually on the 16 three-year retirement and that represents 17 only 10 percent of the fleet. 18 Today's proposal makes one uniform 19 retirement that mirrors the general and current practice, and because this 20 retirement reality was known at the time 21 that the City entered into the 22 23 accessibility settlement, it does not 24 change the outcome of 50 percent accessible 25 by 2020. A standard retirement also allows

2	more drivers to take advantage of the
3	medallion only leasing model, which we
4	strongly encourage agents to offer.
5	On the driver rules, the proposed
6	rules lift reapplication bands that were
7	strictly applied to allow drivers whose
8	licensed had been revoked to work
9	sooner work again sooner based on a
10	demonstrated good driving record. For
11	these drivers only, many of whom for-hire
12	driving has been their own profession, we
13	wanted to allow reentry as early as
14	possible so they continue to earn legally.
15	MR. FURREY: Good morning,
16	Commissioners. As the Commissioner noted,
17	my name is Charles Furrey. I'm an
18	Assistant General Counsel here at TLC, and
19	I'm joined by Rodney Stiles, Director of
20	Research and Evaluation at TLC. Today
21	we'll be giving a presentation on the
22	driver and vehicle owner driver and
23	vehicle owner rule updates.
24	In late 2014, TLC began a review of
25	all rules governing TLC driver and vehicle

2	owners and identifying those rules that
3	should be updated to reflect the modern
4	for-hire industry. Each amendment
5	contained in this rule package was reviewed
6	to ensure TLC could implement the change
7	without compromising safety or consumer
8	protections.
9	Of those rules reviewed, these
10	provisions on the screen represent those
11	that TLC staff felt could and should be
12	updated. While today's presentation won't
13	cover each proposed change, we will focus
14	on the first three topics.
15	In 2011, TLC implemented bans on
16	driver application. If an applicant was
17	involved in a specified event, a one, two
18	or three-year application band would apply.
19	Although not an exclusive list, TLC
20	determined that the events specified in the
21	ban would render an applicant unfit for a
22	TLC license. The purpose of the
23	application bans was to avoid needless
24	submission of applications and application
25	fees by those applicants that TLC would

1 Proceedings 2 clear deny as being unfit for licensure. 3 It is important to note that after a ban has run, an applicant's licensure is 4 not guaranteed. As with all applicants, 5 6 TLC has and will continue to review the 7 background and driving record of all individuals submitting driving applications 8 9 to TLC. In reviewing the events, the 10 11 specified events giving rise to a one-year 12 application ban, TLC staff identified a 13 change that should be made to the last event, prior denial of an application based 14 15 on the applicant's fitness. If an applicant's prior application was denied 16 17 based on an applicant's fitness for 18 licensure, the one year currently runs from the date the application was denied. Thus, 19 any unforeseen delay in TLC's review of the 20 application and the application's record. 21 So for example, the time it takes the 22 23 applicant to obtain additional documents that TLC needs to review would similarly 24 25 push back the date that the applicant could

1	Proceedings
2	resubmit the next application should they
3	wish to reapply.
4	The proposed rules modify when the
5	one-year ban begins to run. Instead of
6	running from the date the prior application
7	is denied, the ban would run from the date
8	the prior application was submitted to TLC.
9	Under the proposed change, applicants found
10	unfit for licensure would be permitted to
11	apply no more than once every year.
12	Currently, TLC rules impose a
13	two-year application ban if an applicant is
14	caught driving for-hire without a TLC
15	license or if an applicant violated TLC
16	rules six or more times with a prior TLC
17	license. While providing for-hire
18	transportation without a TLC license,
19	without the proper insurance and without
20	the vehicles being inspected by TLC, will
21	and is and will continue to be a serious
22	concern. The proposed rules would allow a
23	case-by-case review of those applicants
24	caught driving illegally for-hire.
25	The current two-year ban based on

1	Proceedings
2	six or more TLC violations does not, as the
3	rules are written, specify a time period in
4	which these violations must occur, nor does
5	it specify the type of TLC violations that
6	would give rise to the ban. Thus, the
7	proposed rules would again in this case
8	allow a case-by-case review of these
9	applications.
10	After reviewing the events giving
11	rise to a three-year application ban, TLC
12	staff identified a change that should be
13	made to the final event, revocation of a
14	prior TLC license. Specifically, those
15	whose prior TLC license was revoked based
16	on TLC or DMV violations. For those
17	drivers whose prior TLC license was revoked
18	based on DMV violations through the
19	Critical Driver program or TLC violations
20	through the Persistent Violator program,
21	the three-year bans runs from the date the
22	license was revoked.
23	Accordingly, the ban is tied to the
24	Critical Driver or Persistent Violator
25	conviction, not the underlying conduct

