2 COMMISSIONER DAUS: Good afternoon, 3 everybody. Can we take our seats. We're 4 actually, we're working from a revised agenda. 5 It was revised this morning actually, I 6 apologize.

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7 First item, the Chair's Report. I know its 8 been a little confusing because we've changed our 9 times. We're going to potentially be, because of 10 Commissioners' schedules, we're looking at different dates. I know we usually do the second 11 Thursday in the morning. It's turning out to be 12 a conflict. We're actually here today and in 13 14 December in the afternoon because it's hard to 15 get everybody together given the schedules of the Commissioners. So we're going to try to come up 16 17 with, we're going to poll the Commissioners over the next couple weeks to try to come up with, at 18 19 least for the new year, a date most likely in the 20 morning but a date that will work, the first or 21 second Tuesday of the month, whatever that might be but it's probably not going to be the second 22 Thursday of every month anymore unless things 23 change. But we will let you know that soon, 24 25 probably by the December meeting, so at this

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point people can plan ahead.

3 The first item I have is the Accessible 4 Dispatch Report. As I promised every month, as 5 of November 15th these are the numbers. To date we've had 4,277 dispatches. We've completed 6 7 3,821 trips as of the 13th of November. And 8 cancelations, we've had 455. The average wait 9 time is about 36 and a half minutes. On average, 10 the number of daily dispatches is 8.5. Those numbers have remained fairly consistent. 11

Item 2, Distracted Driving and Cell Phones. 12 13 As you know, we had a staff presentation last 14 week, I mean last month and we had some very good 15 comments from the Commissioners. I want to thank Commissioner Giannoulis in particular for 16 17 pointing out some good ideas about how we deal with the business needs of the limousine, black 18 19 cars and livery industry. We took that advice to 20 heart and we went back to the table and we had 21 meetings with several stakeholders. Personally and either me or my staff will be meeting with 22 23 everyone who wants a meeting and we will be continuing our outreach between now and the 24 25 December public hearing. We actually drafted

2 rules, which are subject to change, which are in 3 the back, posted on the website and City Record 4 and the Commissioners have them and I think most 5 of the industry folks have them. So I'd ask you to get your comments in early. Some of the 6 7 drafting is challenging, I would say at the very least for some of the things that are being 8 9 proposed, such as exemptions and technologies, so 10 Chuck and his staff have his work cut out for him. I'm confident he can pull it together but 11 rather than waiting until the last second, I'd 12 appreciate it if we could get the comments in 13 14 earlier. The next Commission meeting will be December 17th at 1:30 p.m. At that point, we'll 15 be having a public hearing on cell phones among 16 17 other things.

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18We are moving along on our Rules Revision19Project. We are going to vote on some more rules20today. But the next Rules Revision hearing topic21will be Medallion Owners, Chapter 8. We do not22have a hearing date yet but we'll advise everyone23as soon as we do.

On the FHV rules, the limitation wecurrently are seeing is a 53 percent failure rate

2 on initial inspections, 21 percent on 3 reinspections. We are also continuing to work 4 actively on the training component, we should 5 have some results soon. I know Commissioner 6 Polanco is interested in that.

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7 We also have continued our outreach. I 8 don't know if there's been a rule that we've been as reasonable on in terms of enforcing as the new 9 10 requirements for the Bill of Rights, the license 11 posting and the decals. I think we've been very reasonable given the circumstances, in terms of 12 13 outreach, getting people to cooperate. I think there's a decent level of compliance but in the 14 15 next week or two, I'm going to be announcing a firm enforcement date. If you look at the 16 penalties, they are pretty stiff penalties. 17 So when I announce that enforcement date that's the 18 19 last call. Deputy Commissioner Mullings is going 20 to be going out there with everybody. If you 21 don't have your license sticker, you are going to be pulled off the road. I'm giving everybody 22 warning. Its been 6 months since we passed the 23 rules. I think we've been reasonable and after 24 25 talking to some of the Commissioners and some of

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2 the staff, we are going to have to announce an 3 enforcement date at some point. We will do that 4 shortly and it'll be a firm date, everyone will 5 know about it and plan accordingly. So if you're 6 from the FHV industry and you represent a trade 7 group, you need to get the word out that this is 8 going to happen. 9 COMMISSIONER GONZALES: When you get an 10 opportunity, I'd like to know how many inspections were done and also how many, what was 11 the most common failures for these inspections. 12 COMMISSIONER DAUS: We could get that for 13 14 you. COMMISSIONER GONZALES: These are all DMV 15 inspections, right, at our facility? 16 17 COMMISSIONER DAUS: At our facility. We're DMV certified. So try to get it together if you 18 19 can before the meetings over. 20 Also, on group rides, we've made some 21 progress. If you remember at the State of the 22 City address, the Mayor at the beginning of the year asked the TLC to come up with some plans 23 that we all voted on, some pilot programs that 24 25 we're looking into at the Commission meetings I

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2 think in the spring. So I'm happy to announce 3 that three of them are almost ready to go and the 4 livery stand or Satellite Bass Project is also 5 almost ready to go. So within the next week or two we'll be announcing a request for 6 7 participation in that program and we hope before 8 the year's over to actually have at least three 9 group ride stands up and running. I'm not going 10 into the details because Assistant Commissioner 11 Epstein is going to be doing the staff presentation to update the Commissioners here 12 today. She'll brief us on it and I just want to 13 thank and commend everybody for working on this 14 15 and I want to thank the DOT, the Port Authority and also the Business Improvement Districts we've 16 been working with because we couldn't have gotten 17 this far so far without their help. This is not 18 19 something we can do on our own.

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Last but certainly not least, we have a major, major personnel announcement, which I'm sure many of you know already because word travels fast in this industry that our first Deputy Commissioner is unfortunately going to be leaving us but fortunately not leaving the City

2 family. He's going to the Department of Finance. 3 I don't know if that makes him more beloved or 4 not, I'm not really sure than the TLC but, you 5 know, certainly I can't believe that 5 years, I think it's about 5 years have gone by since he's 6 7 been here. When we welcomed Andy at the TLC, I 8 think the thought was we hadn't had for many, 9 many years somebody even from the days of 10 Commission Chair Delvaley, he had Brucaley, he 11 had a research unit. Many years went by without studies and research and statistics that are the 12 13 quality and level that Andy's been able to pull together for us and, you know, really I think you 14 15 need to balance taking action and doing things and not just sitting on studies all day but I 16 17 think we found that balance with Andy. I think Andy helped make sure that when we brought a 18 19 higher level degree of sophistication in terms of 20 research and studies and analysis to basically 21 not just promote transparency but come to the truth. Sometimes we hear things from owners and 22 drivers and people on the street and even within 23 our own staff ranks, people have different 24 25 opinions on what the earnings are. Andy helped

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2 spearhead many major reforms with us over the 3 last 5 years. There's just too many to name and 4 he's really been an indispensable part of our 5 staff and he hired some very good people that he's brought onboard and have done great and 6 we're going to miss him tremendously. So I 7 wanted to first of all thank you, Andy and we're 8 9 going to miss you. We hope we have projects we 10 can work on with you over there, though I doubt it. He's going to be Deputy Commissioner of 11 Operations; is that right? So I want to thank 12 you and commend you for all your work here. I 13 14 know some other Commissioners might want to say a few words as well. 15 COMMISSIONER WEINSHALL: I just want to make 16 17 a presentation to Andy, if that's all right? COMMISSIONER DAUS: Good, good. 18 19 COMMISSIONER WEINSHALL: Why don't you open this first. 20 21 I just want to say that, I just want to say that I met Andy in 1997 when he came to work with 22 23 me at DCAS and the thing that always struck me about Andy is he's an idea guy. And he was in a 24 25 unit that was really called upon to come up with

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2 new and innovative ways for City Government to do 3 both procurement and real estate and personnel. 4 And Andy was so good at what he did that Deputy 5 Commissioners wouldn't let him on their floors. They didn't let him roam around and talk to staff 6 7 because inevitably when he did that, he came up with somebody that most Deputy Commissioners 8 9 didn't want to do but in the end we did do it and 10 it worked out well.

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11 Then Andy came with me to DOT. For those of you who don't know, Andy really after 911, I 12 think he was one of the more instrumental people 13 14 in getting Lower Manhattan moving again. And 15 there were actually days and weeks that Andy never went home. He just stayed at the office 16 and really worked really hard to try to get the 17 City back up and operating. 18

19When Matt was looking for a First Deputy a20number of years ago, he and I talked about21possible candidates and I said, even though Andy22would be a great loss to DOT, he would really be23a great addition here at TLC and he has really24proven himself to be just that, starting with the25fair increase a few years ago. I know a lot of

2 people from the industry are in this room and 3 they know about the back and forth that we had at 4 City Hall but we got it done, all the technology 5 improvements, now the new rules change that we're going through at the TLC and Matt sort of touched 6 7 on this but I really have to say, you know, you can tell a lot about a leader by the staff that 8 9 they hire and the staff that they bring with 10 them. And I have to tell you, Andy, I think you've assembled just a spectacular staff here. 11 I just want to end by saying that those in 12 elected government, we serve because we care 13 14 about people, we really care about the City and 15 we really care about the job we do each and every day and I think Andy really just qualifies in all 16 17 those categories. He's a great, great civil servant, so I want to wish you all the best in 18 19 Finance. COMMISSIONER DAUS: Thank you Iris. Anybody 20 21 else want to say anything? 22 COMMISSIONER GONZALES: Yes. Andy, just 23 like to say thanks again for helping my personal transition from being solely from the private 24 25 sector to come into the government and to really