1	Proceedings
2	leading to that revocation. As the graphic
3	indicates, there's often a delay between
4	the underlying conduct which is listed as
5	violations on the screen, and the
6	conviction of the DMV or TLC summonses.
7	This similarly pushes back the time in
8	which TLC can issue a Critical Driver or
9	Persistent Violator summons. In some
10	cases, the three-year ban does not expire
11	until four or five years after the time
12	leading to the revocation of the driver's
13	license.
14	For those drivers who after the
15	period leading to revocation have
16	demonstrated the ability to safely operate
17	a vehicle, the proposed rules would permit
18	these drivers to request a reduced ban
19	period any time after one year, so long as
20	the drivers record contains no more than
21	three points in the preceding years.
22	MR. STILES: Good morning,
23	Commissioners. I would now like to talk
24	about another part of the proposed rules
25	before you today, the plan for a universal

2	seven-year retirement for all taxis.
3	Under current rules, a taxi can be
4	placed on a retirement schedule ranging
5	from three to seven years, depending on the
6	type of medallion, the type of vehicle and
7	whether or not there's a long-term driver
8	on that vehicle. What we found is that a
9	majority of taxis today, as Meera
10	mentioned, are already on a seven-year
11	retirement schedule, representing about
12	55 percent of all vehicles, and less than a
13	quarter of all taxis are scheduled to
14	retire after three or four years.
15	Even when looking at fleet
16	medallions, for which I think most people
17	assume a majority retire after three years,
18	48 percent are on a seven-year retirement.
19	Only 15 percent are on a three-year
20	retirement today.
21	We looked at inspection rates
22	between medallion types and we found no
23	substantive difference between independent
24	and fleet medallions. For both of them,
25	the pass rate at initial inspection stays

2	steady at around 70 percent after year two.
3	And regarding mileage, we're seeing that
4	independent medallions are putting more
5	miles on the road these days due to the
6	prevalence of double-shifting across the
7	industry, closing the gap and annual
8	mileage between fleet and independent
9	medallions.
10	We believe that adopting a universal
11	seven-year retirement will not have a
12	deleterious effect on vehicle quality or
13	admissions. Taxis must pass three safety
14	admissions inspections each year at TLC's
15	inspection facility. Not only do
16	inspectors cover the State admissions test,
17	but they also inspect things like brakes,
18	seatbelts, and air bags through a 200-point
19	process.
20	Under TLC rules, vehicles which
21	cannot pass inspection must be removed from
22	taxi service regardless of when they're
23	schedules to be retired. To complement
24	triennial inspections and to further ensure
25	that the riding public is being transported

2	with quality vehicles, TLC has begun	
3	performing on street inspections and we	
4	will be increasing the volume of these	
5	inspections moving forward.	
б	We have heard that a universal	
7	retirement may delay owners taking	
8	advantage of planned improvements to	
9	vehicle admissions that are slated to start	
10	with vehicles in model year 2017.	
11	From our estimates, we found that	
12	only around 850 vehicles hacking up before	
13	model year 2017 vehicles are available	
14	would receive seven-year retirements that	
15	otherwise wouldn't, representing a small	
16	fraction of all taxis. We believe this	
17	number to be on the conservative side,	
18	since we often receive petitions from	
19	owners to extend retirement due to	
20	hardship.	
21	Finally, the universal seven-year	
22	retirement does not impact the plan to	
23	convert 50 percent of the yellow taxi fleet	
24	to wheelchair accessible vehicles by 2020.	
25	When TLC staff created the plan, we	

1	Proceedings
2	examined the current retirement schedules
3	to model when vehicles would convert. As I
4	mentioned before, most vehicles are already
5	on a seven-year schedule, so even under the
6	original plan, this means that some
7	vehicles will retire and convert even after
8	2020. So for instance, a vehicle going
9	into service today with a seven-year
10	retirement is not scheduled to retire until
11	April of 2022. Our plan considered this
12	and with wheelchair restricted medallions
13	and a fleet plan which results in over
14	50 percent in that segment, we still reach
15	our goal by 2020.
16	In addition, TLC staff proposes
17	removing retirement requirements from the
18	black car industry. In this segment where
19	bases can set their own fares and even
20	charge a premium for higher end or newer
21	vehicles, we believe market forces
22	incentivize owners to replace vehicles at a
23	rate to meet the demands of their
24	passengers.
25	MR. FURREY: And finally, the