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1 2 appreciate for everything that the public sector 3 here does and can do. You're going to be missed 4 here but I'm glad you're still with the City. 5 COMMISSIONER POLANCO: I too echo Commissioner Gonzales's expression. And I want 6 7 to thank Andy because the first day that I got basically sworn in as a Commissioner, the first 8 9 thing he did, I really wanted to see the 10 industry, so we took me down to Woodside and basically showed me around and I really 11 appreciate that. We'll definitely keep in touch 12 and I appreciate everything that you've done for 13 14 Thanks. me. 15 COMMISSIONER GIANNOULIS: I also want to thank you and congratulate you on your new job. 16 17 It sounds interesting and exciting and look forward to seeing you there. 18 19 COMMISSIONER DAUS: I've asked Andy to say a 20 few words but before we do that, we didn't have 21 time to get him together the plaque that we would 22 like to give to him but we will at some point present that to him. Traditionally what we do is 23 we take the badge and we laminate that, so we 24 25 will bring you back to do that. But for now, we

have something that I'd like to read and ask you 2 3 to come up and join us so we can take a photo 4 with the Commissioners. This is a plaque 5 presented to Andy with great gratitude by the TLC for your dedication, to excellence in public 6 7 service, which was an inspiration to us all. In your hands, statistics were more than just 8 9 columns on a page, they were a universe of 10 questions answered and knowledge revealed. Congratulations, Andy. Why don't you join us for 11 a photo. 12 (Whereupon, photographs were taken.) 13 14 MR. SALKIN: Thanks very much for that, 15 Matt. I want to thank Matt for the opportunity and 16 17 for his leadership over these, oh gosh, 5 years. Iris, obviously I want to thank you so much 18 for the opportunity and guidance you've given me 19 to clean up the City. I feel very fortunate to 20 21 continue that. 22 And to all the Commissioners. I think, I 23 want to thank you all for teaching the agency to work with you and all the good things you've done 24 25 for the citizens of New York and the riders. No

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2 one reports on that. They report on the things 3 that the TLC does. I appreciate you guys coming 4 out all the time to these meetings, you're unpaid 5 and lobbied and hassled but I think its been 6 great stuff. I think the industry is, the 7 Commission that I see today was a very strong 8 one, so thank you for all that.

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9 To everyone here, I've been listening and 10 talking to people. Its been great to hear things of all the different things we did. I do want to 11 thank the staff that works here, that was here, 12 that came and worked with me, you guys are great. 13 I know the TLC is really in great hands, so keep 14 15 up the good work and keep making me as proud as I am today. 16

To the industry, going way back to the first time we toured and learned all about the industry and knew nothing, you were great and you really opened up and explained a lot and shared a lot. I think because of your willingness to share and help make sure the industry understood, we did a lot of really great things.

24 And to the drivers who worked so hard and 25 you do work hard, you're under appreciated and

people might not understand everything you do. Keep up the good work and hopefully have a good holiday season.

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5 And really to the riders of New York, who looks like none of you are here and I want to 6 7 thank all of you who are the riders because you don't really know what the people in this room 8 9 do. Since riders don't come to the meetings, let 10 me represent a rider. I want to thank everyone 11 here for providing service to New York, whether you're an owner, a car owner, a licensee, a 12 driver or Commission or member of the Commission, 13 14 someone who works here, over 1.2 million people 15 get rides everyday from TLC regulated vehicles. They go from point A to point B. Everyone talks 16 17 about the MTA, everyone talks about the Staten Island Ferry, people talk about how they get 18 19 around the City. One of the ways you get around 20 New York is you get around in a taxi, a Gipsy cab 21 as people still call them and no one really knows how that works except for the people in this 22 room. You guys really in this room, as I look 23 24 around, there's some people missing that you guys 25 know and keep up good work, keep up the good

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service.

3 I hope in the Mayor's final term, you can 4 continue to expand and improve. I think a Times 5 article came out a couple of weeks ago saying how New York leapfrogged other taxi industries and 6 7 provided services to the passengers with credit cards and other services within the cabs is 8 9 tremendous. I think it's Matt who I think trying 10 to get the chain rules and things we're doing now are leapfrogging the service that's being 11 provided to the City, not just in one part of the 12 City but all over the City and what future might 13 14 hold better, which are better vehicles, cleaner vehicles, smarter vehicles, better drivers, 15 smarter drivers that are compensating everybody, 16 17 cheaper fairs, I don't know what it is but I know this agency can do that and I think everyone in 18 19 this room can do that.

I look forward to being a passenger, I look
forward to filling a complaint and complements.
But for that as a passenger/rider, thank you
everyone.

24 COMMISSIONER DAUS: Thank you, Andy.25 So Item 2 on the agenda is the Adoption of

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2	the Minutes. Any questions or concerns?
3	(No response given.)
4	COMMISSIONER DAUS: A motion to approve?
5	COMMISSIONER POLANCO: I move.
6	COMMISSIONER DAUS: Second?
7	COMMISSIONER GONZALES: Second.
8	COMMISSIONER DAUS: All in favor?
9	THE COMMISSION: (In unison hands raised.)
10	COMMISSIONER DAUS: Minutes approved.
11	Item 3, Base Applications. Georgia?
12	MS. STEELE-RADWAY: Good afternoon.
13	Licensing would like to present before the
14	Commission 26 bases with a recommendation for
15	approval.
16	COMMISSIONER DAUS: Do we have a motion?
17	COMMISSIONER GONZALES: Motion to approve.
18	COMMISSIONER DAUS: Second?
19	COMMISSIONER POLANCO: Second.
20	COMMISSIONER DAUS: All in favor.
21	THE COMMISSION: (In unison hands raised.)
22	MS. STEELE-RADWAY: Licensing is
23	recommending one base with a recommendation for
24	denial with a request that the Commission grants
25	an additional 30 days so that they may present

1 2 the outstanding items. 3 COMMISSIONER DAUS: Motion to deny? 4 COMMISSIONER GONZALES: Motion to deny for 5 30 days. 6 COMMISSIONER DAUS: Second? 7 COMMISSIONER WEINSHALL: Second. COMMISSIONER DAUS: All in favor? 8 9 THE COMMISSION: (In unison hands raised.) COMMISSIONER DAUS: Thank you, so denied. 10 MS. STEELE-RADWAY: Thank you. 11 COMMISSIONER DAUS: Thank you, Georgia. 12 Item 4, For Commission Action, the Rules 13 14 Revision Project, Item A, Chapter 18, Adjudications. I'm going to turn it over to 15 Chuck Fraser. Chuck? 16 MR. FRASER: This is the 13th TETC chapter 17 to come before the Commission for conditional 18 approval. This is proposed Chapter 18, which 19 would replace existing Chapter 8 relating to 20 21 Adjudications. 22 We published the rules for the required 30-day comment period. We received two written 23 comments and we had three speakers at the public 24 25 hearing. The comments, both written and

1 testimonial were overwhelmingly for subsitive 2 3 [sic] changes to be made to the rules and so 4 we're deferring those to phase three of the Rules 5 Revision Project. There are three changes that we did make to the proposed rules as they were 6 7 published and the Commission has both the revised rules, the transcript of the public hearing and 8 9 copies of the written comments. So the staff is 10 recommending that this chapter, like the previous 12, be conditionally approved subject to further 11 vote after the remaining six chapters are 12 13 approved. 14 COMMISSIONER DAUS: Does anybody want to make a motion to approve? 15 COMMISSIONER WEINSHALL: So moved. 16 17 COMMISSIONER DAUS: Second? COMMISSIONER GONZALES: Second. 18 COMMISSIONER DAUS: All in favor? 19 COMMISSIONER POLANCO: Are there any 20 21 comments basically from the industry today in terms of them approving these rules because from 22 23 what I see here, you mentioned that there have been several subsitive [sic] changes to Chapter 24 25 18. I want to know more about them. You specify

6 of the bullet point statements and I know you mentioned consist, that is mentioned, I'm sorry, consistent with local law, consistent with practice to fully incorporate the provisions of local law.

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7 MR. FRASER: The local law that that refers to is Local Law 16 of 2008. We did a rule 8 9 making, we were under a fair amount of time 10 pressure because the local law had a very short effective date and we did a rule making to 11 implement it and we found consistently as we've 12 13 gone through the chapters that we missed points. 14 So these are subsitive[sic] changes to the old rules but they're also legally mandatory because 15 they're mandated by Local Law 16 of 2008. 16

17 The one on the vehicle towing and storage fees, we've updated that because the vehicle 18 19 towing and storage fees are not what the rules 20 say they were. We use some, Deputy Commissioner 21 Mullings would have to explain this. We use a different towing than we used to and so it has a 22 23 different fee and we do storage at the PD's pound so it's the PD's fee, so we updated the rules to 24 25 reflect that.

1 2 COMMISSIONER POLANCO: I'm sorry, when local 3 law to fully incorporate the provision of local 4 law, they are items that are mandatory? 5 MR. FRASER: Yes. The local law was passed and as I said, we did a rule making at that time 6 7 to implement the requirements of it but as we've 8 gone through, we found, you know, as we've been 9 doing this comprehensive revision, we have found 10 a number of instances where we didn't fully, we didn't get everything, so we are correcting that 11 12 now. 13 COMMISSIONER POLANCO: We cannot wait until the phase --14 MR. FRASER: Our preference, we have a rule 15 that's actually not legal. We would prefer to do 16 17 it now. It is true we are not making subsitive [sic] changes in this rules revision in a general 18 19 manner but we have a rule that doesn't comply 20 with statutory law, we have been changing it. 21 This is the most we've had. Usually it's one or two changes in a chapter and this is I think six 22 and that is the most but then Local Law 16 was 23 about Adjudication, so I think three or four of 24 25 the points here are Local Law 16.

2 COMMISSIONER DAUS: You've made, the way 3 we've been working this is that we've been having 4 public hearings separately and we give you the 5 transcript. I think you did made some changes that the Industry wanted you to make, correct? 6 7 MR. FRASER: We made three changes that were requested. They were not subsitive [sic] 8 9 changes. They were changes where our drafting 10 was not as clear as it should have been, so those were not subsitive [sic] changes. Those are not 11 listed, therefore, in the listing of subsitive 12 13 [sic] changes in the bank. 14 COMMISSIONER DAUS: Are you going to vote for, against it or abstain or do you want more 15 information? 16 COMMISSIONER POLANCO: I think I'll need 17 more information because I know that we do, from 18 19 what I've noticed from the hearings, the comments 20 are attached but then I don't hear the reply from 21 the other side. 22 COMMISSIONER DAUS: We actually, there 23 was --COMMISSIONER POLANCO: Well, basically I 24 25 hear the changes.