1 Proceedings 2 proposed rule package would make the 3 following changes: Currently, TLC rules allow drivers going through the renewal 4 process to request an additional 31 days to 5 6 complete the renewal process. The proposed 7 rules would give drivers the opportunity to request up to 90 days additional time to 8 complete the renewal process, thereby 9 avoiding the need should they go past the 10 11 31-day mark to apply for a new TLC license. 12 The proposed rules also would 13 eliminate the double-shifting requirement that applies to certain taxicab medallions. 14 15 We feel the market incentives to lease medallions is sufficient for ensuring that 16 17 those vehicles are out on the road. 18 The proposed rule package also lengthens the time drivers have to take 19 point reduction classes to reduce either 20 their Critical Driver or Persistent 21 Violator points. Currently in the Critical 22 23 Driver program rules, drivers cannot take a 24 course for a point reduction after TLC issues the Critical Drivers summons. 25 The

1 Proceedings 2 proposed rules would allow drivers to complete these courses and improve their 3 driving at any time prior to the Critical 4 Driver and Persistent Violator hearings. 5 6 And finally, the proposed rules 7 remove the prohibition that currently exists in TLC rules on power seats in 8 taxicabs. So we will allow and as we are 9 currently, these power seats for driver 10 comfort. 11 And now we would like to take any 12 13 questions, if you have any. COMM. MARINO: I have a silly 14 15 question. We don't allow power seats? 16 THE CHAIR: In a few minutes we will. 17 I know. But, I mean, 18 COMM. MARINO: 19 up until this point we haven't allowed power seats? 20 21 MR. FURREY: Yes. And I have to say that Rodney and I were, I think most proud 22 23 of that last provision in the whole 24 package. THE CHAIR: We innovate here at the 25

3	MS. MARINO: Who knew? Okay.
4	MR. WILSON: If there are no other
5	questions, these rules were published in
6	the City record on February 3rd, 2015 with
7	a comment deadline of March 5th, 2015. A
8	public hearing was held on those proposed
9	rules on March 5th. Eight written comments
10	were received, all of which have been
11	provided to the commissioners, and a copy
12	of the March 5th transcript was also
13	provided to the Commissioners.
14	Following the publication and partly
15	as a result of public feedback, the staff
16	recommended changes to the rules,
17	specifically extending from 60 to 90 days,
18	the period in which a driver may renew his
19	or her license, allowing drivers to take a
20	defensive driving or point reduction
21	courses and benefit from point reduction at
22	any point up to the hearing on the Critical
23	Driver summons or the Persistent Violator
24	summons. We also amended provisions in the
25	Critical Driver and Persistent Violator

2	provisions to mirror some changes to the	
3	Ad. Code.	
4	As local law requires, the final	
5	rule for Commission action was posted on	
6	the TLC's website on April 20th, 2015 and	
7	sent to all the Commissioners on that date.	
8	All in favor?	
9	(Chorus of Ayes.)	
10	MR. WILSON: It's unanimous.	
11	COMM. CARONE: Can I make a comment,	
12	Madame Chair?	
13	As you see, I just voted for the	
14	rules and I certainly support these rules.	
15	I am particularly happy that the rules	
16	relax the burden on small businesses,	
17	including financial and otherwise, and I	
18	know there's no impact on safety,	
19	particularly with our stringent inspection	
20	requirements. I'm happy to see that it	
21	makes it easier for divers to reenter the	
22	workplace, easy renewal process, and I	
23	never understood the lack of parity in the	
24	retirement rules between the different	
25	classes, particularly black and yellow.

2	But I did have some initial concerns
3	and as I expressed with the Chair and
4	General Counsel, and that was whether or
5	not we were going to be able to fully meet
6	our commitment to accessibility. And for a
7	variety of reasons, I am comfortable that
8	that is not the case, particularly since
9	our commitment to accessibility, which one
10	day in the future I hope includes
11	100 percent, applies to existing vehicles
12	on the road, not the replacement vehicles
13	that are subject to this rule. So that
14	concern has been alleviated and I fully
15	support the rule, and I think it's a fair
16	and great step forward.
17	THE CHAIR: With that, I think that
18	concludes today's meeting at 10:56. Thank
19	you.