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COMMISSIONER DAUS: I apologize but there 2 3 was an memo that we e-mailed yesterday to all the 4 Commissioners, sorry for being so late. But 5 Chuck went and itemized every point and responded 6 to every single one. You didn't get that? 7 COMMISSIONER POLANCO: No. COMMISSIONER DAUS: If you're not 8 9 comfortable, we'll just table it. 10 MR. FRASER: There was an unusually large number of comments this time, I believe came to 11 99 total comments, meaning not commenters but 12 points made in the total comments. 13 14 COMMISSIONER POLANCO: Correct. MR. FRASER: So it took longer than it 15 usually does to summarize them. 16 17 COMMISSIONER DAUS: If you want, we'll just table it. 18 COMMISSIONER POLANCO: Can you? I'd feel 19 20 more comfortable. 21 COMMISSIONER DAUS: Yes because you only did 22 get the memo yesterday, so that's fine. Why don't we table this and we'll bring it back up at 23 next month's meeting. 24 25 COMMISSIONER GIANNOULIS: Is there specifics

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1 we could discuss now, if you want to go forward? 2 COMMISSIONER WEINSHALL: Why don't you let 3 4 her get comfortable with the memo. It's a rather 5 full memo, I read it. So why don't you let her read it and then vote in December. 6 7 COMMISSIONER DAUS: Okay. Sounds good. We'll table Item 4 A. 8 9 The next item is Item 5 A, Pilot Program 10 Proposal For Commission Review and Action, called the Blade. David Clar is going to show us what 11 the Blade is. 12 MR. CLAR: Hi. Good afternoon, everybody. 13 14 I did bring in the Blade. We don't, vehicle pilot I can't bring in to show you but this kind 15 of mechanical pilot I can. 16 17 What this is is a device intended to go on the end of a tailpipe of a car. It comes in two 18 pieces. There's inner, we'll call it a sock for 19 20 lack of a better word and then an outer housing. 21 You can see it screws on by a kind of a screw and 22 bolt assembly. What this is is a device manufactured by a 23 company called Saber Tech and we received a 24 25 proposal from a distributor of this device called

2 Drive the Change based in Pennsylvania. The 3 intent is you put this on your tailpipe of your 4 taxi or for-hire vehicle and the sock captures 5 much, if not all of the particular matter that is supposed to be coming out of your tailpipe. And 6 7 then Drive the Change also claims this will 8 improve your gasoline mileage. All though, when 9 we replied to them and asked them to explain how 10 that happens, they were unable to do so.

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The device is similar to a lot of other 11 devices that have already been looked at over the 12 last 20, 30 years by the EPA, none of which have 13 14 proven to be a really substantial contribution to 15 either reducing emissions or increase mileage. If people in the industry really want to 16 17 drastically reduce their gas consumption and drastically reduce the amount of pollution, they 18 should buy a hybrid electric vehicle, which is 19 20 consistent with the City and the Mayor's policy 21 in general.

22 Therefore, the staff's recommendation on 23 this particular pilot is to reject it and to kind 24 of move on to more general policy solutions to 25 this problem.

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2	COMMISSIONER GIANNOULIS: In honor of Andy
3	Salkin, I will not complain about anything today
4	and I put a motion in to reject the Blade.
5	COMMISSIONER DAUS: Do we have a second to
б	that motion?
7	COMMISSIONER WEINSHALL: I second.
8	COMMISSIONER DAUS: All in favor.
9	THE COMMISSION: (In unison hands raised.)
10	COMMISSIONER DAUS: It's so rejected.
11	MR. CLAR: Thank you.
12	COMMISSIONER DAUS: The next item is Item 6
13	A. We have a presentation by staff involved with
14	the NYC Media Sticker. I know we have from the
15	Mayor's office of film, theater and broadcasting
16	we have both Ally Cleaver and Todd Asher with us.
17	I think, Ally, you are going to chat?
18	MS. CLEAVER: We both are.
19	COMMISSIONER DAUS: You're both going to do
20	it?
21	MS. CLEAVER: Yes.
22	COMMISSIONER DAUS: This is a late addition
23	to the agenda. I just want to point out to the
24	Commissioners that Catherine Oliver is now
25	taking, has taken over NYCTB.

2 COMMISSIONER WEINSHALL: Really? 3 COMMISSIONER DAUS: Yes. She has been 4 really very helpful to us. She's been doing very 5 good work with the Commission over the last 6 couple of months and we're thankful for that and 7 for her wonderful staff. They have a proposal 8 for another sticker. 9 COMMISSIONER WEINSHALL: Can I just say 10 something before this presentation? COMMISSIONER DAUS: Sure. 11 COMMISSIONER WEINSHALL: Maybe I'll be 12 tarred and feathered for this, how many stickers 13 14 are we going to put on these cabs? I mean for God's stake it's a yellow cab. How many more 15 stickers are we going to put on these cabs? 16 17 They're like Christmas trees already. COMMISSIONER DAUS: Is that a rhetorical 18 19 question or. COMMISSIONER WEINSHALL: It's rhetorical. I 20 21 got it out of my system. Harry said he would 22 behavior himself at this meeting, I didn't say I 23 would. COMMISSIONER DAUS: I guess it depends, the 24 25 answer is how pretty the sticker and how

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1 2 subsitive [sic] it is. 3 COMMISSIONER WEINSHALL: Are we taking off 4 any stickers or just adding a sticker? 5 COMMISSIONER DAUS: Well, I think this is a proposal for a voluntary sticker. 6 7 COMMISSIONER WEINSHALL: Oh, okay. COMMISSIONER DAUS: Not to prejudge anything 8 9 but I think it looks wonderful but go ahead. 10 MR. ASHER: It was Andy's last wish that we put this sticker on the cabs before he leaves. 11 Thank you for seeing us, I know we were a 12 late addition. And just for the benefit of those 13 14 who might not know, NYC Media are the TV stations for and radio stations owned and operated by the 15 State of New York, all of a noncommercial nature. 16 17 And what we are looking to do is develop programing that's in line with the Commission of 18 the City to promote City initiatives, working 19 closer with sister agencies and also to celebrate 20 21 the diversity of the City. 22 We have begun creating that program but what's really important to us is making sure that 23 there's the ability for people to see and 24

25 awareness of the fact that the channels exist.

1 2 Channel 5 is available over the air, so it's 3 available to people who don't have the benefit of 4 cable or satellite as well. It happens to also 5 be on the cable and satellite systems. So Ally has been working very closely with 6 7 the communications department and with other agencies to develop a new brand and this is one 8 9 of the elements we think would give great 10 visibility to the station and great things to the City of New York. 11 MS. CLEAVER: The idea, basically we're 12 rebranding. We've been over the last couple 13 14 months not only NYC Media but the individual properties that broadcast channels as well as the 15 radio station. In an effort to generate 16 17 awareness of the new rebranding, as well as just generate awareness of the assets and the resource 18 19 to New York City residents, we're looking to take 20 an opportunity to work with the TLC and display 21 this kind of messaging in the new year. 22 COMMISSIONER WEINSHALL: Where would this 23 decal go? MR. ASHER: It would go on the rear of the 24 25 cab on the inside on either window.

1 2 COMMISSIONER DAUS: This is just like, 3 remember we approved the 2012 stickers and 4 Commission on Women's History Month stickers. It 5 would be a voluntary thing. COMMISSIONER WEINSHALL: So still someone 6 7 could read the sticker? 8 COMMISSIONER DAUS: Yes. 9 MR. ASHER: From the passenger viewpoint. 10 And we're also in the process of creating new 11 intros and outros at no cost for the TLC for the benefit of the passengers. So when you get into 12 the cabs now, we created one years ago but 13 14 created now three new ones for the Candlewood 15 Aware Campaign and to promote the interactivity 16 of the screen. So when you get in the cab and it 17 tells you to put your seatbelt on, it gives you all the information about the ride, as well as 18 19 letting you know when you exit the cab to collect 20 your affairs and having a good day. So we're 21 also working on that. This would give us a more permanent visible presence as there's other 22 23 videos going on on the screen. COMMISSIONER WEINSHALL: I'm confused. 24 25 Todd, you're saying you're going to put a video

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now?

3 MR. ASHER: We're already doing that and we 4 are refreshing that as we speak, so that'll be 5 out later.

6 MR. FRASER: This is unrelated to the 7 sticker.

8 COMMISSIONER WEINSHALL: It's above and 9 beyond that.

10 COMMISSIONER GIANNOULIS: It's a video 11 that's a public, I'm not sure, the contracts that 12 were done with the companies, I don't really know 13 what they are. There's a certain amount of time 14 that's given to the City.

MR. FRASER: Right, correct, correct, yes. 15 COMMISSIONER DAUS: Right. People are kind 16 17 of board of the and it's really kind of worn out its welcome. It's not as interactive as it could 18 19 be. Its been on there for a long time, so the 20 Mayor's office has been kind enough to help us 21 revamp that. So they're doing a lot of work with 22 us on this and rebranding is a part of that. So we're getting really good, free talented help 23 with the Passenger Information monitor, like the 24 25 intro and outro, the beginning and the end when

2 it says buckle up your seatbelt, etcetera. 3 COMMISSIONER GIANNOULIS: I have a question 4 and I'll go along again in honor of Andy Salkin 5 with whatever I respond to today. But your channels are great, I watch them, I listen to 6 7 them and you guys do a great job. Do you do 8 anything for the taxi industry? 9 MR. ASHER: Do we do anything in which 10 regard? Through the TLC? COMMISSIONER GIANNOULIS: Well, no. For the 11 taxi industry. You're the channel of New York, 12 there's a lot of, the taxi industry is pretty 13 14 big. Is there involving your channels or your, any of the programs or media that you provide 15 that's related to the taxi industry? 16 17 MR. ASHER: Absolutely. We do a number of things. One, we're looking to promote economic 18 19 development in general in terms of transportation 20 issues. We have a channel that's entirely 21 dedicated to traffic, above-street traffic. 22 We're working on collecting more data that we could put onto the screen and we'd love to work 23 with anyone related to the TLC or the taxi 24 25 industry to collect that data, display it, get

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1 2 more visibility to the riding public about their 3 options. As well as looking at issues including 4 the disabled access to transportation and things 5 that really resinate within the sectors of the TLC. 6 7 COMMISSIONER DAUS: They also broadcast all 8 of these meetings, Harry. That's something 9 pretty --10 COMMISSIONER GIANNOULIS: How much of your contract would you call entertainment? 11 MR. ASHER: If you look across all of the 12 properties, less than half and really our mission 13 14 since Catherine took over in April, May is to 15 develop all of our programing being in line, 16 having an intersection with New York City and 17 promoting things that are educational but always with an entertainment so they're enjoyable to 18 19 watch and present people to watch them. Part of 20 that is this awareness effort to make sure that 21 people know that there's programing that can 22 better their lives but where to find it. COMMISSIONER GIANNOULIS: Thanks. 23

24 COMMISSIONER WEINSHALL: Can I just ask one25 other thing. So we have all these bus stop

1 shelters all over the City of New York. I would 2 3 hope that you're also going to put these in a 4 larger form. 20 percent of the advertising space 5 is set aside for public messages. So I'm sure you're already on it but I would hope that not 6 7 only are you going to dress up our cabs with this but you will add this to the bus stop shelters. 8 9 MR. ASHER: We're working very closely with 10 the NYC Co. right now, yes. COMMISSIONER WEINSHALL: Great. Thank you. 11 COMMISSIONER DAUS: Any other questions? 12 COMMISSIONER POLANCO: It's voluntary? 13 14 COMMISSIONER DAUS: Yes. I would like to 15 make a motion to approve the sticker for 16 voluntary placement on the rear quarter panel 17 window. COMMISSIONER WEINSHALL: So moved. 18 THE COMMISSION: (In unison hands raised.) 19 COMMISSIONER DAUS: It's unanimous. 20 21 MR. ASHER: Thank you very much. 22 COMMISSIONER DAUS: You're welcome. I think 23 it looks nice but that's just my opinion. Thanks again for all your help. We appreciate 24 25 everything that you're doing for us, we really do

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2	and thanks for covering us for the last 10,
3	15 years.
4	MR. ASHER: Our pleasure.
5	COMMISSIONER DAUS: And also for covering us
б	when we go before the City Council.
7	So we're now up to Item 6 B. Assistant
8	Commissioner Samara Epstein is going to give us
9	an update on the Taxicab Stand Pilot Program.
10	MS. EPSTEIN: Good afternoon. So I'm just
11	here to update you on the group ride highlights
12	that we talked about. Back in May was the last
13	presentation that we did and we've been working
14	since then with DOT and the Local Business
15	Improvement Districts and Port Authority to work
16	on the these and see if there's any additional
17	locations. So there are some new ideas that have
18	come up through these conversations and I'll just
19	update you on where we are with that.
20	So just a reminder of what we had discussed,
21	which is that a group ride would be a pilot.
22	They are for two or more passengers only. They
23	would be for group ride pilot locations only. It
24	would be limited to the morning rush hour, the
25	idea being that there are a lot of people that

2 take cabs when they come into the City in the 3 morning or from one place to the next, so we're 4 going to focus on just that morning rush. 5 Passengers will be dropped off along the quarter route and I won't go through the locations. Just 6 7 to remind you what we had discussed in May, it's 8 a flat fair per person, which is less expensive for them, so passengers are going to have some 9 10 sort of incentive to take these.

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11 In May, you approved these six locations and as the Chair mentioned at the beginning of the 12 13 meeting, we are going to start with three of them by the end of the year is our goal. The first 14 15 three are the last three on this list. Those are the ones we're going to start with. The reason 16 for that is a little more complicated to get 17 these stands up and running. The transportation 18 19 help is more involved in doing that. So those 20 first three will be the first ones to go and you 21 can see with the prices per person, it's \$3 or \$4. And they go to these specific locations and 22 23 by being dropped off along the quarter route, 24 what we mean is anywhere along Park Avenue to 25 42nd Street. That's how long the flat fair will

be applied and people will be dropped off along that route. They can't say I want to go to Madison, it's just going to go down that route.

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5 Over the course of these discussions, we did talk to a bunch of the businesses. The Times 6 7 Square Alliance who we talked to about one of the 8 ones in Midtown said, you know, we'd really like 9 to see if you guys could try this idea after 10 shows during the week because we'd like people to share cabs. It can be hard for cabs to get into 11 the location, so they're hoping that it will help 12 13 the cab drivers get more passengers and the 14 passengers will same money getting home and of 15 course, it's a more efficient way to move people too. So they surveyed theater owners and theater 16 17 owners were into this idea and they want to do a single pilot stand for that whole area, which 18 19 would be on 44th Street. We still have to 20 finalize the location because we're working with 21 the theaters to make sure it's okay with everybody and it would only be active on weekdays 22 after the evening theater performance from 10:30 23 to 11:30 p.m. 24

So this is something, the pilot possibility

I'm bringing to you today is something we are going to actually vote on in December. So we can talk about it today and then if there's anything else we need to follow up on, we can do that before December's meeting.

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7 The other additional pilot possibilities are 8 at LaGuardia Airport. Right now we have TLC rules in place that specify a group ride and 9 10 they're not used. They haven't been used in a 11 long time. They were put in the books in 1993 and from internal conversations and talking to 12 13 the industry and talking to Port Authority, we 14 think they were put in place really because there 15 weren't a lot of cabs going to LaGuardia at that time, so it was an incentive to get cabs to go 16 17 there. We don't have that problem today. A lot of people use cabs to go to and from LaGuardia 18 19 Airport. So the Port Authority and the staff are 20 recommending that we repeal these rules so that 21 we can try out a different pilot. You'll also note, I've listed the amount that's in the rule. 22 It's really not a lot of money, so it doesn't 23 make sense. The rates have changed a lot since 24 25 then. So that's the other thing that we would

2 like to talk about and more on our conversations 3 with the Port Authority are they discussed Marine Air Terminal, which is where the Delta shuttle 5 comes in. It's a lot of commuters, so in line with our original idea, they thought that would 6 7 be a good place to start it.

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8 We ran some trip sheet data and the average 9 fair is about \$32 per person. That's averaging 10 across Manhattan and we are proposing a fair of 11 \$20 per person to any Midtown location. We also talked to the Port Authority about doing one of 12 the larger terminals and they have agreed that US 13 14 Air Terminal might be another place to do that. 15 So in December, we'll bring to you more final numbers for US Air Terminal. We still need to 16 17 run that trip sheet data and see, make sure that the \$20 will work there too. 18

19 The next step in December, we're going to 20 bring a rules reposal to appeal the LaGuardia 21 group ride rate so that we could then vote on a pilot. We have to appeal the group ride rate in 22 order to be able to do that and we will also 23 bring to you a decision for the Times Square 24 25 pilot with all the final details on that. And

then hopefully we'll have, be in the process or already be done of installing and activating these first three locations that you voted on in May.

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Do you have any questions, comments? 6 7 COMMISSIONER WEINSHALL: Did you ever consider, there are portions of the City that 8 9 have become very poplar during certain parts of 10 the day, like the Lower East Side. Did you ever 11 every consider setting up a stand there and maybe having cabs not only do a flat rate in Manhattan 12 but maybe in Brooklyn, like going to Flatbush 13 Avenue at night? Did you ever look at that? 14

15 MS. EPSTEIN: That was something we had talked about a few months ago as part of this 16 17 kind of review. What we ended up deciding was we wanted to start with areas that we knew people 18 19 were going to be coming in in the mornings, see 20 how that works and then we can expand that along 21 the way. If that's something you want us to look at, we can certainly look at the data and see if 22 it --23

24 COMMISSIONER WEINSHALL: I would. I'd like25 you to look at that because, you know, that area,

1 Williamsburg in Brooklyn, I mean these are areas 2 3 that are, yeah, they get very popular because, 4 you know, they're a destination and I just know 5 from folks that I've spoken to that particularly б from the Lower East Side, it's very difficult to 7 get cabs to go to Brooklyn at 1:00 or 2:00 in the 8 morning. 9 MS. EPSTEIN: So you are thinking for late 10 night? COMMISSIONER WEINSHALL: Yes. 11 12 MS. EPSTEIN: On the weekend? During the week? Any idea what --13 14 COMMISSIONER WEINSHALL: Well, it's mostly busy on the weekends. 15 16 MS. EPSTEIN: Let's say Thursday through 17 Saturday. COMMISSIONER DAUS: Why don't we take a look 18 at the data. 19 COMMISSIONER WEINSHALL: I've been told 20 21 Thursday is the new Saturday. 22 MS. EPSTEIN: It's true. 23 COMMISSIONER DAUS: Especially in the 24 summer. 25 MS. EPSTEIN: So we'll get back to you on

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that.

3 COMMISSIONER DAUS: Any other questions, 4 request? 5 (No response given.) COMMISSIONER DAUS: So we'll have more б 7 information before the next meeting. Thank you, 8 Samara. 9 MS. EPSTEIN: Thank you. COMMISSIONER DAUS: Where are we now, 7. 10 We're going to have to adjourn this, correct? We 11 12 don't have enough people because I have to recuse 13 myself, so unfortunately we have to adjourn Item 7 A and B to the next meeting and the next 14 executive session held thereafter. 15 16 I'd like to wish everybody a happy Thanksgiving. We'll see you in December. 17 18 Do we have a motion to close the meeting? COMMISSIONER WEINSHALL: So moved. 19 COMMISSIONER DAUS: All in favor? 20 21 THE COMMISSION: (In unison hands raised.) 22 COMMISSIONER DAUS: Thank you. (Time noted: 2:04 p.m.) 23 24
